TAKE NOTICE THAT a Hearing before the Board of the Conservation Authority will be held under Section 28.0.1, Subsection 7 of the Conservation Authorities Act via videoconference, at the hour of **10:00 a.m. on the day of March 12, 2021**, with respect to the application by Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. to permit development within an area regulated by the Authority at the property municipally known as 1802 Bayly Street in the City of Pickering, Regional Municipality of Durham.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the applicant is invited to make a presentation and submit supporting written material to the Board of Directors in advance of the Hearing. Written material will be required by **Wednesday, March 10, 2021 at 4:30 p.m.**, to enable the Board members to review the material prior to the meeting.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Hearing will be streamed live on [TRCA's website](#). The rules governing the Hearing do not provide for third parties to participate. No delegations are permitted however members of the public may make written submissions to TRCA's Board of Directors and the applicant by **Wednesday, March 10, 2021 at 4:30 PM**, such that any public input can be included in the Hearing record. These submissions must be provided by the deadline noted, via email, to Alisa Mahrova, TRCA's Clerk and Manager, Policy: alisa.mahrova@trca.ca.

TAKE NOTICE THAT pursuant to Section 28.0.1 of the Conservation Authorities Act, a conservation authority is required to grant the permission applied for and may only impose conditions to the permission. The Hearing will therefore focus on the conditions to be imposed to the granting of the permission.

TAKE NOTICE THAT this hearing is governed by the provisions of the Statutory Powers Procedure Act. Under the Act, a witness is automatically afforded a protection that is similar to the protection of the Ontario Evidence Act. This means that the evidence that a witness gives may not be used in subsequent civil proceedings or in prosecutions against the witness under a Provincial Statute. It does not relieve the witness of the obligation of this oath since matters of

perjury are not affected by the automatic affording of the protection. The significance is that the legislation is Provincial and cannot affect Federal matters. If a witness requires the protection of the Canada Evidence Act that protection must be obtained in the usual manner. The Ontario Statute requires the tribunal to draw this matter to the attention of the witness, as this tribunal has no knowledge of the affect of any evidence that a witness may give.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that if the applicant does not attend at this Hearing, the Hearing may proceed in the absence of the applicant.

**Re: Interim Update to the SECTION 28 (3) CONSERVATION AUTHORITIES ACT
HEARING GUIDELINES**

The corona virus disease (COVID-19) was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. During the Provincial state of emergency as a result of the COVID-19 virus, the Provincial government enacted Order in Council 73/20 under s. 7.1 of the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act*. While that order was enacted, Provincial limitation periods and procedural time periods were under suspension between March 16, 2020 and September 14th.

With the suspension on limitation periods being revoked as of September 14th and the need for continued social distancing, conservation authorities require alternate means to provide hearings under Section 28 of the *Conservation Authorities Act*. The purpose of this interim update to the Section 28 Hearing Guidelines is to incorporate the use of electronic hearings. The update to the Hearing Guidelines is complementary to an update to the “Conservation Authority Best Management Practices (BMPs) and Administrative By-Law Model” to incorporate electronic Board meetings.

As a reminder, the decision by the Provincial government to enact Order in Council 73/20 under s. 7.1 of the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* will impact the scheduling of CA Hearings under Section 28 as well as the requirement for an applicant to file an appeal with the Mining and Lands Tribunal within 30 days. For any hearings that took place between March 16th and September 14th, 2020 the person who has been refused permission or who objects to conditions imposed on a permission will have 30 days after September 14th to file an appeal to the Mining and Lands Tribunal. For those CAs who have postponed hearings during the emergency period, they should be scheduled as soon as practical, keeping in mind that Administrative By-Laws and Hearing Guidelines may need to be amended to incorporate electronic meetings.

Amendments have been made throughout this document to incorporate electronic hearings. Conservation authorities are advised to review their internal Hearing Procedures to incorporate this update.

**Re: Interim Update to the SECTION 28 (3) CONSERVATION AUTHORITIES ACT
HEARING GUIDELINES**

Subsection 28(15) of the *Conservation Authorities Act* provides that a person who has been refused permission or who objects to conditions imposed on a permission may, within 30 days of receiving the reasons may appeal to the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry. Further to the passage of the *Building Better Communities and Conserving Watersheds Act*, 2017 effective April 3, 2018 this appeal has been assigned to the Mining and Lands Tribunal through Order in Council 332/2018. The Mining and Lands Tribunal is now a part of the Environment and Land Tribunal Cluster (ELTO) of the Ministry of the Attorney General.

By law, the appeal made under subsection 28(15) should be filed directly with the Mining and Lands Tribunal. A copy of the appeal letter to the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry is unnecessary and can be treated as optional. Conservation authorities should notify appellants that they must file their appeals with the Tribunal within 30 days of their receipt of notice. An appeal may be invalidated if it is not filed with the proper office within that time period. The appellants should also be instructed to copy the conservation authority in their appeal letter.

Further to this updated information, an amendment has been made to **Appendix D “Notice of Decision – Model”** to incorporate the revised contact information for the appeal. Conservation authorities are advised to review their internal Hearing Procedures to incorporate this update. It is anticipated that this “Interim Update to the Section 28(3) Conservation Authorities Act Hearing Guidelines” will provide guidance to conservation authorities related to Section 28 hearings until such time as a new Section 28 regulation is created by the province.

	CHAIRPERSON'S REMARKS WHEN DEALING WITH HEARINGS WITH RESPECT	

1.0 PURPOSE OF HEARING GUIDELINES

The purpose of the Hearing Guidelines is to reflect the changes to the 1998 Conservation Authorities Act. The Act requires that the applicant be party to a hearing by the local Conservation Authority Board, or Executive Committee (sitting as a Hearing Board) as the case may be, for an application to be refused or approved with contentious conditions. Further, a permit may be refused if in the opinion of the Authority the proposal adversely affects the control of flooding, pollution or conservation of land, and additional erosion and dynamic beaches. The Hearing Board is empowered by law to make a decision, governed by the Statutory Powers Procedures Act. It is the purpose of the Hearing Board to evaluate the information presented at the hearing by both the Conservation Authority staff and the applicant and to decide whether the application will be approved with or without conditions or refused.

These guidelines have been prepared as an update to the October 1992 hearing guidelines and are intended to provide a step-by-step process to conducting hearings required under Section 28 (12), (13), (14) of the Conservation Authorities Act. Similar to the 1992 guidelines, it is hoped that the guidelines will promote the necessary consistency across the Province and ensure that hearings meet the legal requirements of the Statutory Powers Procedures Act without being unduly legalistic or intimidating to the participants.

2.0 PREHEARING PROCEDURES

2.1 Apprehension of Bias

In considering the application, the Hearing Board is acting as a decision-making tribunal. The tribunal is to act fairly. Under general principles of administrative law relating to the duty of fairness, the tribunal is obliged not only to avoid any bias but also to avoid the appearance or apprehension of bias. The following are three examples of steps to be taken to avoid apprehension of bias where it is likely to arise.

- (a) No member of the Authority taking part in the hearing should be involved, either through participation in committee or intervention on behalf of the applicant or other interested parties with the matter, prior to the hearing. Otherwise, there is a danger of an apprehension of bias which could jeopardize the hearing.
- (b) If material relating to the merits of an application that is the subject of a hearing is distributed to Board members before the hearing, the material shall be distributed to the applicant at the same time. The applicant may be afforded an opportunity to distribute similar pre-hearing material. **These materials can be distributed electronically.**
- (c) In instances where the Authority (or Executive Committee) requires a hearing to help it reach a determination as to whether to give permission with or without conditions or refuse a permit application, a final decision shall not be made until such time as a hearing is held.

The applicant will be given an opportunity to attend the hearing before a decision is made; however, the applicant does not have to be present for a decision to be made.

Individual Conservation Authorities shall develop a document outlining their own practices and procedures relating to the review and reporting of Section 28 applications, including the role of staff, the applicant and the Authority or Executive Committee as well as, the procedures for the hearing itself. Such policy and procedures manual shall be available to the members of the public upon request **and on the Authority's website**. These procedures shall have regard for the above information and should be approved by the Conservation Authority Board of Directors.

2.2 Application

The right to a hearing is required where staff is recommending refusal of an application or where there is some indication that the Authority or Executive Committee may not follow staff's recommendation to approve a permit or the applicant objects to the conditions of approval. The applicant is entitled to reasonable notice of the hearing pursuant to the Statutory Powers Procedures Act.

2.3 Notice of Hearing

The Notice of Hearing shall be sent to the applicant within sufficient time to allow the applicant to prepare for the hearing. To ensure that reasonable notice is given, it is recommended that prior to sending the Notice of Hearing, the applicant be consulted to determine an agreeable date and time based on the local Conservation Authority's regular meeting schedule.

The Notice of Hearing must contain the following:

- (a) Reference to the applicable legislation under which the hearing is to be held (i.e., the Conservation Authorities Act).
- (b) The time, place and the purpose of the hearing. **OR for Electronic Hearings:**
The time, purpose of the hearing, and details about the manner in which the hearing will be held.

Note: for electronic hearings the Notice must also contain a statement that the applicant should notify the Authority if they believe holding the hearing electronically is likely to cause them significant prejudice. The Authority shall assume the applicant has no objection to the electronic hearing if no such notification is received.

- (c) Particulars to identify the applicant, property and the nature of the application which are the subject of the hearing.

Note: If the applicant is not the landowner but the prospective owner, the applicant must

have written authorization from the registered landowner.

- (d) The reasons for the proposed refusal or conditions of approval shall be specifically stated. This should contain sufficient detail to enable the applicant to understand the issues so he or she can be adequately prepared for the hearing.

It is sufficient to reference in the Notice of Hearing that the recommendation for refusal or conditions of approval is based on the reasons outlined in previous correspondence or a hearing report that will follow.

- (e) A statement notifying the applicant that the hearing may proceed in the applicant's absence and that the applicant will not be entitled to any further notice of the proceedings.

Except in extreme circumstances, it is recommended that the hearing not proceed in the absence of the applicant.

- (f) Reminder that the applicant is entitled to be represented at the hearing by counsel, if desired.

It is recommended that the Notice of Hearing be directed to the applicant and/or landowner by registered mail. Please refer to **Appendix A** for an example Notice of Hearing.

2.4 Presubmission of Reports

If it is the practice of the local Conservation Authority to submit reports to the Board members in advance of the hearing (i.e., inclusion on an Authority/Executive Committee agenda), the applicant shall be provided with the same opportunity. The applicant shall be given two weeks to prepare a report once the reasons for the staff recommendations have been received. Subsequently, this may affect the timing and scheduling of the staff hearing reports.

2.5 Hearing Information

Prior to the hearing, the applicant shall be advised of the local Conservation Authority's hearing procedures upon request.

3.0 HEARING

3.1 Public Hearing

Pursuant to the Statutory Powers Procedure Act, hearings, including electronic hearings, are required to be held in public. For electronic hearings, public attendance should be synchronous

with the hearing. The exception is in very rare cases where public interest in public hearings is outweighed by the fact that intimate financial, personal or other matters would be disclosed at hearings.

3.2 Hearing Participants

The Conservation Authorities Act does not provide for third party status at the local hearing. While others may be advised of the local hearing, any information that they provide should be incorporated within the presentation of information by, or on behalf of, the applicant or Authority staff.

3.3 Attendance of Hearing Board Members

In accordance with case law relating to the conduct of hearings, those members of the Authority who will decide whether to grant or refuse the application must be present during the full course of the hearing. If it is necessary for a member to leave, the hearing must be adjourned and resumed when either the member returns or if the hearing proceeds, even in the event of an adjournment, only those members who were present after the member left can sit to the conclusion of the hearing.

3.4 Adjournments

The Board may adjourn a hearing on its own motion or that of the applicant or Authority staff where it is satisfied that an adjournment is necessary for an adequate hearing to be held.

Any adjournments form part of the hearing record.

3.5 Orders and Directions

The Authority is entitled to make orders or directions to maintain order and prevent the abuse of its hearing processes. A hearing procedures example has been included as **Appendix B**.

3.6 Information Presented at Hearings

- (a) The Statutory Powers Procedure Act, requires that a witness be informed of his right to object pursuant to the Canada Evidence Act. The Canada Evidence Act indicates that a witness shall be excused from answering questions on the basis that the answer may be incriminating. Further, answers provided during the hearing are not admissible against

the witness in any criminal trial or proceeding. This information should be provided to the applicant as part of the Notice of Hearing.

- (b) It is the decision of the hearing members as to whether information is presented under oath or affirmation. It is not a legal requirement. The applicant must be informed of the above, prior to or at the start of the hearing.
- (c) The Board may authorize receiving a copy rather than the original document. However, the Board can request certified copies of the document if required.
- (d) Privileged information, such as solicitor/client correspondence, cannot be heard. Information that is not directly within the knowledge of the speaker (hearsay), if relevant to the issues of the hearing, can be heard.
- (e) The Board may take into account matters of common knowledge such as geographic or historic facts, times measures, weights, etc or generally recognized scientific or technical facts, information or opinions within its specialized knowledge without hearing specific information to establish their truth.

3.7 Conduct of Hearing

3.7.1 Record of Attending Hearing Board Members

A record shall be made of the members of the Hearing Board.

3.7.2 Opening Remarks

The Chairperson shall convene the hearing with opening remarks which generally; identify the applicant, the nature of the application, and the property location; outline the hearing procedures; and advise on requirements of the Canada Evidence Act. Please reference **Appendix C** for the Opening Remarks model. **In an electronic hearing, all the parties and the members of the Hearing Board must be able to clearly hear one another and any witnesses throughout the hearing.**

3.7.3 Presentation of Authority Staff Information

Staff of the Authority presents the reasons supporting the recommendation for the refusal or conditions of approval of the application. Any reports, documents or plans that form part of the presentation shall be properly indexed and received.

Staff of the Authority should not submit new information at the hearing as the applicant will not have had time to review and provide a professional opinion to the Hearing Board.

Consideration should be given to the designation of one staff member or legal counsel who

coordinates the presentation of information on behalf of Authority staff and who asks questions on behalf of Authority staff.

3.7.4 Presentation of Applicant Information

The applicant has the opportunity to present information at the conclusion of the Authority staff presentation. Any reports, documents or plans which form part of the submission should be properly indexed and received.

The applicant shall present information as it applies to the permit application in question. For instance, does the requested activity affect the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beach or conservation of land or pollution? The hearing does not address the merits of the activity or appropriateness of such a use in terms of planning.

- The applicant may be represented by legal counsel or agent, if desired
- The applicant may present information to the Board and/or have invited advisors to present information to the Board
- The applicant(s) presentation may include technical witnesses, such as an engineer, ecologist, hydrogeologist etc.

The applicant should not submit new information at the hearing as the Staff of the Authority will not have had time to review and provide a professional opinion to the Hearing Board.

3.7.5 Questions

Members of the Hearing Board may direct questions to each speaker as the information is being heard. The applicant and /or agent can make any comments or questions on the staff report.

Pursuant to the Statutory Powers Procedure Act, the Board can limit questioning where it is satisfied that there has been full and fair disclosure of the facts presented. Please note that the courts have been particularly sensitive to the issue of limiting questions and there is a tendency to allow limiting of questions only where it has clearly gone beyond reasonable or proper bounds.

3.7.6 Deliberation

After all the information is presented, the Board may adjourn the hearing and retire in private to confer. The Board may reconvene on the same date or at some later date to advise of the Board's decision. The Board members shall not discuss the hearing with others prior to the decision of the Board being finalized.

4.0. DECISION

The applicant must receive written notice of the decision. The applicant shall be informed of the

right to appeal the decision within 30 days upon receipt of the written decision to the **Mining and Lands Tribunal**.

It is important that the hearing participants have a clear understanding of why the application was refused or approved. The Board shall itemize and record information of particular significance which led to their decision.

4.1 Notice of Decision

The decision notice should include the following information:

- (a) The identification of the applicant, property and the nature of the application that was the subject of the hearing.
- (b) The decision to refuse or approve the application. A copy of the Hearing Board resolution should be attached.

It is recommended that the written Notice of Decision be forwarded to the applicant by registered mail. A sample Notice of Decision and cover letter has been included as **Appendix D**.

4.2 Adoption

A resolution advising of the Board's decision and particulars of the decision should be adopted.

5.0 RECORD

The Authority shall compile a record of the hearing. In the event of an appeal, a copy of the record should be forwarded to the **Mining and Lands Tribunal**. The record must include the following:

- (a) The application for the permit.
- (b) The Notice of Hearing.
- (c) Any orders made by the Board (e.g., for adjournments).
- (d) All information received by the Board.
- (e) The minutes of the meeting made at the hearing.
- (f) The decision and reasons for decisions of the Board.
- (g) The Notice of Decision sent to the applicant.

HEARING PROCEDURES

1. Motion to sit as Hearing Board.
2. Roll Call followed by the Chairperson's opening remarks. For electronic hearings, the Chairperson shall ensure that all parties and the Hearing Board are able to clearly hear one another and any witnesses throughout the hearing.
3. Staff will introduce to the Hearing Board the applicant/owner, his/her agent and others wishing to speak.
4. Staff will indicate the nature and location of the subject application and the conclusions.
5. Staff will present the staff report included in the Authority/Executive Committee agenda.
6. The applicant and/or their agent will present their material
7. Staff and/or the conservation authority's agent may question the applicant and/or their agent if reasonably required for a full and fair disclosure of matters presented at the Hearing.¹
8. The applicant and/or their agent may question the conservation authority staff and/or their agent if reasonably required for full and fair disclosure of matters presented at the Hearing.²
9. The Hearing Board will question, if necessary, both the staff and the applicant/agent.
10. The Hearing Board will move into camera. For electronic meetings, the Hearing Board will separate from other participants for deliberation.
11. Members of the Hearing Board will move and second a motion.
12. A motion will be carried which will culminate in the decision.
13. The Hearing Board will move out of camera.
14. The Chairperson or Acting Chairperson will advise the owner/applicant of the Hearing

Board decision.

15. If decision is "to refuse", the Chairperson or Acting Chairperson shall notify the owner/applicant of his/her right to appeal the decision to the Mining and Lands Tribunal within 30 days of receipt of the reasons for the decision.
16. Motion to move out of Hearing Board and sit as Executive Committee.

Appendix C

CHAIRPERSON'S REMARKS WHEN DEALING WITH HEARINGS WITH RESPECT TO ONTARIO REGULATION ___/06

We are now going to conduct a hearing under section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act in respect of an application by _____: , for permission to:_____

The Authority has adopted regulations under section 28 of the Conservation Authorities Act which requires the permission of the Authority for development within an area regulated by the Authority in order to ensure no adverse affect on (the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or conservation of land) or to permit alteration to a shoreline or watercourse or interference with a wetland.

The Staff has reviewed this proposed work and prepared a staff report, a copy of which has been given to the applicant and the Board. The applicant was invited to file material in response to the staff report, a copy of which has also been provided to the Board.

Under Section 28 (12) of the Conservation Authorities Act, the person requesting permission has the right to a hearing before the Authority/Executive Committee.

In holding this hearing, the Authority Board/Executive Committee is to determine whether or not a permit is to be issued, with or without conditions. In doing so, we can only consider the application in the form that is before us, the staff report, such evidence as may be given and the submissions to be made on behalf of the applicant. Only Information disclosed prior to the hearing is to be presented at the hearing.

The proceedings will be conducted according to the Statutory Powers Procedure Act. Under Section 5 of the Canada Evidence Act, a witness may refuse to answer any question on the ground that the answer may tend to incriminate the person, or may tend to establish his/her liability to a civil proceeding at the instance of the Crown or of any person.

The procedure in general shall be informal without the evidence before it being given under oath or affirmation unless decided by the hearing members.

If the applicant has any questions to ask of the Hearing Board or of the Authority representative, they must be directed to the Chairperson of the board.

Conservation Authorities Act, R.S.O. 1990, CHAPTER C.27

EXCERPT OF SECTION 28.0.1

Permission for development, zoning order

28.0.1 (1) This section applies to any application submitted to an authority under a regulation made under subsection 28 (1) for permission to carry out all or part of a development project in the authority's area of jurisdiction if,

- (a) a zoning order has been made by the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing under section 47 of the *Planning Act* authorizing the development project under that Act;
- (b) the lands in the authority's area of jurisdiction on which the development project is to be carried out are not located in the Greenbelt Area designated under section 2 of the *Greenbelt Act, 2005*; and
- (c) such other requirements as may be prescribed are satisfied. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Definition

(2) In this section,

"development project" means a development project that includes any development as defined in subsection 28 (25) or any other act or activity that would be prohibited under this Act and the regulations unless permission to carry out the activity is granted by the affected authority. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Permission to be granted

(3) Subject to the regulations made under subsection (35), an authority that receives an application for permission to carry out all or part of a development project in the authority's area of jurisdiction shall grant the permission if all of the requirements in clauses (1) (a), (b) and (c) are satisfied. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Same

(4) For greater certainty, an authority shall not refuse to grant permission for a development project under subsection (3) despite,

- (a) anything in section 28 or in a regulation made under section 28; and
- (b) anything in subsection 3 (5) of the *Planning Act*. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Conditions prescribed by regulations

(5) A permission granted under this section is subject to such conditions as may be prescribed. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Conditions specified by authority

(6) Subject to subsection (7), an authority may attach conditions to the permission, including conditions to mitigate,

- (a) any effects the development project is likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land;
- (b) any conditions or circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property; or
- (c) any other matters that may be prescribed by regulation. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Hearing

(7) An authority shall not attach conditions to a permission unless the applicant for the permission has been given an opportunity to be heard by the authority. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Reasons for conditions

(8) If, after holding a hearing, an authority grants the permission subject to conditions, the authority shall give the holder of the permission written reasons for deciding to attach the conditions. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Request for Minister's review

(9) The holder of a permission who objects to the conditions proposed in the reasons given under subsection (8) may, within 15 days of the reasons being given, submit a request to the Minister for the Minister to review the proposed conditions, subject to the regulations. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Minister's review

(10) Within 30 days after receiving a request under subsection (9), the Minister shall reply to the request and indicate in writing to the holder of the permission and the authority whether or not the Minister intends to conduct a review of the authority's decision. Failure on the part of the Minister to reply to a request within the 30-day period is deemed to be an indication that the Minister does not intend to review the authority's decision. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Same

(11) If a reply given under subsection (10) indicates that the Minister intends to conduct a review, the Minister may in the reply require the holder of the permission and the authority to provide the Minister with such information as the Minister considers necessary to conduct the review. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Information

(12) The holder of the permission and the authority shall submit to the Minister such information as was specified in the reply given under subsection (10) within the time period specified in the reply. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Publication of notice of review

(13) The Minister shall publish on the Environmental Registry notice of the Minister's intention to review a decision made by an authority and shall do so within 30 days of giving a reply to that effect under subsection (10). 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

No hearing required

(14) The Minister is not required to hold a hearing while conducting a review of an authority's decision. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Conferring with persons, etc.

(15) Before making a decision with respect to a review, the Minister may confer with any person or body that the Minister considers may have an interest in the review. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Minister's decision

(16) After conducting a review of an authority's decision, the Minister may confirm or vary the conditions that the authority proposes to attach to a permission granted under this section, including removing conditions or requiring that such additional conditions be attached to the permission as the Minister considers appropriate. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Same

- (17) In making a decision under subsection (16), the Minister shall consider,
- (a) effects the development project is likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land;
 - (b) conditions or circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property; or
 - (c) any other matters as may be prescribed by the regulations. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Decision final

(18) A decision made by the Minister under subsection (16) is final. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Appeal

(19) The holder of a permission who objects to the conditions proposed by an authority in the reasons given under subsection (8) may, within 90 days of the reasons being issued, appeal to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal to review the conditions if,

- (a) the holder of the permission has not submitted a request to the Minister to review the conditions under subsection (9); or
- (b) the holder of the permission has submitted a request to the Minister to review the conditions under subsection (9) and,
 - (i) 30 days have elapsed following the day the holder of the permission submitted the request and the Minister did not make a reply in accordance with subsection (10), or
 - (ii) the Minister made a reply in accordance with subsection (10) indicating that the Minister refused to conduct the review. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Same

(20) If the Minister indicates in a reply given under subsection (10) that the Minister intends to review an authority's decision and the Minister fails to make a decision within 90 days of giving the reply, the holder of the permission may, within the next 30 days, appeal the conditions proposed by the authority directly to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Notice of appeal

(21) Notice of an appeal under subsection (19) or (20) shall be sent to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal and to the authority by registered mail. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Hearing by Tribunal

(22) The Local Planning Appeal Tribunal shall fix a date for a hearing of an appeal under subsection (19) or (20), give notice to all interested parties and give all necessary direction for the hearing. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Powers of the Tribunal

(23) The Local Planning Appeal Tribunal has authority to hear evidence and to confirm, vary, remove or add to the conditions attached to the permission as the Tribunal considers appropriate. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Agreement

(24) An authority that grants permission for a development project under this section shall enter into an agreement with respect to the development project with the holder of the permission and the authority and holder of the permission may agree to add a municipality or such other person or entity as they consider appropriate as parties to the agreement. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Content of agreement

(25) An agreement under subsection (24) shall set out actions or requirements that the holder of the permission must complete or satisfy in order to compensate for ecological impacts and any other impacts that may result from the development project. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Limitation on development

(26) No person shall begin a development project until an agreement required under subsection (24) has been entered into. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Period of validity of permission and extension

(27) A permission granted by an authority under this section may be granted for a period of time determined in accordance with the rules that apply to permissions granted by authority under a regulation made under subsection 28 (1) and may be extended in accordance with the rules for extending permission set out in those same regulations. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Offence

(28) A person is guilty of an offence if the person contravenes,

- (a) a condition of a permission granted under this section; or
- (b) subsection (26). 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Penalty

(29) A person who commits an offence under subsection (28) is liable on conviction,

- (a) in the case of an individual,
 - (i) to a fine of not more than \$50,000 or to a term of imprisonment of not more than three months, or to both, and
 - (ii) to an additional fine of not more than \$10,000 for each day or part of a day on which the offence occurs or continues; and
- (b) in the case of a corporation,
 - (i) to a fine of not more than \$1,000,000, and
 - (ii) to an additional fine of not more than \$200,000 for each day or part of a day on which the offence occurs or continues. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Monetary benefit

(30) Despite the maximum fines set out in clauses (29) (a) and (b), a court that convicts a person of an offence under subsection (28) may increase the fine it imposes on the person by an amount equal to the amount of the monetary benefit that was acquired by the person, or that accrued to the person, as a result of the commission of the offence. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Rehabilitation orders

(31) In addition to any penalty under subsection (29) or any other remedy or penalty provided by law, the court, upon convicting a person of an offence under subsection (28), may order the convicted person to,

- (a) remove, at the convicted person's expense, any development within such reasonable time as the court orders; and
- (b) take such actions as the court directs, within the time the court may specify, to repair or rehabilitate the damage that results from or is in any way connected to the commission of the offence. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Non-compliance with order

(32) If a person does not comply with an order under subsection (31), the authority that issued the permission under this section may arrange for any removal, repair or rehabilitation that was required in the order. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Liability for certain costs

(33) The person to whom an order is made under subsection (31) is liable for the cost of any removal, repair or rehabilitation arranged by an authority under subsection (32), and the amount is recoverable by the authority by action in a court of competent jurisdiction. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Conflict

(34) If the conditions in a permission granted under this section conflict with the terms of a zoning order made under section 47 of the *Planning Act*, the terms of the zoning order shall prevail. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Regulations, Minister

(35) The Minister may make regulations,

- (a) prescribing requirements for the purposes of clause (1) (c);
- (b) governing permissions granted under this section including,
 - (i) requiring that the permission be granted within a specified time period after the application is submitted to the authority,
 - (ii) prescribing conditions for the purposes of subsection (5), and
 - (iii) prescribing matters for the purposes of clause (6) (c);
- (c) prescribing matters for the purposes of clause (17) (c);
- (d) governing agreements required under subsection (24) including,
 - (i) prescribing the content of the agreements, and
 - (ii) specifying the time within which agreements are to be concluded and signed;
- (e) exempting lands or development projects from this section or from a part of this section or the regulations made under this section, including from the requirement to enter into an agreement under subsection (24) or from including any provision of an agreement that is prescribed by a regulation under clause (d);
- (f) respecting anything that is necessary or advisable for the effective implementation or enforcement of this section. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Regulations, Lieutenant-Governor in Council

(36) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may make regulations governing Minister's reviews requested under subsection (9) and appeals under subsections (19) and (20) and specifying circumstances in which a review may not be requested or an appeal may not be made. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

General or particular

(37) A regulation made under subsection (35) or (36) may be general or particular in its application. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

Transition

(38) This section applies to an application for permission to carry out a development project that was submitted to an authority before the day this section came into force if the conditions described in clauses (1) (a), (b) and (c) have been satisfied as of that day. 2020, c. 36, Sched. 6, s. 15 (1).

WHEREAS Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. has applied for permission under O. Reg. 166/06 and Section 28.0.1 of the Conservation Authorities Act for development and interference with a wetland to bring in an unknown quantity of fill and grade to ultimately remove the Provincially Significant Wetland and other upland habitat located at 1802 Bayly Street;

AND WHEREAS Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development on March 12, 2021, in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21;

AND WHEREAS the applicant has raised concerns with potential conditions that may be placed on their application and requested a hearing before TRCA's Board of Directors, which is taking place on March 12, 2021, to meet the legally mandated Provincial deadline;

AND WHEREAS the only authorized power that TRCA's Board of Directors has at their discretion is the ability to add conditions to the permission;

Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) provide this submission to TRCA's Board of Directors and the applicant to ensure that public input be included in the hearing record.

Background and Context

Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) are co-applicants seeking approvals under the Planning Act for lands located at 221 Church Street South in the Town of Ajax, between Highway 401 and Bayly Street within the Lower Duffins Creek Subwatershed, Regional Municipality of Durham.

Recently, Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) filed an application under the Planning Act that was approved by Town of Ajax Council to re-zone a portion of the lands at 221 Church Street South from Golf Facility (GF) to Prestige Employment (PE). An objective of this exercise included confirmation of the appropriate limit of Environmental Protection (EP) zoning for

the subject lands using a constraints trace overlay method and establishing appropriate buffers and setbacks in accordance with the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS, 2020), TRCA's "The Living City Policies for Planning and Development in the Watersheds of the TRCA"(2014), applicable environmental protection policies of the Town of Ajax and the provincial Endangered Species Act, 2007.

As demonstrated through an Environmental Impact Study prepared in accordance with the Town of Ajax and TRCA EIS guidelines and as accepted by senior representatives from TRCA, and Town of Ajax staff and members of Council, the features and functions on this landscape of most importance (forest, creeks, floodplain, and Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) communities) within the 221 Church Street South property were delineated and appropriate vegetation protection zones applied so as to incorporate and maintain these features on the landscape, behind the limit of development. In doing so, appropriate setbacks have been applied to the staked top of bank / long term stable slope crest and the floodline and vegetation protection zones (VPZ) have been applied to the candidate ANSI and Provincially Significant Wetland and woodland communities and are retained in the Plan through Environmental Protection (EP) zoning designation.

Position

Having recently undertaken the appropriate planning, design and environmental studies to support our recent application at 221 Church Street South in the Town of Ajax, and having conducted proactive and meaningful consultation with Town of Ajax and TRCA staff, so as to create an application and land use proposal in accordance with the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS, 2020), TRCA's "The Living City Policies for Planning and Development in the Watersheds of the TRCA"(2014), applicable environmental protection policies of the Town of Ajax and the provincial Endangered Species Act, 2007, it is the position of Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) that: the same duty of care for the conservation of land including "all aspects of the physical environment be it terrestrial, aquatic, biological, botanic or air and the relationship between them" (611428 Ontario Limited vs. MTRCA, CA 007-92, February 11, 1994 p.38) be applied equally to every land use application in the province of Ontario so as to justly and fairly provide a level playing field for all land developers, maintain predictable land valuation in the GTA and ensure the protection of features of provincial significance, especially provincially significant wetlands, for generations to come as has been the norm in the province for more than 25 years.

Recommended Conditions

WHEREAS The property includes key natural heritage features and key hydrological features including a Provincially Significant Wetland and Significant Wildlife Habitat together with other potential features which may be present but have yet to be confirmed including Significant Woodland and Endangered Species habitat;

AND WHEREAS the Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) is predominately a winterberry organic swamp community (rare in Durham Region and along the north shore of Lake Ontario) of the Lower Duffins Creek PSW Complex which includes continuous hydrological and or hydrogeological connection to a portion of the PSW complex off-site;

AND WHEREAS it has been documented that the property includes species considered Rare and Uncommon to Durham Region and those of regional concern to TRCA;

AND WHEREAS other faunal and ecological functions have been documented on-site including breeding birds, usage by amphibians, and small to large rural and urban mammals and the subject property is in close proximity to other natural systems for migration connectivity by fauna to occur;

AND WHEREAS stormwater and possibly groundwater (dewatering) will be generated within the property and require management, including discharge to Duffins Creek in the Town of Ajax during spring spate and major storm events;

Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) request the following conditions be included by TRCA's Board of Directors as part of the Conditions provided in their permission for development and interference with a wetland at 1802 Bayly Street in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21.

The purpose of the conditions is an attempt to mitigate any negative effects the works are likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, pollution or the conservation of land; and any conditions or circumstances created by the filling of the site or generation and release of stormwater that might result in the damage or destruction of property or affect the use or enjoyment of adjacent lands or interfere with the viability of future land use proposals on such lands.

Our recommended conditions and rationale are as follows:

1. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall identify and convey to TRCA or public trust additional privately owned lands or fund the purchase of, and convey same in order to effect the appropriate wetland compensation to achieve the remaining approximately 14 to 16 ha of wetland restoration that TRCA staff have identified as being required to adequately compensate for the removal of the subject wetland at 1802 Bayly Street.***

Recreating wetland at a 1:1 ratio as has been proposed, should at the very least be required. Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) are proponents of an active land use development application on adjacent lands containing portions of the same Duffins Creek PSW Complex and have delineated each wetland unit within their property, applied requisite and appropriate vegetation protection zones to these and all other features of provincial and municipal natural heritage significance so as to incorporate and maintain these features on the landscape, behind the limit of development.

While removal of approximately 19 ha organic winterberry swamp within a Provincially Significant Wetland - a very rare wetland community type in Durham Region and along the north shore of Lake Ontario - to accommodate land development should not be permitted, it is understood that Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21.

2. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall agree to recreating wetland to replace lost ecosystem services at the same hydrogeomorphic position in the watershed so as demonstrably achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services both in terms of land area and ecological functions to the satisfaction of TRCA based on their expertise.***

Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) are proponents of an active land use development application on adjacent lands containing portions of the same Duffins Creek PSW Complex and have delineated each wetland unit within their property, applied requisite and appropriate vegetation protection zones to these and all other features of provincial and municipal natural heritage significance so as to incorporate and maintain these features on the landscape, behind the limit of development.

The proposal to recreate wetland at a 1:1 ratio in rural headwater lands cannot achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services to off-set and replicate lost ecosystem services. Wetland replacement should be required at a similar hydrogeomorphic position in the watershed.

3. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment for restoration costs to TRCA in the amount determined by TRCA Ecology staff to implement***

the ecosystem structure compensation plan and achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services.

Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) are proponents of an active land use development application on adjacent lands containing portions of the same Duffins Creek PSW Complex and have delineated each wetland unit within their property, applied requisite and appropriate vegetation protection zones to these and all other features of provincial and municipal natural heritage significance so as to incorporate and maintain these features on the landscape, behind the limit of development.

4. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide revised stormwater management report and monitoring plans to TRCA's satisfaction prior to the Permit Holder's works commencing.***

It is also important in the absence of municipal stormwater approvals (in this case), that the interim and final stormwater management scheme for the proposed development confirms that the site will not result in flooding on adjacent properties and encourages maintaining the existing conditions water balance and downstream sediment loadings.

As it is understood that a major storm sewer pipe and outfall may need to be installed along the Bayly Street right-of way to address flows in post development conditions and enable stormwater discharge to Duffins Creek in the Town of Ajax, this condition is of particular importance to Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) to ensure that future stormwater control and discharge from 1802 Bayly Street in no way affects lands (flooding, erosion, or pollution) located at 221 Church Street South or the proposed stormwater management plan and related location, quality or quantity of stormwater discharge proposed from these lands.

5. ***Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a copy of any permit or other regulatory instrument required under the Endangered Species Act from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works, or shall provide confirmation from the MECP that no such permit or other regulatory instrument is necessary.***

The Planning Act, through the PPS 2020, requires protection of threatened and endangered species and their habitat in accordance with the provincial Endangered Species Act, 2007. TRCA is a public commenting body under the Planning Act and a service provider of technical environmental advice to municipal approval authorities.

This condition is required to provide a level playing field for all land developers, maintain predictable land valuation in the GTA and ensure the protection of features at risk species, for generations to come.

6. ***Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide and make public all supporting data, documentation and studies provided to the planning and regulatory authorities as part of any land use planning or regulatory approval applications made in relation to the proposed development.***

In summary, it is the position of Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint Acquisition Corporation (Crestpoint) that the same duty of care for the conservation of land be applied equally to every land use application in the province of Ontario so as to justly and fairly provide a level playing field for all land developers. On this basis, Annandale Park Developments Limited and Crestpoint recommends that the conditions described in this letter be applied by the TRCA as preconditions to development on the Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) located at 1802 Bayly Street, in the City of

Pickering. These will help partially mitigate the negative and irreversible ecological impacts of this development on the surrounding community and neighbouring landowners

I am a resident of Peel Region, a member of Sierra Club Ontario - Peel Group, and a citizen member of the Toronto Region Watershed Alliance.

Thank you for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed. As you know, we have lost over 80% of wetlands in southern Ontario, including the loss of invaluable ecological services they provide. There are many more suitable places for urban development.

However since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I offer the following comments on the conditions of development: The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.

The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 (from the 'notch' wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Road) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and the remainder must be identified before construction begins.

The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regional, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction begins.

An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.

The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment.

The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.

Wetlands are the filters that manage and clean our waterways and provide invaluable ecological services that benefit our health and the health of wildlife that depend on them.

No amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland.

I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

As a result, I thank you for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetlands. I believe this Wetland should never be developed; however, political circumstances now compel you to give permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I realize that that feedback can only be offered regarding conditions of development.

I offer the following comments:

- 1) It is critical that First Nations be consulted on this development. Therefore, the TRCA and the Province must enter into honest consultation with the William Treaty First Nations.
- 2) In good faith, the Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetlands that will be destroyed by this development. The presently proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and the remaining ha must be identified before any construction begins.
- 3) Restoration must require the Developer to hire a qualified ecologist to direct transplantation and careful relocation of all regional, local and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before construction can begin.
- 4) Further, there should be an independent review of the Compensation Agreement commissioned by the TRCA to be carried out by qualified ecologists to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The cost of this review by the ecologists must be covered by the Permit Holder.
- 5) To fully protect the integrity of the property, the Developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA Erosion Settlement Control Guidelines, and the Stormwater Management Criteria. Also, prior to any fill being placed on the property, a qualified professional must certify that the fill does not contain any contaminant that would do harm to the environment.
- 6) Further, the Developer must create a stormwater management plan that meets and, hopefully, exceeds the TRCA present stormwater management criteria.

As already mentioned, I have always valued the critical contribution wetland make to any ecosystem. Too many wetlands are being threatened, depleting the environmental needs of Toronto. No amount of money, nor restoration, can ever truly compensate for the loss of habitat and species depending on that habitat. Our awareness now of the interdependence of all creation underlines the reality that any loss has consequences beyond our imagining.

Firstly, I hope (absolutely) everyone is safe & well, and can have access to their livelihood needs while navigating through this pandemic without facing any incremental risks. Thank you for reading this email,

This is in regards to the 40 Ministerial Zoning Orders, including the potential developments that would occur on the protected wetlands in Pickering.

The concerns to the haste & impulsiveness in receiving these zoning orders, specifically with the natures of how these development relationships have been formed (by political donors, with litigative friction inter-politically, etc.), gives the intuition that carefulness & mutuality will not be exercised with managing the carbon & aeranation cycles necessary to continue reducing as much pollutants that are present in our atmosphere. As well as supporting the current flow of economic exchanges that occur due to the reliance of animal behaviours, forest-settled rejuvenators, environmentally-enabled resourcing, etc. I do not believe, and there are several indicators for this[1], that there will be proper consultation & implementations which offer the care towards the environmental symbiosis that Ontario champions and has the ability to expand on (more sustainably than the current approach). We are choosing the more destructive priority which is to urbanize & industrially modernize, while inconveniently expediting the planning, managing, controlling, and execution to accommodate & facilitate for the stakeholder relationships that heavily require inclusion of our "organically wildering communities". It is strongly believed, and commonly provable[2], that the developments, with these themes, will lead to net compromisers of what has to be preserved for human qualities of protectiveness (to define our capacity to accomodate, especially towards complex synergies), as well as livability (ie. reduction of human risks, non-impeding housing/community projects).

Understandably, it is important to have population control and it can be appreciated when collaborations are made from successful construction projects. I do not deny these, please understand that there are civilians very willing to advocate the pursuits of these but with expectations of better mandates to reduce emissions immediately and with longevity, non-transparency, wellbeing insecurities, and business hostilities. Though I worry how much exploitation will be amplified on the proliferated benefits of construction investments, and the priorities to cater to perceived supply & demand in order to drown the woes of aware civilians, with the sense of accommodations that could have more options of manageability than through the current decisions made.

We will face infrastructural instabilities, biodiversity shrinkage, increased human group conflicts, and accountability difficulties whenever potential matters listed are triggered. These challenges could be elevation changes, incidental damages, traffic congestion, litigative inclinations, wildlife scarcity (one or multiple), diminishment of clean resources, improper

disposal, underground destabilization, unconscientious job commitments (exercising enforcement or duties that are catered to contracts/responsibilities to inhibit land protection/preservation; also includes the possible volatility of activism movements), and/or business inappropriations,

Incidentally (and abrasively stated), it is very predictable that the political donations which fuel these decisions may flow more towards income growth than the insurance of environmental investment protections. It would be remarkable if 100% of these political donations and the segments of budgeting for the developments cater sufficiently to the exchange that will occur to the compromise and decline of naturally organic interoperations that occur in our wetlands (ie. in such ways where it's as if would not experience ANY environmental loss/reductions at all). Furthermore, it will be behaviourally obvious that we will receive spoken promises and statistically skewed/bias assurances to the importance of these cash flows administered. When, through further investigations, it would be revealed that the attempt to assuredly comfort not meet the genuine calamities that have plagued the divisive disruptions (to the common arguments of climate change) which put long-term strains on human living conditions whenever our forestry habitats reduce and pollutant outputs/risks increase.

Some of my arguments cannot be effective in my plea, but these are the complexities that we need to be conscious of. Does that make sense? We will face the loss of genuinely tranquilizing areas of our tourism, of our serenity to grander inter-relationships, of our passive (and active) reliance to the natural order, for our micro sustainabilities (which offers us production materials at scales that several businesses thrive from with less emission ratios than what these developments may cause us to experience.) Any flaw in the development that decreases environmental output of clean air and functioning resources will be an additional cost the our growing generations and newer ones will have to repair. The process of repair will include investigating our past; and the inevitable/repetitive avoidance in admission from private business & public bodies will prolong the integration of human minds that can be invested better on innovative housing, business, & ecological support which is very uncertain while these developments are pursued. Especially if any health condition trends begin to rise over time (because the natural order shrunk with instability and cannot aid our wellbeing & resilience due to our lack of protection/maintenance).

Will they plant the seedlings for every tree & acreage field that falls to match the photosynthetic cycles that have existed before these MZO's?

If so, when will this be? What revitalization projects have been invested on with this much confidence within their affiliations?

Alternatively, What are some renewable implementations that would be applied in these areas through these development plans (either with these approvals, or different ones)
Will they flow natural water & animal routes in areas that can be as compatible as these areas that will be destroyed?

If so, what would the transition costs be? If not, what types of losses will we face? Can they have a dialogue for those realizations?

Why did we lose the "red tape" to appeal? Why is this viewed as unnecessary or far too extensive to mandate as procedural consideration for succinct planning & accommodation-al re-iterativity. Aren't these macro in scale to accept that more voices need to be heard? (Especially from experts & relevant scrutinizers that are the members of eco-advocation; economic & ecologic.)

Do they have contingency plans for what the younger generations could face, and have solutions to overcome such possible challenges? Clearly this could be a sign of inclusivity and care, but what sorts of potential vulnerabilities/threats have been planned for, realized, expected, and/or incurred on?

These businesses can prosper with having to face the many revisions in order to maintain the wetlands and scale properly for feasible & suppleable to approach the targeted customers without eventual deterrents. They can find the optimal compromises, and this clearly is not one of them. It is obviously unagreeable if members have departed affiliations for the main statement that they are dismayed with the magnitude of wrongness that is being implemented by our provincial government "on behalf of" its citizens. If this "railroad of approvals" happens, then the culture of neglect that has been persistent will overwhelm the consciousness of structural controls to our lands: and unfortunately we will further become more conscious of what is uncontrolled.

Please reevaluate these decisions, halt the availability to destroy these lands. Revitalize consultation volumes to enrich the best and optimal expansionary outcomes for all of us. It is there, anybody that cares, and has taken the pathways to find out sustainable approaches, will know that there are areas coinciding with wetlands that have certain scales to architecturally settle human civilization while interacting more calibrated-ly with natural ecosystems.

I am writing this letter to voice my concerns and provide input on the Staff Report conditions for the development on the Duffins Creek Provincially Significant Wetland Complex in anticipation of the TRCA's Board of Directors Hearing on Friday March 12, 2012. There has been inadequate consultation with necessary groups, and an inadequate accounting of the monetary value of the ecosystem functions and services this wetland provides. This process has so far been inadequate in consulting the necessary people who should be involved in this, including indigenous peoples and environmental experts, including scientists and environmental economists. The Williams Treaty First Nation have voiced their opposition to the MZO, and the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry has not provided written confirmation that this group has been adequately consulted. Similarly, there are concerns that the environmental impact assessment was incomplete, so an arms-length scientific review of this assessment and the resultant conclusions is warranted. Consulting with indigenous groups, scientists, and environmental economists must happen to adequately inform the terms of compensation in order to receive TRCA approval.

Duffins Creek Wetland is a provincially significant wetland, and financial compensation should reflect this fact. It is not enough to compensate for ecosystem area loss, but also for loss of functional ecosystem services and the currently proposed financial compensation seems incredibly undervalued. Wetlands are vital to ecosystem functioning, providing services that would be prohibitively expensive to replicate or replace. This wetland serves to prevent and mitigate flooding and sediment erosion, retain nutrients, provide habitat to a variety of plants and animals, including habitat for fish and migratory birds. This wetland could also be used for recreation enjoyment and generally aesthetic green spaces. This provincially important wetland provides ecosystem services for free, saving taxpayers from having to pay for those same services. The cost to create artificial systems to approximate its function is easily in the tens of billions of dollars, and which would require investment in its upkeep. Destroying this wetland and creating a new wetland elsewhere would take decades for the created wetland to reach similar function. This hypothetical created wetland would not necessarily provide ecosystem services to this area, resulting in permanent loss of ecosystem services. Estimates of the services provided by the wetlands in southwestern Ontario are approximately \$14 billion dollars. In order for the developers to pay for restitution of the loss of this wetland, they would have to pay to compensate for the ecosystem services lost to development in perpetuity. The proposed compensation plan of \$4,426,216.41(or \$465/hectare) is shockingly low. A report by the MNRF in 2009 estimated wetlands were worth \$161,420/hectare (the equivalent of \$200,000/hectare in 2021). Considering the wetland's location and

the loss of ecosystem services if it is removed, the real cost to compensate for this wetland is easily around \$3,000,000/year for at least the next 20-50 years.

Thank you for considering my comments, and I hope these will help inform the TRCA meeting record.

These are the submissions of Environmental Defence in relation to the above-noted matter,

As a preliminary matter, these submissions are limited narrowly to the content of the *conditions* to be placed on the proposed permit because that is what the TRCA has directed.

Environmental Defence is of the view that the permit should not be issued *at all*. However, we recognize that Toronto Region Conservation Authority is being *compelled* to grant a permit no later than March 12th, 2021, even though the clear advice of staff is that granting the permit will cause serious environmental harm that cannot be compensated adequately even with the proposed conditions. Any permit that results from the present hearing will have been issued "under duress".

With this in mind, Environmental Defence supports the *general* approach that the TRCA is taking with respect to setting conditions for the permit. Because the province has excluded from consideration the only option which would *adequately* prevents or mitigates environmental harm (i.e., refusal), the TRCA is obliged to use its authority to set the *conditions* of the permit in a manner which limits and mitigates that damage to the maximum extent possible. None of the proposed conditions *exceed* the TRCA's authority, and none of them can be relaxed or removed without worsening the already unacceptable environmental harm that would be caused by issuing the permit.

However, Environmental Defence is very much concerned that present draft conditions are not *sufficiently strict* to satisfy the Toronto Region Conservation Authority's obligations, even taking into account the dangerous constraints that have been imposed upon it. They leave loopholes to be exploited, and, particularly in view of the staff reports, they do less than the TRCA can and should do within its authority to limit the environmental damage from this permit. As a consequence, Environmental Defence recommends that the proposed conditions be amended, and that certain additional conditions be added.

Recommended Amendments to Draft Special Conditions:

Special Condition 1:

This condition should be revised to prescribe that “no works shall take place prior to September 1, 2021, and all works shall take place between September 1, 2021 and March 25, 2022.

This condition is appropriate and necessary to prevent damage to nesting migratory birds in the 2022 season. However, the present wording leaves open the possibility of work preceding during the 2021 nesting season, and must be amended to remedy that. As there is no prospect of any even minimally-adequate set of conditions being completed in time for work to be commenced or completed *before* the start of the 2021 nesting season, the appropriate approach is to prescribe that no works take place until the 2021 nesting season has concluded.

Special Condition 2:

This condition should be maintained, but amended to require *also* that, prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain written confirmation from MNRF confirming expressly that the Ministry “has completely satisfied its duty to consult and to meaningfully accommodate all First Nations and indigenous nations whose asserted aboriginal and treaty rights pertain to 1802 Bayly Street or are otherwise affected by the subject matter of the Permit and Agreement”.

Special Condition 5:

This condition should be maintained, but amended both to establish that conveyance of all the lands referred to be a *condition precedent* to “execution of the Agreement” or the start of any works, *and* to require that construction of a replacement wetland equal or greater in area than the one to be destroyed be *completed* prior to the any works.

The revised Special Condition 5 should read as follows:

5. Prior to execution of the Agreement or to the start of any works, the Permit Holder shall

- (a) convey to TRCA lands in the Duffins and Carruthers Creek watershed legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING,
- (b) convey to TRCA sufficient lands suitable for wetland restoration that are not already part of the municipal natural heritage system, key natural heritage features or natural areas or equivalent as identified in an approved municipal plan or provincial plan required to accommodate ecosystem structure



compensation, as are required to replace the area and capacity of the present wetlands, and

- (c) demonstrate to the satisfaction of TRCA, that one the land referred to in (a) and (b) there have been created new wetlands with vegetation, hydrological properties, and connectedness to the Duffins Creek system that are similar to the wetland to be destroyed pursuant to the Permit and which are equal or greater in area than the wetland to be destroyed.

The TRCA staff report states expressly that the filling of the wetland "may have an impact on the control of flooding [or] health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property". Requiring the conveyance of land to construct a replacement wetland is one necessary element of mitigating that damage.

However, in order for this to be effective, logic dictates that replacement wetlands be sufficiently large to compensate at least for the *hydrological* problems created by filling the present wetland. Moreover, logic demands that those replacement wetlands, with their compensatory hydrological impacts, be in place *before* the capacity of the present wetland is removed from the system.

Further, the condition must be amended to take account of the difficulty in finding sufficient suitable land. The obligation of the applicant to obtain and to convey to the TRCA *sufficient* land to compensate for lost wetland capacity and area should not be limited by the amount of presently *undeveloped* land in the watershed. If insufficient undeveloped land is currently available, the applicant should be obliged to *make* sufficient land suitable for wetland restoration.

Special Condition 9:

This condition should be maintained, but the amount of compensation paid should be increased sufficiently to cover any additional costs associated with converting suitable "brown field" or developed land to wetlands, in the event that insufficient undeveloped land is available.

It is appropriate and necessary for the TRCA to require a cash payment equivalent to the present cost of constructing "replacement" wetlands which compensate *as much as possible* for the loss of the present wetland. However, Environmental Defence is concerned that the payment of \$4,426,216.41 is not sufficient to accomplish that. It is not apparent that there are sufficient undeveloped tracts of land remaining outside of existing municipal natural heritage system, key natural heritage features, natural areas or equivalent to replace the wetland capacity to be lost as a result of the development being permitted. The cost of restoring *developed* land is likely to be higher than estimated for undeveloped land.

Special Condition 10:

Environmental Defence requests that this condition be amended to require TRCA approval of the full site plan before any agreement is executed.



The condition should read:

10. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall submit, to the TRCA's satisfaction, the Site Plan for the proposed commercial development, including drawings, which shall form part of the Site Plan Application, which show the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan.

It is appropriate for the TRCA to require that the applicant be bound by TRCA-approved stormwater, erosion and sediment controls. However, in order to properly assess whether stormwater and erosion and sediment controls are sufficient for the commercial development, the TRCA must have and approve the rest of the final Site Plan for that development.

Special Condition 13:

It is appropriate for the TRCA to require that the applicant undertake of a transportation plan for regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities. However, the condition should be revised so that the plan is approved by the TRCA.

It should read as follows:

The Permit Holder shall prepare to the satisfaction of the TRCA, and shall undertake a translocation and relocation plan for regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species/communities identified by the ecologist on the property as timing of works allows, and that a final report prepared by an ecologist be submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff certifying that this condition has been fulfilled.

Special Condition 17

This condition should be amended to require that prior to applying for a permit required under the *Endangered Species Act* from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works, or requesting confirmation from the MECP that no such permit is necessary, proactive surveys be conducted to assess whether relevant species are present. It should be amended to read as follows:

Prior to the execution of the agreement, an independent ecologist, approved by the TRCA shall survey the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibian calls and other species in accordance with guidance prepared by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry or the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks to confirm presence or absence. The survey shall include the southern portions of the property and the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp. The ecologist shall submit a report on the results of the surveys to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works.

Subsequent to the above, the applicant shall provide confirmation from the MECP that a permit has been obtained or that no such permit is necessary



This amendment is required because the 2019 Environmental Assessment for this site did not include completed bat surveys and did not survey the southern portions of the property for breeding birds and amphibians. Without this information, MECP does not have complete or accurate information upon which to base a response.

Recommended Additions to Draft Special Conditions:

In addition to the Draft Conditions, Environmental Defence advises that the TRCA must add further conditions in order to fulfil its obligations.

Special Condition 21: Fisheries

TRCA should include a condition to ensure that there is an adequate basis for any DFO determination regarding fish habitat

That condition should read as follows:

Prior to the execution of the agreement, a qualified fisheries ecologist approved by the TRCA must survey Headwater Feature A at an appropriate season to confirm the presence or absence of Fish Habitat. The ecologist shall submit a report to DFO certifying the presence or absence of direct or indirect fish habitat. The permit applicant should be required to provide any necessary permits under the federal Fisheries Act or confirmation from Fisheries and Oceans Canada that no permits or authorizations are required in the form of a letter of advice.

The rationale for this is that the 2019 EA predicted the presence of Fish Habitat in headwater feature A but did not complete fish habitat surveys. Without these surveys, information to DFO in support of an application may be inaccurate. Provincial policy requires that the work be carried out in accordance with federal fish habitat requirements.

Special Condition 22: Contaminated Fill

TRCA should include a condition requiring that prior to any fill being placed on the site a Qualified Person within the meaning in the Environmental Protection Act must certify that it does not contain any contaminants within the definitions provided for in the Environmental Protection Act.

To determine this, soil analyses must be undertaken by a laboratory with an internationally recognized accreditation body [e.g. Standards Council of Canada (SCC) or Canadian Association for Laboratory Accreditation (CALA)] and in accordance with the International Standard ISO/IEC 17025 General Requirements for the Competence of Testing and Calibration Laboratories. Analytical procedures should be conducted as outlined in section 47 of Ontario Regulation 153/04 and in the Protocol for Analytical Methods Used in the Assessment of Properties under Part XV.1 of the Environmental Protection Act, July 1, 2011. A Qualified Person should further certify that the fill does not contain compost, engineered fill products, asphalt, concrete, re-used or recycled aggregate product and/or mine tailings, other products,



including soil mixed with debris such as garbage, shingles, painted wood, ashes, or other refuse.

Prior to placing any fill on the site, a Qualified Person must certify that the fill has been treated or obtained in a manner that would prevent invasive species from being contained within the fill. Prior to placing any fill on the site, the Qualified Person shall prepare a Fill Management Plan, which outlines the overall condition and operation of the Receiving Site and should include the following:

- procedures to prevent the introduction of invasive plant or animal species;
- copies of any documentation regarding municipal or Conservation Authority licences/permits, provisions of provincial plans which apply to the site, and any requirements of provincial ministries;
- identification of appropriate soil quality and soil types for excess soil to be received at the site as determined by the QP based on site location/sensitivity, anticipated land use, ground water use/sensitivity, pre-existing site conditions or other factors as to ensure that there is no likelihood of adverse effect;
- dust and noise control measures;
- site security measures;
- Traffic and Transportation Management Plan;
- protocol for incoming excess soil specifying:
 - that each incoming load have documentation signed by the Source Site QP that includes appropriate and representative soil analyses confirming the soil quality is acceptable for the Receiving Site;
 - that visual and olfactory inspections will be conducted of all incoming loads to screen for odour, visible staining or debris; and
 - contingency measures for load rejections.
- a record keeping system to create and store written documentation to track each incoming load of excess soil including records of:
 - date and time of arrival of the load to the Receiving Site;
 - name and location of the Source Site;
 - volume of excess soil received;
 - documentation from the Source Site signed by a QP, including soil analytical results;
 - confirmation by the Receiving Site QP acknowledging that the incoming excess soil is acceptable for receipt at the site;
 - rejections of any loads of soil due to visual inspection or review of analytical results; and
 - documentation to the Source Site owner/operator and QP, once excess soil is received, confirming the soil was received and the type, quality and quantity was appropriate.
- audit sampling protocols consisting of:
 - sampling protocols (designed by a QP) sufficient to produce results that would be representative of the volume of excess soil that is being received from each Source Site; and a
 - contingency plan to identify actions that are to be taken in the event that audit sampling or other information identifies concerns with soil quality from a Source Site.



- soil placement/segregation protocol sufficient to identify where excess soil from each Source Site has been placed, such that it can be assessed if required.
 - The owner/operator of a Receiving Site shall ensure that all provisions of the Fill Management Plan are carried out.
- Owners/operators of a Receiving Site shall provide Financial Assurance, by an order issued by an MECP Regional Director or in another manner by appropriate agencies, including municipalities, before the site begins operating or during operations, to ensure any issues that may arise with material brought to the Receiving Site can be addressed in a timely and effective manner.

The above amendments to the draft conditions will not be sufficient to mitigate the grave consequences of issuing the present permit, which ought not to be issued at all. However, Environmental Defence submits that they are the bare minimum that the Toronto Region Conservation Authority is obliged to impose in order to meet its obligations under the *Conservation Authorities Act*.

It is breathtaking that the Duffins Creek wetlands are to be turned into a warehouse complex. What do we know at this stage:

1. That Toronto and the GTA flood on a much more regular basis because of a) development (pavement, concrete surfaces) and b) climate change. The Toronto Islands are a perfect example.
2. We are continuing to threaten and destroy life on this planet because of a) development and 2) climate change which both lead to loss of habitat. As a result, "Global populations of mammals, birds, amphibians, reptiles and fish have suffered an average two-thirds decline in less than half a century, according to WWF's [Living Planet Report 2020](#)."
3. The Atmospheric Fund (TAF) found that emissions increased by seven per cent in Toronto and rose by 5.2 per cent in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) in 2018. This problem will get worse due to population growth. Therefore we should be preserving those lands that can help mitigate this problem.

WHEREAS Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. has applied for permission under O. Reg. 166/06 and Section 28.0.1 of the Conservation Authorities Act for development and interference with a wetland to bring in an unknown quantity of fill and grade to ultimately remove the Provincially Significant Wetland and other upland habitat located at 1802 Bayly Street;

AND WHEREAS Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development on March 12, 2021, in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21;

AND WHEREAS the applicant has raised concerns with potential conditions that may be placed on their application and requested a hearing before TRCA's Board of Directors, which is taking place on March 12, 2021, to meet the legally mandated Provincial deadline;

AND WHEREAS the only authorized power that TRCA's Board of Directors has at their discretion is the ability to add conditions to the permission;

I provide this submission to TRCA's Board of Directors and the applicant to ensure that public input be included in the hearing record.

Background and Context

I am an ecologist with 30 years of environmental consulting experience primarily in land development and infrastructure environmental assessment, planning, and design in Ontario. I have participated in over 400 studies including over 100 in the context of the Planning Act and over 85 Class EA and IEA projects at municipal, provincial and federal levels. As a trusted senior advisor to our clients, I effectively communicate and negotiate approvals with regulators, identify project risks and provide strategic advice related to environmental protection, approvals and project success. For clarity, I am providing this submission as a concerned member of the public and the views and opinions expressed below are my own.

As a consulting ecologist I have been fortunate to represent and assist numerous land development clients achieve project approvals throughout the GTA. I am deeply concerned about the direction and likely outcome of this subject application given the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development on March 12, 2021, in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21. I am concerned because all of the clients I have assisted over the past 30 years have adhered to the standards and planning process of the province, municipalities and conservation authorities and this application, once approved will circumvent these normal practices and result in the destruction of a winterberry organic swamp community (rare in Durham Region and along the north shore of Lake Ontario) of the Lower Duffins Creek PSW Complex which includes continuous hydrological and or hydrogeological connection to a portion of the PSW complex off-site.

The main reason however for this submission is to ensure that the Conditions attached to the TRCA permission seek adequate and demonstrably redress so as to achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services both in terms of land area and ecological functions to the satisfaction of TRCA based on their expertise.

Recommended Conditions

WHEREAS The property includes key natural heritage features and key hydrological features including a Provincially Significant Wetland and Significant Wildlife Habitat together with other potential features which may be present but have yet to be confirmed including Significant Woodland and Endangered Species habitat;

AND WHEREAS the Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) is predominately a winterberry organic swamp community (rare in Durham Region and along the north shore of Lake Ontario) of the Lower Duffins Creek PSW Complex which includes continuous hydrological and or hydrogeological connection to a portion of the PSW complex off-site;

AND WHEREAS it has been documented that the property includes species considered Rare and Uncommon to Durham Region and those of regional concern to TRCA;

AND WHEREAS other faunal and ecological functions have been documented on-site including breeding birds, usage by amphibians, and small to large rural and urban mammals and the subject property is in close proximity to other natural systems for migration connectivity by fauna to occur;

AND WHEREAS stormwater and possibly groundwater (dewatering) will be generated within the property and require management, including discharge to Duffins Creek in the Town of Ajax during spring spate and major storm events;

The purpose of the conditions is an attempt to mitigate any negative effects the works are likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, pollution or the conservation of land; and any conditions or circumstances created by the filling of the site or generation and release of stormwater that might result in the damage or destruction of property or affect the use or enjoyment of adjacent lands.

My recommended conditions and rationale are as follows:

1. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall identify and convey to TRCA or public trust additional privately owned lands or fund the purchase of, and convey same in order to effect the appropriate wetland compensation to achieve the remaining approximately 14 to 16 ha of wetland restoration that TRCA staff have identified as being required to adequately compensate for the removal of the subject wetland at 1802 Bayly Street.***

Recreating wetland at a 1:1 ratio as has been proposed, should at the very least be required.

While removal of approximately 19 ha organic winterberry swamp within a Provincially Significant Wetland - a very rare wetland community type in Durham Region and along the north shore of Lake Ontario - to accommodate land development should not be permitted, it is understood that Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21.

2. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall agree to recreating wetland to replace lost ecosystem services at the same hydrogeomorphic position in the watershed so as demonstrably achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services both in terms of land area and ecological functions to the satisfaction of TRCA based on their expertise.***

The proposal to recreate wetland at a 1:1 ratio in rural headwater lands as proposed cannot achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services to off-set and replicate lost ecosystem services. Wetland replacement should be required at a similar hydrogeomorphic position in the watershed.

3. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment for restoration costs to TRCA in the amount determined by TRCA Ecology staff to implement the ecosystem structure compensation plan and achieve a net benefit of coastal organic swamp ecosystem services.***
4. ***Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide revised stormwater management report and monitoring plans to TRCA's satisfaction prior to the Permit Holder's works commencing.***

It is also important in the absence of municipal stormwater approvals (in this case), that the interim and final stormwater management scheme for the proposed development confirms that the site will not result in flooding on adjacent properties and encourages maintaining the existing conditions water balance and downstream sediment loadings.

5. ***Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a copy of any permit or other regulatory instrument required under the Endangered Species Act from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works, or shall provide confirmation from the MECP that no such permit or other regulatory instrument is necessary.***

The Planning Act, through the PPS 2020, requires protection of threatened and endangered species and their habitat in accordance with the provincial Endangered Species Act, 2007. TRCA is a public commenting body under the Planning Act and a service provider of technical environmental advice to municipal approval authorities.

This condition is required to provide a level playing field for all land developers, maintain predictable land valuation in the GTA and ensure the protection at risk species and their habitats for generations to come.

6. ***Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide and make public all supporting data, documentation and studies provided to the planning and regulatory authorities as part of any land use planning or regulatory approval applications made in relation to the proposed development.***

I am writing to you to express my utmost thanks for all the great work you have done over the years to ensure the conservation, restoration and responsible management of Ontario's water, land and natural habitats. Under your mandate you have balanced the human, environmental and economic needs through proper laws and permits.

In the many Conservation Areas like the Cortwright Centre, Bruce's Mill, East Duffin Headwaters, Boyd Con. Park, just to name a few, the TRCA has educated children and adults about our wildlife & natural environment through the use of the many educational programmes at these centres.

So, it is mind-boggling, that our present Ontario Government is now intent on reducing & destroying this well running organization's mandate.

I am joining my voice with hundreds of Ontarians to protest against the destruction of wetlands and the use of MZO's by the current Ontario provincial legislature. I share with you the following observations:

- the rough-shod gutting and severe reduction of the roll of Conservation Authorities in watershed planning and management. Schedule 6 of the omnibus Budget Bill 229 proposes numerous changes to the *Conservation Authorities Act* (CAA) that will undermine efforts to conserve biodiversity and build community resilience to climate change.
- it is obvious to me that the government ministers & the developers responsible haven't taken any of the classes at one of the many TRCA's Parks, otherwise they would know that you can't just replace the land 1:1. How could that be possible? You can't build a wetland like you can a warehouse. Once this land is paved over, its value to the world is gone.
- to "replace" the benefits provided to us by this wetland (in water filtration and flood protection and carbon sequestration, etc.), would take millions of dollars, and not a one-time payment, but ongoing compensation.

- in reality, nothing the developer can do can “compensate” the people of Ontario, or the creatures they share this land with, for the significant loss of this wetland. In an ideal world the province would revoke its order for TRCA to issue this permit.

- the Ford Government is forcing the TRCA to issue a permit “under duress”, which they would ordinarily decline under the law. Yet land approved for building of warehouses is available in Pickering!

- If the permit still has to be given – even if it against the law – the starting date should be pushed back so that wildlife, like hibernating turtles & other amphibians don’t get killed, but have a chance to escape.

I am a resident of Pickering, Ontario and as a Canadian citizen I am disappointed that our government has made the decisions it has. Specifically, in the case of developing this provincially significant wetland without any regard for the environment or public input. With 80% of Ontario's wetlands lost, the rapid urbanization of the GTA needs to be checked.

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. I wish to express my gratitude to the TRCA Board for upholding strict conditions for the development of the Lower Duffins Creek Wetland Complex. Since learning that the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- In a time where Indigenous reconciliation is supposed to be at the forefront of many decisions, the first item to note is the Permit Holder, City of Pickering, and Province of Ontario ***must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations*** on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval and seriously take into consideration the report and advice provided.
- The current area is at least 18 hectares of provincially significant wetland and to suggest the current compensation plan of new restoration is alone incomparable to what is currently there. But it only accounts for 3-5 hectares! More ***areas within Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified***, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Again, this wetland is provincially significant due to its size, habitat for unique and diverse species, and its ecological services (which those who want this project to move forward tend to under value). Therefore, ***an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned*** by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts.
- The Permit Holder ***must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans*** that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively and submit drawings as part of the Site

Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.

- While the efficacy of stormwater ponds does not compare to a wetland; the Permit Holder ***must develop a stormwater management scheme*** that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria and submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater management plans for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- Finally, before ANY work begins, a qualified, external ecologist must complete a thorough vegetation survey. The ***Permit Holder must transplant and relocate all plants*** that are identified on the property as being regionally and locally rare and uncommon species and communities.

I look forward to watching the Hearing this Friday. Thank you for all you and TRCA has done so far.

Dear TRCA Board,

As a Torontonian I am aware of the cost of failing to protect the integrity of watersheds, especially their wetlands, which are an indispensable part. Toronto continues to pay dearly for the fallout from infilling and from the destruction of the wetlands at the mouth of the Don. As we speak the Port Lands Flood Protection and Enabling Infrastructure Project is underway to protect Toronto's southeastern waterfront from flooding; this at the cost of about 1 billion. The water quality of Lake Ontario and protecting it from further degradation resulting from removal of wetlands, is of great concern to those living in Toronto and other communities along the shoreline. The watersheds in our communities are all emptying into the same lake.

I am very grateful to have time and opportunity to make public comment on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. Being retired, I am in a better position than most to advocate for this provincially significant wetland and to support the efforts of those seeking to save it from destruction. Many in Pickering, Ajax and beyond are opposed to the project, but being full-time breadwinners or otherwise giving their full attention to supporting their families, they are simply unable to play an active role; contrast these folks with proponent public officials and other potential beneficiaries, whose advocacy for the development project's success is actually part of their paid job.

Since the TRCA's hands are tied and the board is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- ❖ The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit. In a letter to Pickering Council dated November 2020, Chief Kelly LaRocca stated their opposition to the project. They have sought to protect the Duffins Creek wetlands since 1788- and there is a long history of their people serving as stewards of these lands. They put the City on notice that the wetlands are an Indigenous Protected Conserved Area (IPCA). Destroying this land and water source is sending a message to First Nations that there is no respect, no regard for First Nations treaty rights, or any type of Reconciliation; and that the City, and Province for that matter, feel that they have no obligation to consult with First Nations, even when the Courts have stated otherwise.

- ❖ The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- ❖ The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- ❖ The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria
- ❖ An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- ❖ The developer and the municipality should fully compensate homeowners who incur flood damage due to increased storm runoff resulting from removal of the wetland for the project.
- ❖ The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment.

Wetlands are the nursery of the watershed. Without them how can there be regeneration for fish, birds, mammals, insects and flora? Our leaders should be protecting these vital natural organs and yet here is a project that is dependent on a wetland's destruction. The idea of wiping out Duffins Creek Wetland is an affront to common sense, science and to the urgency of mitigating the climate crisis, which threatens all of us in 2021 and down the generations to come.

In conclusion it has to be stated that all the above conditions won't compensate for the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland.

I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

The developer shall also be responsible to use informed TRCA partnership to assess and provide compensation for loss of the natural ecosystem services, increased flood risk, discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution, impact to wildlife habitat, hold public consultation on any plans, and commit to science-based planning.

It seems clear to me that this government is ignorant of ecological systems and responsibilities and has turned away from the values of environmental stewardship that has informed governments, even Conservative governments in the past. Once this land and all the life it sustains is gone, it is gone forever. And for perceived economic gain of a few.

Subject: Comments on Duffins Creek Permit Conditions

Dear TRCA Board Members,

I am alarmed to hear about the process that has been undergone with the Minister's Zoning Order to advance approval of a warehousing facility to be built on the large, provincially significant – and legally protected – Lower Duffins Creek wetland in Pickering.

I know the TRCA is opposed to the destruction of Provincially Significant Wetlands and I commend you for your honesty in that you would typically not approve such a permit but are under duress due to changes in planning rules set by our provincial government. As we know, wetlands provide crucial benefits to our communities, helping to mitigate flooding, store carbon, filter water and provide habitat for wildlife. This economic and health value cannot be underscored.

I understand that the developer has requested a permit to proceed with the destruction of the Pickering wetland. Though recent changes to the Conservation Authorities Act mean that the TRCA can't lawfully refuse the permit, I urge you to impose stringent, science-based conditions and compensation requirements. I also ask that you hold public consultations on any proposed compensation plan before it is approved so that it can be carefully reviewed by concerned citizens and scientific experts. Please note the following:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

Natural spaces are vital to our wellbeing and from my understanding there are other more suitable locations for this warehouse.

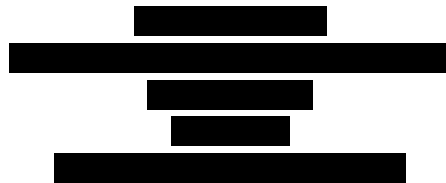

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. Please be aware that I am opposed to any development on the site of this provincially significant wetland. However, since the TRCA is forced, under duress, to grant permission to The Applicant, I would like to make the following comments on the conditions of development:

I am in support of the conditions drafted by the TRCA in principle, especially the Ecosystem Compensation Plan and Special Conditions. No amount of money or restoration can replace the habitat and species lost through the development of this wetland site.

Special Conditions:

Please note my comments below on Special Conditions, as referenced by the TRCA Staff Report. I have followed the same numbering system as used in the report.

Special Condition 1: I recommend that this condition be revised so that the permit commences after bird migration has ended for this year in November. This revision will reduce the impact of the proposed development on migrating birds.

Special Condition 2: I strongly support this condition. It is important that, before the agreement is executed, the applicant acquire confirmation in writing that MNRF does not object to the destruction of the Provincially Significant Wetland and is in approval with the compensation plan.

Special Condition 5: I am in support of this condition but would like to note my significant reservations regarding how likely it is that suitable land can be found. I would request that TRCA make it a condition that such land be located and accepted as suitable BEFORE an agreement is finalized. In the event that the applicant supplies cash in lieu of supplying land, it is essential that work not go ahead before TRCA has identified a site/sites that will fully compensate for the benefits which are lost on a local scale.

Special Condition 9: This condition increases the amount of compensation to be provided by the developer. It is not within my expertise to calculate an amount that should be required, but I trust that TRCA has access to individuals who are qualified to do so.

Special Condition 10: I support the revision of this condition to state that TRCA must approve the site plan before the agreement is entered into.

Special Condition 13: I recommend that TRCA must have the opportunity to approve the transportation plan before such work is carried out.

Special Condition 17: I recommend that TRCA make a requirement that an independent ecologist, approved by the conservation authority, be allowed to conduct sufficient site surveys during appropriate seasons in order to make a reasonable assessment of the status of breeding birds, bats, calling amphibians and other wildlife. Such surveys would be carried out according to guidelines of the MNRF or MECP or especially NHIC (who have proven expertise in this area). It is essential that the southern parts of the property, and the Winterberry Organic Thicket

Swamp be included in the survey. A report by the ecologist is to be submitted to the MECP detailing the results of these surveys. I recommend that the applicant be required to obtain confirmation from the MECP either 1) that a permit has been received, or 2) that no such permit is required. It is particularly important that bat surveys be included, and that surveys for breeding birds and amphibians be conducted in the southern part of the property because the 2019 Environmental Assessment failed to include such studies.

Recommendations re additional conditions:

1: Fish Habitat

I recommend that TRCA establish a condition that, before the agreement is executed, a fish biologist/ecologist who has been approved by the TRCA be given the opportunity to conduct a survey of Headwater Feature A, during the appropriate season, to make a reasonable assessment of potential fish habitat. A report should be submitted to DFO by the biologist/ecologist indicating whether there is direct or indirect evidence of fish habitat. It is an important requirement that the applicant acquire any permits as specified in the federal *Fisheries Act* or, alternatively, that they have written confirmation from DFO that no such permits or authorizations are needed. Note that the EA completed in 2019 suggested that there might be fish habitat in headwater Feature A, but no surveys were completed. It is required by provincial policy that such work be completed following federal fish habitat stipulations.

2: Contaminated Fill

I recommend that TRCA add a requirement that any fill brought to the site be certified to be free of contaminants, as determined by a Qualified Person (see the *Environmental Protection Act* for relevant definitions). Since this project is exempt from the City's fill management bylaw, TRCA should require that fill to be used on the site be assessed using the BMP (best management practices). To my understanding, other parties which much more understanding of this subject are planning to discuss this issue in detail in their submissions.

3: Invasive Species

I recommend that TRCA place conditions that stringent precautions be required to avoid bringing invasive species into the site. Where such invasive species are or may be already present (e.g., Phragmites and Black Swallowwort), precautions are needed to avoid making the existing situation even worse. As noted above, since this project is exempt from the City's fill management bylaw, TRCA should require that fill to be used on the site be assessed using the BMP (best management practices). To my knowledge, other parties which much more background in this subject area anticipate addressing this issue in their submissions.

4: Loss of Recreational Opportunities

I recommend that TRCA assess the loss of recreational opportunities which will result from the removal of this natural site. Speaking personally, I have documented my visits to this site since May 1, 1979. These observations are recorded in field notebooks spanning more than four

decades, including details concerning what birds I saw, species I heard, what frogs were singing, what reptiles or other species were present, what plants were in bloom, etc. I am gradually adding the bird records to the eBird database, but that will be a long process. The Pickering Naturalists, of which I am president, have likewise visited the area for many years, including an outing led by Dr. J. Murray Speirs, which visited Squires Beach Road in the immediate vicinity in the early 1980's.

Groups such as Pickering Naturalists, and many other groups in the area, as well as individual naturalists, take great pleasure in visiting local natural sites to observe, hear, smell and otherwise appreciate nature. While a few people visit exotic locations for nature, the vast majority of Pickering residents spend their time at local sites. As South Pickering becomes increasingly urbanized, there are fewer and fewer wild places like this one. The loss of natural sites such as 1802 Bayly St. will be keenly felt by many.

5: Replacement of Migratory Birds Stopover Site

On page 24 of the Staff Report, TRCA made reference to: "the habitat as a stopover point for migratory birds between the lakefront and the Oak Ridges Moraine". The site is only 2.2 km from the important migratory site at Frenchman's Bay / Hydro Marsh, and just 1.6 km from the similarly significant site in the marsh at the mouth of Duffins Creek. These migratory sites are hugely important in both spring and fall. I acknowledge that the issue of migratory stopover was mentioned in the report, but I am not satisfied that it is acceptable to mention the issue and then to ignore the problem and/or fail to address it properly. My recommendation is that TRCA more fully address the issue of the loss of this stopover site in close proximity to the shoreline.

6: Replacement of Natural Habitat

The TRCA addresses the issue of attempting to compensate through cash in lieu for the loss of habitat which will take place on the site. I do not accept that the compensation proposed is reasonable under the circumstances. I recommend that TRCA undertake to more fully assess the implications of the loss of habitat which will occur after this development.

A major issue is that of habitat connectivity. An isolated area of habitat is far less valuable ecologically than a similar habitat which is connected to neighbouring sites with relevant habitat. For this reason, losing an important area, such as the provincially significant wetland on this site, will have even greater ramifications than merely the loss of the species on the site itself. All of those species requiring connectivity for their growth, reproduction, pollination, survival, etc. will be impacted by the loss.

I would further note that natural habitat, as is present on the site in question, is much more species-rich than in areas that are merely "open-space". While it is true that open-space areas, like typical city parks, with large areas of cut grass, paved trails and manicured gardens, etc. do support some species of birds, other wildlife and flora, there is a very limited range of species present. Surveys of birds, mammals, amphibians, reptiles, butterflies, moths, vascular plants, etc. have reinforced this result many times over. Likewise, sites such as golf courses, while open

and somewhat natural, lack the diversity of truly natural habitats, and generally support only common species. In sum, natural habitat is precious, and in urgent need of protection.

7: Additional Survey Work Required re Butterflies and Moths

I recommend that TRCA require butterfly surveys of the site during appropriate seasons and with sufficient level of field work to make a reasonable assessment of butterflies on the site. Note that 2 annual butterfly surveys have been undertaken in Durham for a number of years, coordinated by James Kamstra. These local surveys, despite being of limited scope, have nevertheless established record-high counts for a number of species for all of North America. There is no way to guess in advance just what might be discovered by a thorough survey of the 1802 Bayly St. site. It would very interesting to learn what skipper species live on the site.

I would further note that there has been no work whatsoever done on other Lepidoptera on the site – namely moths. There are vastly more species of moths than butterflies. At Thickson's Woods, for example, thorough survey works has documented the presence of over 1000 species. Thickson's is only 13 km to the east of the site. I recommend that TRCA require that a moth survey be completed, with similar requirements as that outlined above for butterflies.

8: Assessment of undiscovered species

It is of course entirely possible that there are species and populations present on the site of which we have no knowledge at all. Perhaps existing surveys have not established evidence through sightings, photographs, audio recordings, sampling techniques, herbarium specimens, etc. for these lost species. How do we assess the loss of these "unknown unknowns." Are these species lost to Pickering? Durham? All TRCA watersheds? Perhaps even larger jurisdictions? We don't know – we won't know. I'm unsure what recommendation one could make to address such losses. I doubt that cash or restoration would be relevant.

Summary:

In closing, I would like to repeat my opposition to the proposed development situated on a provincially significant wetland. I recognize that TRCA has no other option than to issue a permit, under duress, to the Applicant, with reference to this site. Further, I acknowledge my support, in principle, for the conditions put forth by the TRCA – in particular, the Ecosystem Compensation Plan and Special Conditions. I am utterly convinced that no amount of cash in lieu or restoration work can replace the natural habitat, diversity and species lost through the development of this irreplaceable wetland site.

I am a resident of the city of Toronto where I've lived for 50 years.

Thanks for taking my comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St.

I believe that because of climate change, this wetland which works to mitigate flood damage and water quality **should not ever be developed**. Development will cause its destruction. Humans can not restore a wetland that has been in formation by nature for thousands of years. The story of the restoration of the Don River wetlands has taught us that.

However I understand the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc. Therefore I implore you to consider these conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on any conditions to proceed with this project.

The developer must create and pay for plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment.

- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland. I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

On behalf of the Green Party of Ontario, I am submitting comments on the draft conditions to the permit to destroy the Provincially Significant Wetland known as the Lower Duffins Creek Wetland in Durham Region.

As you know, the proposed permit will result in an unacceptable loss of vital environmental attributes that will be impossible to replace and is not in the public interest. We therefore recommend that the TRCA refuse to issue the permit as it is incompatible with the TRCA's duties under its statute, until the TRCA has obtained direction from the court as to the validity of the recent regulations.

In the alternative, our recommendations are as follows:

- We ask that the TRCA revise Special Condition 1 so that the permit commences no sooner than after the migratory bird season ends for this year.
- We support Special Condition 2 and request that the TRCA require the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forests (MNRF's) written assurance that MNRF has adequately satisfied its duty to consult and meaningfully accommodate affected First Nations with respect to these matters. We also suggest that the TRCA ask the affected First Nations directly whether their interests have been meaningfully accommodated. The permit should not take effect until such accommodation has taken place.
- We support Special Condition 5 but ask that the TRCA permit allow wetland destruction to begin only after the TRCA has acquired an adequate supply of suitable replacement land. In light of the reduced ecological and hydrologic effectiveness of created wetlands, we ask the TRCA to require that the area of compensation be twice as large as the area destroyed.
- In relation to Special Condition 9, we recommend that the TRCA increase the amount of compensation in view of the harm to the public good and require the developer to provide funding to compensate damage from future flooding and droughts.

- We ask that Special Condition 10 be revised to require written approval of the site plan prior to any wetland destruction.
- No wetland destruction should occur until after any applicable permits have been granted by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans under the Fisheries Act.
- We ask that under Special Condition 13 it be explicitly stated that that TRCA requires approval of the plan prior to the conduct of any work or any other disturbances of the site.
- We ask that under Special Condition 17, that a survey be conducted to include the areas that were omitted in the 2019 EA. An independent ecologist approved by the TRCA should survey the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibian calls and other species to confirm presence or absence. The survey should include the southern portions of the property and the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp. This survey should be completed before any work or disturbance on the site.

Provincially Significant Wetlands are vital aspects of our natural infrastructure that protect people and businesses from flooding disasters and clean our drinking water. These decisions should not be taken lightly as they greatly impact Ontario's future. We appreciate your kind consideration of our recommendations.

The developer shall also be responsible to use informed TRCA partnership to assess and provide compensation for loss of the natural ecosystem services, increased flood risk, discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution, impact to wildlife habitat, hold public consultation on any plans, and commit to science-based planning.

It seems clear to me that this government is ignorant of ecological systems and responsibilities and has turned away from the values of environmental stewardship that has informed governments, even Conservative governments in the past. Once this land and all the life it sustains is gone, it is gone forever. And for perceived economic gain of a few.

I am a resident of Scarborough, not Pickering. But we are all connected through water, land and air. The demise of this Wetland will affect people, animals, plants, water and ecosystems beyond the immediate area. I don't understand how people with power don't see the damage they are doing. All for a bit of money for their developer friends.

TRCA Board of Directors,

General comments:

It is with respect that I note the objections of the Staff and Directors of the TRCA to the substantial destruction of the Duffin's Creek Wetland Complex, and your enduring support for the objectives of TRCA's Living City Policies, and as stewards of lands within your jurisdictions.

In the context of the Great Lakes Watershed, coastal wetlands like this are rare, important and the object of increasing efforts to protect, enhance and restore, by numerous governments and agencies; State, National and International.

It is frankly embarrassing that our Provincial Government is so assiduously pursuing the destruction of this Wetland Complex, and for such trivial reasons, considering there are near adjacent sites where the same development could easily be accommodated, and welcomed.

Nonetheless, here we are.

Specific comments addressing the Recommended Conditions to the Permission:

The TRCA Staff Report, "Review of Permit Application by TRCA staff" states:

"Given the size and location of the habitat as a stopover point for migratory birds between the lakefront and the Oak Ridges Moraine, it cannot be replaced nearby in the Pickering urban area as there are no available target sites. There will be a net loss to the natural heritage system regardless of the ecosystem compensation plan, even if the compensation meets the requirements of the TRCA's [Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation](#). The Guideline was never developed for this unprecedented scenario."

There will be an irreparable net loss.

This must be held in mind when considering both the specific conditions, and the process towards an Agreement.

Special Condition 1:

Consider amending this to specify that disturbance of the site be initiated after the migratory bird season has ended for this year.

Special Condition 5: The concern is that if there is no deadline, the “any other lands” will remain hypothetical and not materialise. It is incumbent on the Permit Holder to have a plan for Ecosystem Compensation, not just an idea. This condition should be amended to include “**Prior to the execution of the Agreement**” as the first words.

Special Condition 6: This condition is critical, and must be maintained.

Special Condition 10. Amend this to require site plan approval prior to execution of the Agreement.

Special condition 13. As worded, this does not allow for determining if the plan is to the satisfaction of the TRCA, nor does it allow for monitoring of the implementation of the plan. Having a final report is no substitute. Amend to:

The Permit Holder shall undertake a translocation and relocation plan for regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species/communities identified by the ecologist on the property to the satisfaction of the TRCA, and as timing of works allows, issue updates and proposed amendments to the TRCA for approval and that a final report prepared by an ecologist be submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff certifying that the conditions have been fulfilled.

Special condition 17. Amend to:

Prior to the execution of the agreement an independent ecologist approved by the TRCA shall survey the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibian calls and other species in accordance with guidance prepared by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry or the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks to confirm presence or absence. The survey shall include the southern portions of the property and the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp. The ecologist shall submit a report on the results of the surveys to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works. The applicant shall provide confirmation from the MECP that a permit has been obtained or that no such permit is necessary.

To date the ecological surveys have not been adequate to ascertain the presence of Endangered Species, for instance the 2019 EA did not include bat surveys nor did it survey southern portions of the property for breeding birds and amphibians.

In the Staff report under Permit Application and Property Description it states: “The property includes key natural heritage features and key hydrological features including a PSW and Significant Wildlife Habitat. Other potential features which may be present but have yet to be confirmed include Significant Woodland and Endangered Species habitat.”

Emphasis added. Obviously this work needs to be done.

Recommended Additional Special Conditions.

Special Condition 18. (I notice the first item on the Agenda. Let that not be pro forma).

That prior to the execution of the Agreement the permit holder shall obtain written confirmation from the MNRF that the MNRF has adequately satisfied its duty to consult and meaningfully accommodate affected First Nations with respect to these matters.

Special condition 19.

Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder will retain a qualified fisheries ecologist approved by the TRCA to survey Headwater Feature A at an appropriate season to confirm the presence or absence of Fish Habitat. The ecologist shall submit a report to DFO certifying the presence or absence of direct or indirect fish habitat. The permit applicant should be required to provide any necessary permits under the federal *Fisheries Act* or confirmation from Fisheries and Oceans Canada that no permits or authorizations are required in the form of a letter of advice.

Dear sirs,

I understand that TRCA has been ordered by the provincial government to allow development of a provincially significant wetland within Pickering. I am writing to express my disappointment at the provincial government's actions and to encourage TRCA to attach conditions to this permit that ensure equivalent wetlands are created.

Ontario's ecosystem shrinks every year, causing knock-on effects throughout the province. The GTA also has numerous brownfield sites that are more suited for development. However, if this wetland must be destroyed, then an equivalent wetland should be created. This should be at the developers' cost - both initially and to maintain it - and there should be penalties if they fail to live up to their obligations. TRCA will have a better idea about appropriate conditions, but I would like to see conditions such as:

- * The developers must fund an independent study to identify and quantify the flora and fauna that use the wetland. This would ensure this area's role in the ecosystem is fully understood and replacements are equivalent.
- * Any threatened or endangered species discovered during the survey must be protected.
- * Land of similar type and equal or greater area will be acquired at the developers' expense, and developed into a provincially significant wetland.
- * The developers must fund independent studies at 1 year, 3 years, and 5 years of the new wetland to ensure that it has adequately replaced the destroyed wetlands.
- * Given that the developers are likely to see an increase in value of their land by destroying these wetlands, it seems fair that Ontario's wetland should also benefit. For instance: if the current value of the land is \$1 million, the wetland occupies 10% of the site, and the permitted land is worth \$2 million, then a donation of \$100,000 should be made to Ontario's conservation organisations (ie. 10% of the increase in value).

Given that TRCA has no option to reject the development permission, it must work to ensure that the loss to Ontario's ecosystem is minimised and outweighed by gains elsewhere. Developers may object that such conditions are onerous, but they should be onerous: developing protected natural areas should be much harder. Developing brownfield sites and sites with existing zoning is preferable at all levels of our society, and should be developers' first choice.

The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment
- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

I recently read 'Braiding Sweetgrass' by Robin Wall Kimmerer. What a poignant account of why we all need to cherish the green spaces we still have left on Earth, and not let developers

Attention of Alisa Mahrova for TRCA Board:

I am commenting on the Development Application by Pickering Development (Squires) Inc. for the site located at 1802 Bayly Street, City of Pickering, Ontario, involving the Provincially Significant Wetland known as Duffin's Creek Wetland. I understand that TRCA is compelled by law to grant permission to the proponent for the development but that TRCA may add conditions to the development application.

I would like to recommend the following for this development application:

- a) consult, immediately, with the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation has not been made. 1802 Bayly Street is subject to the provisions as laid out in the Williams Treaty between the Crown and the First Peoples;
- b) stipulate that the development may only start after the breeding season of the migratory bird population, resident in the area;
- c) hire a Ph.D. level ecologist to over see any development at the site and that said person must regularly report in to TRCA about the development;
- d) use the ecologist hired, as per (c) above, oversee the salvage, transplantation and relocation of as much as is possible samples of flora and fauna of the area, including uncommon, rare and SAR from the site before the commencement of construction;
- e) regarding (d) above, particular attention must be paid to the Winterberry Land Habitat in the southeast corner of the site re salvage, transplantation and relocation;
- f) restoration of the entirety of the wetland is a compulsory condition that must be observed as part of the development proposal i.e. the 18.0 ha at 1802 Bayly Street. The total 18 ha must be completely restored and mitigated;
- g) funding as set out by both the proponent and as suggested by TRCA is quite inadequate and should be on the order of \$25 000 000 for any Compensation Agreement given that the land in question skyrockets in value after development approval;
- h) the proposed development will affect control, stormwater management and groundwater flow, therefore the proponent must develop plans for management of siltation by erosion, management of stormwater from weather events and groundwater mitigation that meet or

exceed TRCA guidelines;

i) construction of a temporary pond on the site needs to be completed by the proponent to catch stormwater, overland flow and siltation;

j) properly maintained barriers between the landfill and the remaining natural environment need to be properly maintained throughout the time of construction;

k) landfilling is to be done at the site including on the Provincially Significant Wetland so such material needs inspected by a soil specialist and declared free of any pollutants that would be detrimental to the local environment;

l) testing of the landfill must be done by an accredited body such as the Standards Council of Canada or the Canadian Association of Laboratory Accreditation as International Standard ISO 17025 of the General Requirements for the Competence of Testing and Calibration Laboratories;

m) transportation planning for this project must be done before the commencement of the project that satisfies the requirements of both TRCA and the City of Pickering;

n) the proponent must have the required permits from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans;

o) TRCA must receive a permanent easement to access the remaining natural environment;

p) a permanent stormwater/siltation pond planted with native flora must be constructed on the southeast corner of the site;

q) landscaping of the site must use native plants;

r) drinking water, stormwater and sewage pipes are to be run under the existing roads;

s) migration of birds occurs through the area so wiring and telephone cables need to be underground and lighting to be bird friendly;

t) windows must be treated such that birds will not collide with them as per standards set out by the Fatal Light Awareness Program group.

In conclusion, it is indeed unfortunate that the TRCA finds itself in this situation forced upon it by a government that is supposed to act responsibly but is not. As with the extinction of a plant or animal species, one may draw the conclusion that this development proposal will see the extinction of a habitat which in this case is the Duffin's Creek Provincially Significant Wetland. The varied local flora and fauna will be extirpated with the disappearance of their habitat. The Wetland Complex cannot be replaced no matter the so-called restoration of it or its mitigation. Once gone, it is forever.

So for what it is worth, I hope these comments are read and heeded. Thank you for the opportunity to make them.

I'm trying to get in before the deadline I just found out about. See my finished remarks, below. Please let me know if they will be alright to use!

I am concerned for the biodiversity and environmental impacts that wanton development will have on this ecologically significant wetland. The local flora and fauna within this area will either be displaced from their habitats or killed. With so many species facing extinction at the hands of human development, it is our duty as Canadians to reduce the harmful impact our actions have on the environment to protect Canadian wildlife.

It is for this reason that I suggest that multiple steps be taken to reduce/mitigate the ecological impact of these developments on the wildlife within the areas of interest.

To identify and protect species at risk within the wetland, multiple surveys (conducted by experienced third parties and agreed to by the TRCA) should be conducted to determine the extent and number of species in the area. If species of concern are identified, or species which would be unable to vacate the area safely, plans must be established to safely relocate these animals to an area where they can continue to live safely. It is not always enough to relocate a species to just outside a development zone; habitat fragmentation can impede the survival of populations as well. Consider our native turtle species, of which the greatest diversity and number occur right here in Southern Ontario, and all of whom are threatened by habitat fragmentation. Snapping turtles, for example, take 16 years to achieve sexual maturity and are most often killed by traffic - the majority of those killed are reproductive females, dispersing as they look for a place to lay their eggs.

If endangered species are discovered, the appropriate measures to ensure the longevity of the species (as determined by experts) must be conducted and serious consideration about the viability of construction in that area should be given.

Results from these surveys and any subsequent actions taken should be transparent, open, and easily accessible by the public. As I am sure that the developers will take great care in ensuring development is as environmentally-friendly as possible, complete public knowledge about what is occurring and why should not be an issue.

Likewise, these environmental surveys/relocation costs would be at the developer's expense, not as a punitive fee but as the expected, natural costs of developing in such an ecologically significant location.

The birds, reptiles, mammals, insects, fungi, and plants of this area must be considered when disrupting the natural habitats within, and to refuse to adopt this responsibility is disrespectful to the Canadians who treasure the beautiful, natural land in which we live.

I truly hope you consider my words and the wishes of my fellow Ontarians while forming a strategy to deal with wetland development.

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. I am a resident of Markham and a former resident of Pickering. As a frequent visitor to natural areas in York and Durham that fall under the stewardship of TRCA, I have the utmost respect for your mandate and vital work. Stay strong!

Along with thousands of other citizens, I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed, however since you are faced with no other choice other than to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development.

I am deeply concerned about the proposed new site for the offset project. North Pickering and the Lower Duffins Wetland Complex would seem quite different microclimates (layperson assessment) and I question the likelihood of recreating the existing wetland. Furthermore, I understood from following Pickering municipal conversations that there would be an appreciable community benefit to creating a whole new wetland in exchange for the loss of the current wetland. The proposed land swap to the rural north end of the city doesn't seem to fit the bill. An important natural asset is being swapped for another important and thriving natural asset: prime agricultural land (class 1 soil) in active production. Would it not be more appropriate to locate a brownfield or disturbed site nearby in Pickering, where rehabilitation and regeneration would significantly improve the quality of life and recreational opportunities for a higher density of residents? It is my opinion that local residents have not gained anything from the compensation agreement. Wasn't the promise all along that residents could expect something better than, what was referred to municipally as, a low-functioning wetland (not agreeing, just repeating what I've heard local leaders say)?

First, let me say that I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed and it is frustrating to see the safeguards that are supposed to protect our environmentally sensitive properties being eroded or set aside without public consultation. Being elected does not translate into a government doing whatever it wants without public consideration or input. The provincial government should not be using a Minister's Zoning Order to remove its protections and avoid public consultation.

However since the TRCA is compelled, under duress of legislation, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development which TRCA still has power to order as I understand it:

I believe after doing research on the issue that:

- the Permit Holder, should explore other possible development sites which are not ecologically sensitive and provide proof that 1802 Bayly Street is the only property in the municipality which will be suitable for the proposed development

I have spoken out to my MPP, Premier For, and Minister Clark about the misuse of MZO's, the recent legislative restrictions placed on the Conservation Authority, and my concerns for the environmental impacts of these actions, including specific concerns regarding the development of a provincially significant wetland in Pickering. Since the TRCA is being forced provide permission to The Permit Holder in spite of its recommendations against development at this site, and in spite of strong backlash from the public and multiple First Nations, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

The Permit Holder must:

1. consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval in conjunction with the City of Pickering and Province of Ontario.
2. identify and restore at least the FULL total of 18 hectares + 0.31 hectares of wetland (not 3-5 hectares of restoration as is currently proposed) with a specific purchasing plan and reservation plan.
3. cover the full cost of an independent formal review of the Compensation Agreement. The review should be: commissioned by the TRCA with the goal of determining the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed; and be conducted by no fewer than 3 qualified academic experts, chosen with the approval of the TRCA. Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services, the amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
4. create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
5. develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
6. submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.

7. transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

I will state again that I do NOT support this development, nor the undemocratic means with which it is being pushed forward- Ministerial Zoning Orders were never meant to bypass public consultation as part of regular planning. The lack of opportunity for public input and lack of consultation with the Williams Treaties First Nations is appalling.

I am a resident of York Region, but live near the border with Durham Region. I stand in solidarity with those opposed to this reckless project, and with the science-based recommendations of the TRCA.

It is also recommended the Permit Holder identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.

Furthermore, due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified

academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. We will never get it back, nor its vast ecological benefits.

In addition, the Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively. The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.

The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.

And very importantly, the Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

The developer shall also be responsible to use informed TRCA partnership to assess and provide compensation for loss of the natural ecosystem services, increased flood risk, discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution, impact to wildlife habitat, hold public consultation on any plans, and commit to science-based planning.

It seems clear to me that this government is ignorant of ecological systems and responsibilities and has turned away from the values of environmental stewardship that has informed governments, even Conservative governments in the past. Once this land and all the life it sustains is gone, it is gone forever. And for perceived economic gain of a few.

I am a resident of East York, not Pickering. But we are all connected through water, land and air. The demise of this Wetland will affect people, animals, plants, water and ecosystems beyond the immediate area. I don't understand how people with power don't see the damage they are doing. All for a bit of money for their developer friends.

Environmental Action Now, Ajax - Pickering is a group of volunteers and citizens from Durham and beyond who care deeply about our community and the environment. We, the undersigned, are individuals who represent many different generations and are united in our concern for future generations on this earth.

Two points stood out to us in the TRCA staff report:

1. The TRCA are issuing this permission under duress, against their own policies and without following TRCA guidelines.
2. The TRCA clearly states that a wetland of this size and ecological significance cannot be replaced and that the restoration property proposed will not meet habitat needs to restore 18 ha of wetland.

The following are our comments on the conditions to the development at 1802 Bayly St., Pickering, by Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. To be clear, we feel that all of the following conditions should be met prior to permission being given for construction on the site.

- The Permit Holder and City of Pickering must consult the Williams Treaty First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions. The Province must fulfill their duty to consult with all First Nations affected by this development prior to any development moving forward.
- The Permit Holder must submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the *Planning Act* for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.

- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha (the area of wetland at 1802 Bayly St.) + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd. which will be impacted by development) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration which falls short of a meaningful restoration plan.
 - additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, outside of the Greenbelt, a purchasing plan made and a restoration plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- This development is unprecedented and will set precedent. An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
 - The speed at which permission needed to be issued, the size of the wetland being destroyed and its significant ecological services are exceptional. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, undervalues the social, physical, economic and community costs of this development.
 - The species and habitat that currently inhabit this wetland are irreplaceable the same way that an individual human is irreplaceable. No amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will make up for the loss from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder must present a *Fill Management Plan*, commissioned by a Qualified Person (under the *Environmental Protection Act*) to ensure no contaminated fill is used on site and appropriate measures are taken to protect soil and water health. This Plan must be filed with the TRCA prior to any construction.
- The Permit Holder must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder must commission a qualified fisheries ecologist, approved by the TRCA, to survey "Headwater Feature A" during the appropriate season to confirm whether Fish Habitat is present and will be disturbed by this development. This survey must be completed prior to any construction.

- The Permit Holder must develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder must transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

It is our hope that these comments, and the comments of experts, organizations and members of the general public, will be given due consideration. We thank members of the Board for their consideration and time in reviewing these and others' comments.

We, the undersigned, do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed and regret that the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to issue permission. We extend gratitude to the TRCA Board and Staff for accepting public comments on this report and for your work in upholding watershed planning principles.

My name is Trevor Cluthé and I am a resident of Whitby, Ontario. Thanks for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- 1) The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- 2) The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- 3) The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment.
- 4) The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- 5) An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- 6) The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.

I feel compelled to provide comments on this issue because I am sick and tired of Ford's conservative government using sneaky tactics to push through his pro-developer

agenda. His government continually shows that money is more important to them than a healthy environment. Please do everything you can to try and hold Ford's government accountable for their destructive actions.

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. My name is Aidan Dahlin Nolan and I am a volunteer with EANAP (Environmental Action Now Ajax-Pickering). Separate from the letter being sent by EANAP, however, I've decided to send an individual letter suggesting additional conditions that I feel should be included in the permission that the TRCA must issue "under duress" as a result of the Minister's Zoning Order for the property at 1802 Bayly Street in the City of Pickering that are separate from those being requested by EANAP. Additionally, I would like to say a personal thank you to the TRCA for stating clearly that they would not issue this permission if they were not legally compelled to do so.

As the TRCA Draft Agenda Package for the Board of Directors Hearing on March 12th outlines on page 14:

Conditions specified by authority

(6) Subject to subsection (7), an authority may attach conditions to the permission, including conditions to mitigate,

(sic) (b) any conditions or circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property

Yet, not listed among the "Special Conditions" included in the package are any conditions that explicitly mitigate the financial cost of increased flood risk to property owners in South Ajax and South Pickering that may result from this development in conjunction with a natural hazard such as a large storm event. While conditions 3 and 10 on pages 26 and 28 respectively do discuss drainage improvements and drawings related to stormwater on the site plan, no risk assessment is requested as to the potential elevated risk for property owners downstream. As such, I would ask that the TRCA include additional conditions, like the ones suggested below, to mitigate this potential risk:

1. Prior to the execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall pay for a flood risk assessment for downstream properties within the Duffins watershed in Ajax and Pickering to be conducted by an independent third party chosen by the TRCA and that this assessment shall be made public.

1(b). Should this risk assessment find increased flood risk to downstream properties, prior to the execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall establish a fund, with necessary contribution amounts assessed annually in perpetuity by a third party chosen by the TRCA and paid to the Municipalities of Ajax, Pickering, and Durham Region to fund the construction and maintenance of additional downstream mitigation measures including infrastructure improvements, as well as payments to

property owners for flood damage, and/or insurance cost increases, linked in whole or in part to the development of the property at 1802 Bayly Street.

Thank you for taking the time to read the contents of my letter, and for all the work that the TRCA staff is doing with regards to the hearing on March 12th.

I reside in Ajax along the Duffins Creek conservation area managed by TRCA. I am disturbed by the corrupting of the process, to which most of us are subject, applied by TRCA when determining whether a project, including on a provincially significant wetland, is suitable for development on lands it manages, or which conditions should be applied as per its expertise.

The undermining of scientifically evidenced decision-making will detrimentally affect the lives of Ontarians- we live in the environment and careful protection of it affects our health. We need predictability to make our own decisions. While I do not agree permission should be granted at all for this project, the conditions proposed by TRCA should at the very least be applied.

As I understand it TRCA was created to manage environmentally important assets and has the qualified staff to do so. It is irresponsible for a government-of-the-day to ignore that expertise and override the due process, to which most of us are subject, to achieve whatever goal that government deems more important than protecting the environmental assets of Ontarians. If TRCA decides that a proposed swap is not adequate (25% wetland compensation offered in return for 100% wetland destruction), or that the location of a proposed development is not appropriate, that decision should not be overridden by government fiat that will result in such devastating consequences for this Provincially Designated wetland. If the applicant wishes to challenge the scientific evidence behind an unimpeded TRCA decision let it utilize the administrative review process available, not receive personal support from the government-of-the-day.

Board of Directors,

TRCA has an obligation under the regulation to protect the form and function of the GTHA watersheds. This obligation includes the protection and enhancement of wetland features. If a development does not meet the five tests of the Regulation 166/06 then a permit should not be given, I am not sure how the province can "force" the CA to provide a permit.

Conditions:

Wetland creation and land base compensation in the same area should be one of the conditions if a permit is to be provided. This could and should include removal of impervious area within the same water shed and creation of wetlands on developable land, not just wetland creation on lands that are already deemed protected.

The board has an obligation to mitigate any impacts of this impervious area through LIDS, sustainable development, green roof, bioretention, dense plantings etc. There should be NO increase in runoff, decrease in water quality or loss of infiltration for this warehouse.

TRCA used to be the leader in LID technology, ESC measures and a model for other CA's. The Living City guideline is an amazing document and the board of directors and the CEO should be supporting the experts that follow that guide. Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. Please understand that I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

Please accept this as a letter to be included in the TRCA's Board of Directors Hearing on Friday March 12, 2021, regarding the the Duffins Creek Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) Complex. I am writing as an ecotoxicologist, with my research largely interested in Canadian freshwater.

As I understand there is currently discussion about removing the PSW complex surrounding Duffins Creek for development. Additionally, because of the imposed regulations (Regulation 159/21) there is are time constraints in place for accepting scientific review. Conducting a proper scientific review of the area is incredibly important to ensure that permit conditions are fair, and evidence based.

Currently, the proposed conditions for filling in the Duffins Creek PSW will result in unjustifiable losses in ecosystem services. In my opinion, there are several conditions that must be incorporated and met by the developer prior to commencing any project with the wetland. This is not an exhaustive list but are some of the top priorities I think need to be met by developers before they start any interference on the wetlands:

- 1) Permits under the Federal Fisheries Act as this is likely a fish habitat
- 2) Consultation and meaningfully accommodation with First Nations.
- 3) Permits should not allow any disturbance during this season bird migration. (Bird migration in the area is already underway for this year, and birds are very sensitive to disturbances especially during their migration)
- 4) Completing a full Environmental Assessment, the 2019 EA was incomplete (in particular it was missing Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp portion of the property to the south)
- 5) The qualified ecologist supervising the site as it is being developed should be approved by TRCA

Wetlands are incredibly diverse, productive, and valuable habitats. Their benefits are far reaching including flood mitigation, restoring ground water, improving and maintaining high water quality, carbon sequestration, habitat for wildlife, recreational opportunities and other opportunities. Experts have estimated wetlands in Ontario provide over \$14 billion dollars in benefits annually. Researchers have pointed out that wetland restoration can take 20-50 years before restored wetlands can begin to provide the same quality of services to the previous natural wetland (Moreno-Mateos et al., 2012). Thus, it imperative that we protect these natural wetlands and treat them with the appropriate level of importance. We should not be undergoing development or interference in these areas lightly.

If passed, this bill will retroactively change environmental protection laws so that the current appeals system in place can be overridden and be changed without an appeals process, silencing the voices of the people living in this province.

These changes would be extremely short-sighted and would only benefit developers; once they collect their money they will walk away and it will be Ontarians who are left to deal with the drawbacks. Developing protected land will increase flood risks in many areas, destroy wildlife habitat, and cause irreparable harm to the environment and biodiversity in Southern Ontario.

The benefits that protecting wetlands provide such as soil stabilization, flood mitigation, the provision of wildlife habitats, water quality improvement, and recreation and educational opportunities are so much more valuable to Ontario than whatever developments are slated to be made on these lands. A warehouse can be built somewhere else. Once a wetland is gone, it's gone.

TO all interested parties regarding Pickering Wetlands Development

Speaking both as a former TRCA Director, and as a Humber flood plain resident well aware of the horrors that events like Hurricane Hazel and the July 2013 storm brought to my community, I must stress that protecting people from extreme weather events by the appropriate agencies is essential, and that to ignore their advice by placing development in a wetland is criminal negligence.

The only real protection we have from flooding is distance. A buffer zone, be it called a floodplain, beach, or wetland, mitigates the worst outcomes of flooding. Failure to provide this protection will eventually cost far more than the potential profits of development.

Buildings with foundations below water level get flooded, if not overland then by surcharged sewage systems or infiltration.

TRCA was created to protect the GTA from flooding after more than 80 people died in a single storm. To override advice TRCA bases on 67 years research and experience is folly.

I further notice that the Ontario government is retroactively changing laws to avoid compliance with accepted practice without public consultation.

Although the conditions to be attached specifically state: ***Irrevocability:*** *All parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the Conservation Authorities Act agree that if future legislation or regulations are enacted impacting the permitted area, there will be no ability to reduce the agreed upon conditions* I think we all agree that such a clause will be as durable as a snow fort in the Sahara in July. We applaud the statement that "TRCA's Board of Directors and staff, using a science-based approach to decision making and TRCA's living city policies, would ordinarily decline permission of such a permit". We deplore the actions of the Ontario government to undercut the TRCA with retractive measures – where is it going to end? Given the situation, we unequivocally support the set of special conditions formulated by TRCA staff and described on pages 19 to 31 of the TRCA staff report for the hearing scheduled for March 12, 2021.

However, given the undue pressure by the Ontario Government on the TRCA, despite Ontario Regulation 159/21 and as very concerned citizens, we urge the TRCA to consider an alternate course of action:

- A stay motion has been launched at the Ontario Divisional Court by Ecojustice based on the notion that the recent actions by the Ontario Government respecting the Pickering Wetlands are unlawful. The TRCA should reject issuing the permit for the proposed development on the Pickering wetlands until the stay motion has been decided (including any appeals).
- The same would hold if legal action is undertaken by the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation in respect of the lack of consultation. (The TRCA should consult with the First Nations on the conditions of the permit.)

We do not believe that signing an agreement with the developer prior to resolution of the legal action is in the public interest. Consider the stay motion is successful forcing abandonment of the project, and initial site clearing has been completed under the present time line!

If the legal issues are ultimately settled in favour of the Ontario government, the list of conditions as prepared by TRCA staff should not be abandoned, in full or in part, during the hearing on March 12, 2021. The conditions spell out in detail what we, as interested lay people, could have formulated as follows:

- A detailed and scientifically sound plan by the proponent is required on how to preserve the adjacent wetlands from further damage during construction and operation of the warehouse. This includes final engineering plans for water management.
- A detailed and scientifically sound plan is necessary for remedial measures undertaken at the warehouse site to mitigate loss of flood control and impact on wildlife, including bird migration. Specifically, to avoid any delay between initial site clearing and start of actual construction, site clearing should not commence until **after** Site Plan approval under the Planning Act has been received for the project.
- To provide compensatory **wetlands** in addition to the site currently offered by the proponent but considered inadequate by TRCA staff to provide compensation for the

warehouse site. The additional site should provide the same ecological and hydrological functions as the warehouse parcel. Public consultations should be part of this evaluation. As concerned taxpayers, we urge the TRCA to refuse to issue, as demanded by Ontario Regulation 159/21, the permit for the begin of wetland destruction (site clearing) in preparation for warehouse construction **unless the legal issues have first been settled and until all standard and special permit conditions have been met.**

It is my understanding that the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) has been forced to issue a permit for the above noted development pursuant a Ministerial Zoning Order (MZO). This short-sighted, black-box decision making does not represent "Good Planning", nor does it serve the long-term needs of the community and watershed. It has been clear that site specific planning decisions have historically not considered cumulative impacts as we have seen with damages done to poorly planned communities in the past decade. As watershed managers, I trust the TRCA's expertise and experience to properly assess sites and properly guide cities to achieve the best planned communities possible that benefit the members of all species and sets them on a path for sustainable economic growth, not just short-sighted gains as I see happening here.

In light of these problematic changes to the land use planning processes, the only tools available to TRCA to ensure the long-term functions of the ecological systems is to apply conditions to the permit to try to safeguard the site and protect surrounding land. As a community member of Bayly and Squires, I strongly urge that that ALL these conditions are implemented and met by the city and developers.

It is completely heartbreaking to watch this political strong-arm play out in my own backyard. Pickering's waterfront and creeks are as beautiful as they are functional and are part of the reason many community members chose to live in this region. It is my belief that this is best highlighted by the overwhelming use of the area during this last year during the Covid 19 pandemic. The conditions that TRCA is proposing to their permit are critically important to ensure that off-site negative impacts are mitigated, and that the loss of a significant natural area is compensated.

Please accept this as my written submission in support of the conditions. Thank you.

I appreciate the hard work and thoughtful, fact-based permit conditions the TRCA has placed on the permit applicant, especially considering the much-too-short timeline for doing so.

While one can't really put a value on priceless coastal wetland, I support the TRCA's condition that multiple millions of dollars be provided in compensation for the loss of ecosystem services. And frankly, I don't believe \$4.4 million, and the annual per hectare compensation, is enough. Timelines for finalizing this compensation agreement need to be extended to allow more time for the TRCA to get input from others with expertise in this area to flesh out the actual costs of the loss of this admittedly priceless wetland and the services it provides.

Also the "replacement" land should be located in the same watershed area, close to Lower Duffins Creek and cover the same number of hectares. Right now the developer's proposal, at 3-5 hectares of wetland, is only about 25% of the area of the wetland to be lost. Providing some unrelated non-watershed land cannot compensate for wetland destruction. Suitable public lands in the area that are not already in the provincial or municipal natural heritage system are few and far between, as noted by TRCA. I support the conservation authority's call for the permit holder to convey to TRCA additional privately-owned lands that are suitable, with their call for the payment to them of the associated costs that would need to be covered.

I also support requirements for relocation of "regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species/communities identified by the ecologist", with the required final report.

NOTE: It took thousands of years for the formation of the intricate, genetic-level relationships between the plants and living creatures using the wetland. A wetland can't be "constructed" overnight. Nor can it really be moved to a new location. Any attempt to do this would be completely inadequate.

In addition, thousands of migrating birds will lose a stopover point in an area where it can't be replaced.

In summary, I fully support the conditions proposed by the TRCA, and believe they should be extended, with more time allowed to determine the additional conditions required.

To the TRCA:

I both attach my comments in a document and include them in this email.

I am a wetland ecologist working and studying at the University of Waterloo, and I have been following the progression of the Duffins Creek Wetland development with horror. If, as it seems likely, the destruction of the Duffins Creek Wetlands will go ahead due to the underhanded and disreputable dealings of the Ontario government, it cannot be over-emphasised how much damage will be done: this wetland is a large, contiguous area of wetland, something that is rare in southern Ontario; it provides important flood, erosion, and water quality management; it is valuable habitat for many organisms, as wetlands are amongst the most productive and biologically diverse habitats in the world; it has recreational value particularly for the residents of Pickering and Ajax; it provides vital carbon sequestration. Studies have shown that intact wetlands in a landscape can reduce the financial burdens of major flood events, in both rural and urban settings, by up to 38%, and the ongoing costs for water filtrations, flood mitigation, and soil retention are far less when wetlands are allowed to remain, rather than attempting to replace their services with human infrastructure. Wetlands are incredibly important for so many reasons, and the Duffins Creek wetlands are

To that end, compensation for its destruction must be substantial. The suggestion of 1 to 1 compensation, as I have seen from the developer, is laughable. Firstly, compensation wetlands rarely achieve the same functionality as the original wetland, so any created or restored wetlands to compensate for the Duffins Creek wetlands must be restored or created at a far higher ratio. Due to the geographical realities of southern Ontario it is highly unlikely that any compensation wetlands will be such a large, contiguous area, so they will never be as valuable as the wetland that will be destroyed. Further, compensation wetlands take between 20 to 50 years to achieve whatever levels of replacement that they are able to; science has shown that this time period is crucial in our efforts to combat climate change, protect vital habitat, and retain important ecosystem services - the loss of the Duffins Creek wetlands at a time like this is incalculable. Even if a suitable amount of compensation wetland is created and appropriately managed, the compensation wetlands will not be in the same location, so the residents of Pickering will never be compensated for the loss of their local wetlands; the compensation wetlands will not be of the same functionality for decades, if that same functionality is ever reached, so the loss of ecosystem services such as flood and erosion control and water quality maintenance will never be compensated; and the compensation wetlands will be more fragmented, reducing their quality as habitat and their breadth of ecosystem services. Compensation wetlands must be insisted upon on a large scale, to even begin to approach replicating the benefits of the current Duffins Creek wetlands, and, finally, it is not enough that compensatory wetlands are created, they must be actively managed so as to promote healthy ecosystem functions, maximal benefits for flood, erosion, and water quality control, and large amounts of biodiversity.

I fully support the TRCA in imposing conditions upon this development, both in terms of the compensation wetlands that must be created and restored, and in the progress of the development itself. The permit for development should not be granted immediately; at the very least it must be delayed until the migration and breeding seasons of this year have passed. Frequent access for trained ecological observers must be allowed, and work should be stopped if any breaches of the permit are found.

Finally, adequate consultation with First Nations must be completed before any actions of the permit are allowed to proceed. The Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation have repeatedly expressed their concerns about this development, and have in fact denounced the decision to expedite the destruction of this wetland, and it is clear that their Legal and Treaty Rights are being ignored and disregarded. They must be included in these decisions.

Hello Alisa,

My name is Stacey Kerr, and I was the last Lead Coordinator of the Ontario BioBlitz program before we lost funding and support for our outreach work and events and were unable to secure the funding needed to sustain the program's work. I was able to dedicate a full year of my own donated time and energy to conduct our last events, but needed to pursue other options in order to survive and pay my own bills. One of the last full-scale bioblitz events that we held took place in the Duffins Creek Watershed in 2018, where we engaged hundreds of participants in exploring the biodiversity of this area. From our work in the north at the Claremont Nature Centre, to guided outreach for school groups at Rotary Park in Ajax, we highlighted the richness that this coastal urban marsh contains, be it natural features or biodiversity of this unique place. You can see the events we held, as well as an iNaturalist project with all the species documented here: <https://www.ontariobioblitz.ca/2018-durham-region-bioblitzes.html>

I believe that the ongoing large scale commercial development of land that includes and is adjacent to parts of the Duffins Creek wetland has a strong chance of directly undermining our ability to address conservation and biodiversity issues with the general public. For urban audiences, biodiversity is often something that happens "over there" in remote "wilderness", which reinforces the false dichotomy that we are separate from the natural world. It is this disconnect that leads to our shortsighted plans (like this) to continue to build over land that provides valuable ecosystem services to us and limit our access to wilder spaces that are close to home. This is a loss that cannot be mitigated through strictly financial recompense and economic returns for a tourism attraction. This is a loss that many people will feel without understanding why or how. Much of the land in question for the second part of this development is highly degraded, with strong edge effects on any existing habitats. In a lot of ways, the damage has already been done by Stage 1 and overall development of the area, and all we can do is try to mitigate further damage to what is left. This entire process of constantly trying to convince developers and politicians that the environment has value and that we need it to remain intact for our collective wellbeing is ultimately exhausting and sad. This development will undoubtedly have an impact on the broader Duffins Creek wetland complex, and that needs to be taken into account if the "low impact" development style is to be truly brought to fruition.

Conditions that should be added for the applicant should include restrictions to a number of proposed elements, for example any botanical gardens built into the tourism hub should contain species that are not characterized as invasive, and selection of cultivars should be done to ensure that they do not spread to the surrounding wetland and become invasive. Additionally, light sources and windows should be selected to minimize effects on wildlife, including but not limited to reducing bird strikes, particularly during seasonal migration as coastal wetlands like the Duffins Creek act as refugia during migration and the applicant will be reducing the safe spaces for migrating birds and should do more to limit further impacts. Buffer zones, as detailed

in the Beacon Environmental Impact Study, should be implemented, and an ongoing monitoring plan should be maintained to ensure that the potential use of this land by wildlife, particularly locally known potentially At Risk species including endangered birds, bats, and amphibians. This could also provide jobs in association with the development, and an opportunity for public engagement and environmental stewardship that the applicant should take seriously, given its location in proximity to the larger Duffins Creek system and coastal wetland.

This feels futile, but I had to try to provide input in some way to help protect what is left of this resilient wetland complex. I don't even live in Durham Region anymore, but I felt the need to try and speak up in any way that I could to try and help ensure that what is left of the Duffins Creek wetland is able to survive a little bit longer.

Hello Alisa Mahrova,

As an ecologist and environmental planner born and raised in Ontario, I fully support the TRCA in the matter of Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc.'s application to develop and interfere with the provincially significant wetland (PSW) at 1802 Bayly Street.

It is aberrant that the provincial government mandated the issuing of a permit with no consideration for the protection of natural areas, which contravenes both the Planning Act and the Provincial Policy Statement in regards to PSWs and the environmental assessment process.

As the TRCA is now required to issue the permit, the conditions imposed on the applicant are of utmost importance. The conditions proposed by the TRCA Staff Report are reasonable and ensure compensation of the wetland. Ecosystem compensation is necessary to ensure the net loss of wetland habitat and functions is minimized. The Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation was not developed for projects of this magnitude, as normally the TRCA would not grant a permit to alter a PSW. The costs estimated by the TRCA to restore the equivalent habitat type and land surface are the minimum that can be asked. Large restoration projects are more costly and complicated than the small scale that the Guideline was developed to address. PSWs are complexes of habitats that give multiple ecosystem services and are not easily replicated.

In conclusion, I ask the Board of Directors to stand with the TRCA and ensure that the TRCA has the support it requires to mitigate negative the impacts on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land, or any circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property.

I am making this submission in respect of the Hearing on March 12, 2021 under s. 28.0.1 (7) of the *Conservation Authorities Act* (Act) in respect of the application by Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. (Applicant) for the permission of the Conservation Authority, pursuant to Section 28.0.1 of the Act, to site grade, temporarily or permanently place, dump or remove any material, originating on the site or elsewhere, and interfere with a wetland to remove a Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) located at 1802 Bayly Street, in the City of Pickering.

I have carefully reviewed the report of Conservation Authority Staff, dated March 8, 2021 (Report), that is appended to the Agenda for the March 12, 2021 Hearing and, in particular, the following sections:

- Permit Application and Property Description, which describe the PSW and and Significant Wildlife Habitat on the subject lands, and the significant potential for interference with these by the activities for which permission is being requested by the Applicant.
- Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) and Mandatory Permits for MZO Development Projects, which explain the constraints that the Act (as recently amended) impose on the powers which would otherwise be available to the Conservation Authority in the absence of the issuance of the MZO in respect of the subject lands.

My name is Val Endicott and I have been following the developments at Duffin's Creek with horror. Once again, developers are getting their way. Once again, it is the indigenous leaders who are making space for us to all stand up and be heard. Thank you for listening and taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at [1802 Bayly St.](#) This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I am forwarding the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at [1702 Squires Beach Rd.](#)) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria,

respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment

- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

In fact, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland. I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

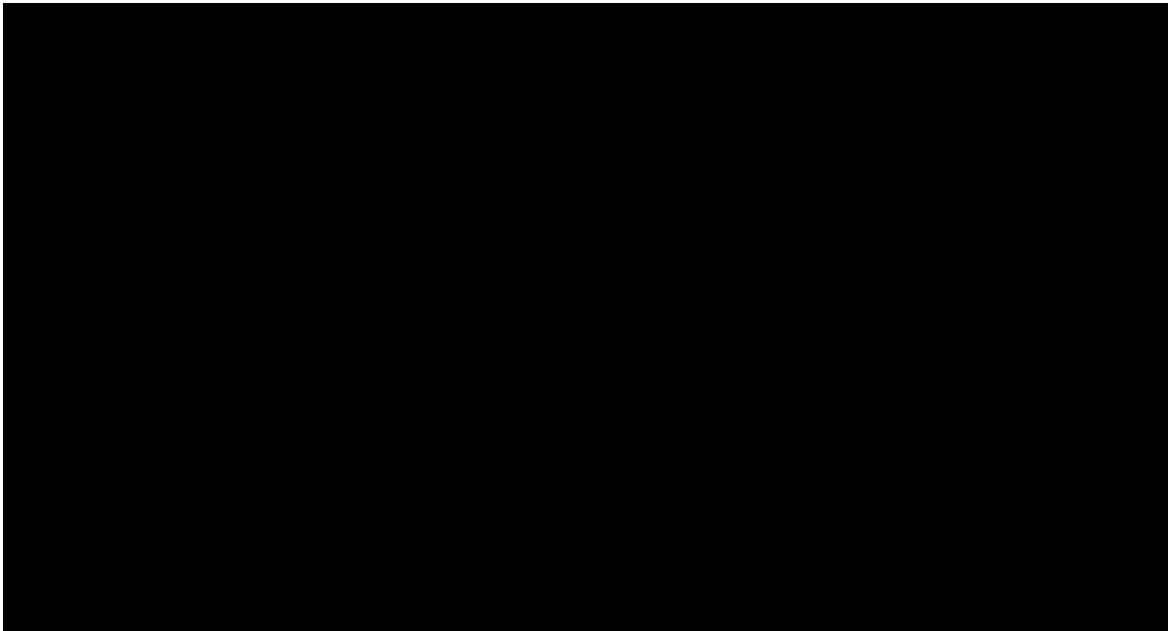

As a 40-yr-resident of north Pickering, on farmland that is criss-crossed by the Urfé Creek, which flows into the Duffins, I thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021.

I understand the TRCA is being forced to grant a permit for development under duress, and I am both angered by the lack of process and bullying tactics of the Provincial Government, and gobsmacked by the suggestion that another wetland could be "built" in, of all places, the top of the provincially protected Carruthers Creek watershed. This is tantamount to cutting off someone's perfectly good leg and attaching a shiny new prosthetic -- *to their shoulder*. It looks ridiculous, costs a fortune, and **doesn't do the job**.

To wit:

- loss of natural ecosystem services
- increased flood risk
- discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution
- impact to wildlife habitat
- holding public consultation on any plans
- committing to science-based planning

All that said, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.

- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands: Draining the Swamp

I thought that “draining the swamp”, was just a figure of speech. Recently, the Ontario government by way of a Minister’s Zoning Order (MZO), signalled its intent to approve a plan to literally drain the swamp.

The swamp in this instance is the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands near Pickering, Ontario and the group doing the draining is Triple Properties Inc. This is taking place in spite of the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority’s (TRCA) advice to the contrary. The TRCA is the group mandated by government to maintain the natural integrity of the Toronto Region, and to advise government when proposals such as the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands are presented for consideration.

The TRCA in its report warned that the eradication of the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands, in addition to environmental concerns, would result in the flooding of two nearby communities. As a result, the TRCA intended to refuse a permit to build on the site. Both the Ontario government and developer have chosen to circumvent the TRCA, by applying for an MZO.

Swamps have been drained before, e.g. the Don and Humber River projects, in the name of flood control and recreation. 60 years later, lessons have been learned and groups are trying to restore them. Regrettably, in most cases they cannot.

Is it not enough that we continue to develop our green spaces, and as a result threaten the aquifers that flow through, and beneath them? But now we are gentrifying those natural, important spaces that were either overlooked, or considered undesirable back in the day.

Jobs are important, especially considering the plight of those suffering from current events. However, so is the place we live, the water we drink, and the long term consequences of short term planning.

To the members of the TRCA Board,

I wish to express my continued concerns over the unnecessary development of sensitive wetlands located at 1802 Bayly Street, and ask that the following be included as my submission for the March 12th Board hearing for same.

My family have been residents of Pickering in excess of 50 years, with many extended family members owing households to the South/West of this development. I myself moved back into the family home, purchasing it from my parent's estate, in no small part due to it's proximity to the lake and wetlands.

I recognize based on TRCA's own statements, that the board is currently compelled to provide a permit, despite ongoing public outcry and without appropriate consultation, given the Premier of Ontario and Provincial Progressive Conservative government are retroactively changing laws to intentionally strip the TRCA of powers.

On that basis, I have the following comments on the conditions of this development, particularly as the developer is attempting to contest some of these conditions.

1. Paramount is that the TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams First Nations on the conditions of this permit.\
2. The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development. A total of 18 ha + .31ha from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach of wetland. The proposed compensation is not nearly sufficient. This must be resolved before the developer is allowed to begin construction.
3. The Developer must use a qualified, independent ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities before any construction is permitted to start.
4. An independent review of the Compensation agreement should be commissioned by TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the sole expense of the Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for lands being destroyed.
5. The developer be mandated to create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control criteria. Prior to any fill being place on the site, a qualified, third party professional must certify the fill does not contain any harmful contaminants.

6. As a resident, I am particularly concerned that the developer create a storm water management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's storm water management criteria.

No amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species being destroyed by this unnecessary warehouse development. It will be impossible to replace these wetlands.

I trust TRCA will stand firm on their conditions, and that all public comments and expert comments will be considered during tomorrow's session.

It is incredibly disappointing that Pickering Council, one of whom sits on the TRCA board, supports the destruction of this critical land, when so many other opportunities are available to build this warehouse in Pickering. I live in an area adjacent to industrial space, with new lights and signage glaring into my yard and my home, invading my privacy daily. I've lived with the dirt and debris and off hours construction work that violates permitted work times, with companies leaving their debris leaning against and damaging our property fences, without a word of complaint to the City. This is not about "NIMBY'ism", this is about the loss of critical, irreplaceable wetlands at the hands of developers.

Toronto Region Conservation Authority Board:

I appreciate the opportunity to participate, albeit to a limited extent, regarding the Duffins Creek Wetland development application at 1802 Bayly St.. It has been very stressful to have been shut out of the process to date and I'm thankful that you are taking public comments on the conditions for the development.

As someone who considers herself to be an engaged resident, I have been a proud Ajax resident for 32 years. Thirteen of those years was spent as a member of Citizens For Carruthers, a group not opposed to development but a proponent for smart and environmentally responsible development. C4C was recognized by the TRCA and the Town of Ajax for working with stakeholders to provide a knowledgeable citizen voice, resulting in the preservation of the Carruthers Wetland Complex while also resulting in the much recognized Lakeview Community development which is a jewel in the developer's cap. As well, I was a member of Minister Jim Flaherty's Lynde Shore Alliance, a provincial group mandated to assist in the identification and purchase of lands around Lynde Shores Wetland to mitigate the negative impacts of the Lynde Shores development. The measured and knowledgeable voices of residents and community groups can certainly result in better development with our environment as a priority.

I would like to be clear that I believe that this provincially significant wetland should be protected in its entirety, however, since the TRCA is being compelled under duress to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I would like to make the following comments on the conditions of development.

1. If the developer is going to destroy 18+ hectares of wetland, they should be required to provide the same land in return (or more) as compensation. Certainly, residents have been told that the developer will rehabilitate land to replace the wetland and I'm sure residents are expecting a robust and detailed plan of how the developer will compensate them for the loss of a provincially significant wetland. As I believe that it is unlikely that the function and value of this wetland can be replaced, a minimum of 18+ hectares should be identified, and a robust restoration plan provided, before construction begins.
2. It is only fair that the developer should be required to pay the cost for an independent review of the Compensation Agreement to define cash payment for ecological lands being destroyed. This should not be a disputed item. The TRCA should be able to commission this review using qualified ecologists at the developer's expense. Let's be clear, this wetland is a community asset and its destruction should be fully compensated. As a taxpayer, I expect compensation and I expect my elected officials and government agencies to protect my interests.

3. The developer should be providing the expertise necessary to build responsibly in line with their promise to compensate the community for a lost wetland. A qualified ecologist (one approved of by the TRCA) should be hired to transplant and carefully relocate all regional, local and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before construction begins.
4. The developer must be willing to provide and abide by plans to satisfy TRCA Erosion Settlement Control Guideline and Stormwater Management criteria. Let us not lose sight of the fact that the TRCA has been guided by good policy based on science and the protection of citizens and the environment. They have the expertise and we should be listening to them.
5. Before any fill is placed on the site, there is no question that professionals be hired to ensure that the fill is clear of contaminants that will harm the environment.
6. There needs to be meaningful consultation with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit. Our indigenous citizens are knowledgeable environmental stewards and their voices should be sought, respected, and learned from.
7. It is apparent that flooding is an unfortunate reality in our future. Wetlands are a natural answer to this threat and I am saddened that we don't have a focus on the value of wetlands by our elected officials and this developer. It will be residents that pay the price and I don't believe taxpayer's interests are being accounted for in this shortsighted development plan. Therefore, if we are going to lose our wetland, the developer should be required to create a stormwater management plan that not only meets, but exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.

Although I love our wetlands and our natural environment, I didn't seek out the fight to defend them. This fight was thrust upon me because of threats to their protection and preservation. I have not spoken to one resident who supports this warehouse plan. We all recognize that this wetland can not be simply replaced - we can not fool ourselves into believing we can replicate nature. The habitat for wildlife will be lost and species will be lost. This development is unacceptable on so many levels.

I wish, as a resident, that my right to participate had been protected, and that I had been given the opportunity to have a voice, but I was silenced by an MZO. So, I implore you to listen to residents and experts, and to support TRCA conditions for this development.

My name is Jeff Good, and I have lived in Ajax, ON, for the last 6 years. Duffins Creek is a short drive from my house, and we often take walks through this area. We think of this as “our” local parkland.

Thus, I appreciate your taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment
- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

While I understand you may not be able to halt this short-sighted and misguided development, I offer one other thought. There is already, and has been for a long time, an alternative site for this development. Keeping this wetland does NOT mean losing jobs or the warehouse – there is a nearby site that is ready to go that has already had approvals and environmental standards approved. We do NOT have to destroy this wetland.

With that said, no amount of money nor “restored” wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland. I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

These are my comments on what should be taken into consideration when providing a permit to destroy a Provincially Significant Wetland in the City of Pickering.

Some of this email mimics what may have been submitted to the TRCA already. I have added comments after the first set of important facts for consideration. Please my personal comments for submission.

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. Comments related to the compensation that the developer shall be required to fulfill:

- Determination of loss of natural ecosystem services must be first completed before any and all construction activities begin and that all costs be charged to the developer, and monitoring programs shall be developed by the TRCA and all lacking mitigations factors shall be included in the costs for a period of 10 years after all construction activities have been completed.
- increased flood risk shall be mitigated before any and all construction activities begin. Flood risks shall be evaluated in both areas of up stream and down stream along the Duffins Creek and compensation activities shall be completed before any and all construction activities begin. The TRCA shall be the lead in this area and any and all compensation shall be born by the developer. Monitoring of flood risks shall be done for a period of 5 years after all construction activities have ceased. If there are further mitigation efforts needed to mitigate flood risks, these efforts shall be born onto the developer.
- discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution shall be mitigated and monitored on a daily basis by an independent consultant and shall provide weekly reports during the time of construction and shall be monitored for a period of 5 years after any and all construction activities have been completed. Weekly reports shall be made public and the TRCA shall have responsibilities for orders to complete any works that need to be done on a weekly basis.
- impact to wildlife habitat will happen because of this development. There are species living in this wetland as permanent habitat. All living species currently using this wetland have to be collected and moved to a suitable location. This would include amphibian, turtle, and the like species. Bird species shall not be ignored and must be allowed to nest during the nest cycles and migrating birds must be allowed to stop over as this may have been considered as a stop over or loafing site. Construction activities must be halted during these period until such time as migrating and permanent bird species have ceased to use the area covered under the permit. As indicated, all wildlife habitat shall be compensated before any construction activities start and compensation shall be provided by the Developer and that no Tax Payer dollars shall be used at anytime for environmental mitigation processes. This will include all mitigation factors explained in this email.
- holding public consultation on any plans shall be held for not only the residents of the City of Pickering, but for all residents of Ontario as this is a Provincial decision to allow this development to proceed. This should be done on a regular basis, by-monthly, until such time as all environmental factors have been completed and that there are no further impacts to the environment and that all flood risks have been mitigated.

- committing to science-based planning is first and foremost. This development does go against all science-based planning. Therefore this cannot be used as precedence setting development that may guide further development in other municipalities in the province of Ontario. The permit holders must negate any other development within its area of control, City of Pickering, Province of Ontario, to guide further development outside areas of environmental concerns and that all further development must uphold climate change mitigation efforts.
- All buildings or structures must be built to best mitigate climate change efforts. Green roofs, up-to-date construction materials, recyclable materials where possible to be used. All completed construction shall show best practices for future development. This development must be a show case for future developments of this nature, in reduction of climate change effects, low impact development ideas, reduction of heat Island effects due to large heat absorbing surfaces, parking and flat roof areas, and should be done in such a way that all environmental effects be reduced and even eliminated. This includes air, water, and terrestrial issues that will be of concern in the future.

In view of the application for judicial review filed with the Ontario Divisional Court by Ecojustice, representing Ontario Nature and Environmental Defence, scheduled to be heard March 15, 2021, I would ask you to consider including as a condition of the permit you are now legally required to issue to Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. /Triple Group of Companies on March 12, 2021, a condition that the permit issue but come into effect after the Ontario Divisional Court issues its decision.

This application for judicial review is a new development that the TRCA Staff Report to the Board did not anticipate. If the permit issues on March 12 and is effective immediately, it raises the risk of imminent harm to the wetland at 1802 Bayley Street by Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc./Triple Group of Companies. The wetland could be significantly harmed before Monday's application before the Ontario Divisional Court is heard. Damage or destruction to property that is the subject of judicial review could have serious implications for parties to that review.

I would ask you to consider that recognizing the judicial authority of the Ontario Divisional Court to hear and determine this application while the wetland remains protected and in its current condition is a fair and reasonable permit condition. It would restrain damage or destruction to the wetland property while other relevant legal issues are given fair hearing and decision. It would ensure that the TRCA Board, under difficult circumstances, respects both due process and its mandate uphold to Ontario's conservation policies.

Hi, please find attached my statement for the upcoming hearing this Friday March 12th.

I am not in support of the expedited and interfering process in which the MZOs are ordering, and hope that the TRCA finds support in my statement.

The wetlands act as natural energy dissipation areas for coastal regions, urban settlements, and is one of the few remaining homes we have left to wildlife in our growing area. If you remove some of these spared (from early waves of colonial settlement) areas, this interference will lead to ever increasing/rising water levels due to hardened surfaces that are already in place, accelerating downstream flow to the Great Lakes. In the future, this will be extremely difficult to mitigate and will be costly to both pay-now to overwrite and recreate these areas, and then remediate once again as we adjust to the pressured coastal edges (now, and in the near future). The broader hydrological context must be respected and addressed, and I can think of many alternatives for land 'use' here, that can position Pickering as an environmentally conscious and ethical leader in the area. This does not do that. In 2019, we saw dramatic flooding along the shore, and this will continue to happen if we do not allow comprehensive and holistic environmental assessments, community feedback and First Nations input. This continues a recursion, a top-down approach that hurts me, the next generation, and has been hurting First Nations livelihoods for several centuries. **Keeping our wetlands is an asset for the future, and this choice -- now, is highly innovative.** There are many other places that this casino/warehouse can go, and I know that using the natural features as a selling point will be done, ironically killing it at the same time. This land should be kept, guided -- not interfered -- to allow the structural and natural functions of erosion mitigation, water filtration, wave dissipation and honour to our water source, offering a sanctuary for species migratory and native. I can see a space (that stretches well beyond Pickering, ie. incorporating Rougehill - Darlington / the entire Lake Ontario Basin - Oak Ridges Moraine) that can set precedent for the future in honour and respect, in environmental protection and crisis mitigation.

Maintaining this course, set by our Ford government, is brutal. Evident in over the 30 MZOs issued in the last year, this is an abuse of power that does not consider the people but considers money 'for the people.' I understand this as a reaction to the pandemic, to create jobs and housing and important processes to facilitate growth. In the long term, though, these choices will come back as a gluttonous expenditure, made undemocratically, and seen as choice to privy \$ over land, seeing land as \$. This is obviously not new in a colonial setting. Over 50% of Ontario's fish species reside here. Many have been exterminated by the increased toxins and salinity from infrastructures such as the 401. This watershed breaks provincial and federal boundaries, so a large scale, rigorous implementation of care and action are needed now. We need action that supports the maintenance of clean water and natural structural

stability. Abstracting and overriding zoning and environmental protections in the name of progress is disheartening. Choices with the land must be viewed outside a discourse of land ownership, tourism, industry, and hasty economic moves. It is a shame that these processes are being executed in this way. It could have been more fruitful in the long term otherwise. I figure that this will go on as the government has planned, as they usually do, and if the case, I would appreciate reconsidering a rhetoric around 'for the people' as you insist. If these decisions really were for the people, this would have been done with care, communication, and clarity, with a mindful withdrawal from protected and coastal area, and without an MZO.

I am a landscape/architecture student at the University of Toronto, and as I am entering my future profession, I have yet the means to express evidence in such as short notice (which I see as intentional to favour the expediting process), so hope that my voice is honoured. I don't speak for my entire generation, but this land is all that I know. My family doesn't have means to travel or escape, we are low-middle class working folks, and for people who live here, it is one of the reduced areas of wildlife left to us, one that has potential to grow into a mature and valued environmental 'resource,' if I wish to deduce my language to yours.

Thanks for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment
- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

Our environment has been neglected for far too long and going forward we must make every effort to preserve and sustain our planet for the sake of future generations.

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. Dear Toronto Region Conservation Authority,

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. Please understand that I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

Concerns:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed

TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.

- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

I am concerned about the impact of the proposed development of the lands at Duffin's Creek wetlands due to :

- loss of natural ecosystem services
- increased flood risk
- discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution
- impact to wildlife habitat
- lack of holding public consultation on any plans
- lack of commitment to science-based planning

Re: MARCH 12TH HEARING: Submission of comments and recommendations regarding TRCA conditions to mitigate impacts of proposed destruction of the Lower Duffin's Creek Provincially Significant Wetland Complex at 1802 Bayly Street, Pickering, Ontario

Dear TRCA Board of Directors,

First, I would like to commend TRCA staff and the Board for preparing, under duress, a series of conditions to mitigate the **scientifically known negative impact** that infilling and removal of a considerable portion of lower Duffin's Creek Wetland Complex (DCWC) would have for this Provincially Significant coastal wetland. In stark contrast to governments across the Great Lakes basin spending hundreds of millions of dollars on coastal wetland restoration, it is beyond egregious that an imperilled coastal wetland in Ontario is being earmarked for further destruction. Apparently, the long-term ecosystem service valuation of a coastal wetland, in the order of tens of millions of dollars, is not as important for the public good as a warehouse. To be clear, **the current habitat condition and presence of invasive species in no way supersedes the ecological, hydrological, and biogeochemical value** of this portion of the DCWC to the Duffin's Creek Watershed.

I am an aquatic ecologist with over 25 years of experience studying freshwater ecosystems across Canada, including the Duffin's Creek Coastal Wetland adjacent to Lake Ontario. I have particular expertise in urban aquatic ecosystems, including stormwater management, and can unreservedly state that the physical removal and infilling of a portion of the DCWC cannot be replaced or offset anywhere else in the watershed, including the proposed compensation location. As an exceedingly rare urban wetland with substantial influence on the nearshore water quality of Lake Ontario, further urban development in the DCWC will only result in increased water quality degradation in the downstream coastal wetland that is home to an array of wildlife, including species at risk and migratory birds. I know the TRCA and Board is aware of this, but I think out of scientific principle and respect for evidence-based decision making, this must be stated up-front and for the record. The remainder of this comment submission will **speak directly to the proposed conditions attached to** the Applicant's permit.

With respect to the proposed compensation plan, I agree with TRCA staff that the compensation proposal is wholly insufficient in replacing lost habitat in either size or quality. Given the unprecedented legal

obligation for TRCA to attach conditions to the permit, I concur that **all stated conditions and special conditions are necessary** to mitigate some of the harm that will undoubtedly impact the Duffin's Creek Watershed as a result of the warehouse development. I must also reiterate staff's concerns surrounding the removal of the Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) designation, **especially for a Great Lakes coastal wetland**. Normally, wetland compensation off-sets require greater than a 1:1 replacement of destroyed wetland to compensate for hundreds to thousands of years of carbon sequestration and wetland succession, among other factors. In this case, the applicant is proposing to replace only 3 - 5 ha of wetland, **leaving 14 – 16 ha uncompensated which does not even fulfill the 1:1 compensation obligation**. This is wholly unacceptable.

I provide below specific comments pertaining to the list of Special Conditions as laid out in the **RECOMMENDED CONDITIONS TO THE PERMISSION**:

Special Condition 1: I recommend that TCRA revise this condition so that the permit **commences after the migratory bird season has ended for this year**. This will ensure that migratory birds are not unduly impacted by the Applicant's on-site development activities.

Special Condition 2: I explicitly support this condition, that prior to the execution of the agreement, the permit holder obtain **written confirmation that the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) does not object to the destruction of the PSW and approves of the compensation plan**. I also request that TRCA require MNRF's assurance that MNRF has adequately satisfied its **duty to consult** and meaningfully accommodate affected **First Nations**, including but not limited to the Williams Treaties First Nations with respect to these matters.

Special Condition 5: I support this condition, which requires the transfer of the identified land and the identification of other lands to privately owned lands for conveyance to TRCA or funds to allow TRCA to do this. However, I am concerned about the low likelihood of finding suitable land. Therefore, I request that a **precondition** to the entry into an agreement. If the developer provides funding rather than specific land, **no work should proceed until TRCA has identified land that will adequately recreate the lost benefits on a local scale**.

Special Condition 9: I support any condition that requires an increase in the amount of compensation to be provided by the Applicant, and think it is wise for the TRCA to receive compensation funds **prior to the work taking place**. However, as stated above, the amount of land being proposed for compensation is entirely insufficient.

Special Condition 10: As an expert in urban stormwater management as it pertains to water quality treatment, I am disturbed by the lack of sufficient plans and assurances that stormwater infrastructure will meet provincial standards of control, retention, and discharge to receiving waters, not to mention flood mitigation. I can say based on a decade of studying stormwater management ponds, that they **do not replace wetland function and can instead serve as major sources of contaminants** such as phosphorus and chloride. This condition should be revised to **require the actual approval of the site plan** prior to the entry of the agreement.

Special Condition 13: In addition to requiring the completion of a transportation plan for certain species that may be disrupted during work, I request that this condition **explicitly require TRCA approval of the plan prior to the implementation of any work.**

Special Condition 17: In addition to requiring these permits from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP), TRCA should require that, prior to the execution of the agreement, an independent ecologist approved by the TRCA will survey the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibian calls, and other species in accordance with guidance prepared by the MNRF and MECP to confirm presence or absence. The survey shall include the southern portions of the property and the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp. The ecologist shall submit a report on the results of the surveys to the MECP for the works. Thereafter, the applicant shall provide confirmation from the MECP that a permit has been obtained or that no such permit is necessary.

In addition to the special condition amendments above, I request that **additional conditions** be added to the list including:

1. Indigenous Engagement and Consultation

The document does not address consultation with the Williams Treaty First Nations who have requested that the MZO be revoked. I urge TRCA to ensure that the proposed conditions and the subsequent agreement **meets Ontario's obligations to consult with and meaningfully accommodate First Nations, including their Treaty Rights.** Prior to the Execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain written confirmation from **MNRF that its duty to consult and accommodate has been satisfied.** TRCA must go beyond the formality of merely acknowledging indigenous land and instead **meaningfully protect the rights and interests of First Nations on the land where it has jurisdiction.**

2. Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) Permits

As a PSW and Lake Ontario Coastal Wetland that provides important fish habitat, I have already stated that water quality conditions, and thus fish habitat conditions, will be negatively impacted in the downstream coastal marsh portion of DCWC. However, I also request that TRCA include a condition that prior to the execution of the agreement, a qualified fisheries ecologist approved by the TRCA survey Headwater Feature A at an appropriate season to confirm the presence or absence of Fish Habitat. The ecologist shall submit a report to DFO certifying the presence or absence of direct or indirect fish habitat. The permit applicant should be required to provide any necessary permits under the federal *Fisheries Act* or confirmation from DFO that no permits or authorizations are required in the form of a letter of advice. Without these surveys, information to DFO in support of an application may be inaccurate. **Provincial policy requires that the work be carried out in accordance with federal fish habitat requirements.**

3. Fill Characterization and Compliance

TRCA should include a condition requiring that prior to any fill being placed on the site, a Qualified Person within the meaning in the *Environmental Protection Act* must certify that it does not contain any contaminants within the definitions provided for in the *Environmental Protection Act*. To determine this, soil analyses must be undertaken by a laboratory with an internationally recognized accreditation body [e.g.

Standards Council of Canada (SCC) or Canadian Association for Laboratory Accreditation (CALA)] and in accordance with the International Standard ISO/IEC 17025 General Requirements for the Competence of Testing and Calibration Laboratories. Analytical procedures should be conducted as outlined in section 47 of Ontario Regulation 153/04 and in the Protocol for Analytical Methods Used in the Assessment of Properties under Part XV.1 of the Environmental Protection Act, July 1, 2011.

A Qualified Person should further **certify that the fill does not contain compost, engineered fill products, asphalt, concrete, re-used or recycled aggregate product and/or mine tailings, other products, including soil mixed with debris such as garbage, shingles, painted wood, ashes, or other refuse.**

Prior to placing any fill on the site, a Qualified Person must **certify that the fill has been treated or obtained in a manner that would prevent invasive species** from being contained within the fill.

Prior to placing any fill on the site, the Qualified Person shall prepare a Fill Management Plan, which outlines the overall condition and operation of the Receiving Site and should include the following:

1. Procedures to prevent the introduction of invasive plant or animal species;
2. Copies of any documentation regarding municipal or Conservation Authority licences/permits, provisions of provincial plans which apply to the site, and any requirements of provincial ministries;
3. Identification of appropriate soil quality and soil types for excess soil to be received at the site as determined by the QP based on site location/sensitivity, anticipated land use, ground water use/sensitivity, pre-existing site conditions or other factors as to ensure that there is no likelihood of adverse effect;
4. Dust and noise control measures;
5. Site security measures;
6. Traffic and Transportation Management Plan;
7. Protocol for incoming excess soil specifying:
 - a. that each incoming load have documentation signed by the Source Site QP that includes appropriate and representative soil analyses confirming the soil quality is acceptable for the Receiving Site;
 - b. that visual and olfactory inspections will be conducted of all incoming loads to screen for odour, visible staining or debris; and
 - c. contingency measures for load rejections.
8. A record keeping system to create and store written documentation to track each incoming load of excess soil including records of:
 - a. date and time of arrival of the load to the Receiving Site;
 - b. name and location of the Source Site;
 - c. volume of excess soil received;
 - d. documentation from the Source Site signed by a QP, including soil analytical results;
 - e. confirmation by the Receiving Site QP acknowledging that the incoming excess soil is acceptable for receipt at the site;
 - f. rejections of any loads of soil due to visual inspection or review of analytical results; and

- g. documentation to the Source Site owner/operator and QP, once excess soil is received, confirming the soil was received and the type, quality and quantity was appropriate.
- 9. Audit sampling protocols consisting of:
 - a. sampling protocols (designed by a QP) sufficient to produce results that would be representative of the volume of excess soil that is being received from each Source Site; and a
 - b. contingency plan to identify actions that are to be taken in the event that audit sampling or other information identifies concerns with soil quality from a Source Site.
- 10. Soil placement/segregation protocol sufficient to identify where excess soil from each Source Site has been placed, such that it can be assessed if required.
- 11. The owner/operator of a Receiving Site shall ensure that all provisions of the Fill Management Plan are carried out.
- 12. Owners/operators of a Receiving Site shall provide Financial Assurance, by an order issued by an MECP Regional Director or in another manner by appropriate agencies, including municipalities, before the site begins operating or during operations, to ensure any issues that may arise with material brought to the Receiving Site can be addressed in a timely and effective manner.

These criteria reflect the requirements of fill Best Management Practices prepared by the Province.

In closing, I hope TRCA staff and Board will consider all of my comments and amend the list of conditions based on my recommendations and rationale outlined above. Again, I appreciate the difficult position that the Province has placed TRCA in, and value this opportunity to submit my comments within an extremely constrained consultation framework.

Dear TRCA Board,

I am extremely concerned about the recent use of a Minister's Zoning Order to advance approval of a warehouse complex to be built on the large, provincially significant - and legally protected - Lower Duffins Creek coastal wetlands in Pickering. This act of destruction is not necessary. There are already enough nearby sites available for this kind of development at far less cost to Ajax and Pickering's sensitive wetlands. As a resident of TRCA's catchment area, I am very concerned that developers should not be allowed to put our precious environment and green spaces at risk for their own profit.

I want to personally thank you again as a Board member of Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) for passing a motion to oppose this planned destruction. I know that the Province has limited TRCA's ability to stop this development, given that changes to the *Conservation Authorities Act* compel your Board to issue a permit for this project if a compensation agreement acceptable to the TRCA has been reached with the developer.

With that being said, I am asking you to ensure that TRCA's science-based watershed approach is used to set permit conditions which come as close as possible to addressing the cost and impacts of the destruction enabled by this MZO, and to require that those permit conditions must be fulfilled before any destruction of the wetland is allowed to begin under the permit. While I recognize that it is impossible to truly offset the destruction through a cash payment or attempts to replicate this wetland elsewhere, I implore you not to be deterred from requiring any and every helpful mitigation or compensation measures simply because the developer regards them as too onerous. I am also requesting that TRCA staff present a proposed final compensation agreement at an extended and open Executive Committee meeting preceded by adequate public notice, so that the terms can be meaningfully reviewed by the public and science experts, in advance of approval by the Executive Committee of TRCA's Board of Directors.

The proposal to build a warehouse complex on part of the Lower Duffins Creek wetlands will pave over a section of one of the largest remaining coastal wetlands on the north shore of Lake Ontario in the GTA. Allowing this irreplaceable land to be developed

would be a huge loss to the local environment and will violate provincial rules for the protection of provincially significant wetlands.

As a TRCA Board member, I urge you to ensure that a science-based assessment and agreement be developed, as the developers and the Province need to understand that you will not be bullied, for the sake of the future of our community.

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. Please understand that I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

Suggestions for this permit should include:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

As a resident of Pickering and Durham region I am disgusted by these actions. As a great grandmother of 6 I feel I have no choice but to put as much energy as possible to defeat this unpalatable action. Thank you for your considerations

Allowing this irreplaceable land to be developed would be a huge loss to the local environment, and will violate provincial laws for the protection of provincially significant wetlands.

The developer has stated they do not intend to abide by the mitigating measures suggested by their Environmental Impact Assessment - why even have the assessment completed at all? How can we approve this proposal knowing the developers intentions are not environmental conservation, but decimation?

This act of destruction is not necessary. There are already enough sites available for a warehouse nearby for this kind of development at far less cost to Ajax and Pickering's sensitive wetlands.

As a local resident I am very concerned that developers should not be allowed to put our precious environment and green spaces at risk for their own profit. I am also **deeply** concerned about how removing the watershed will affect not only this project, but neighbouring communities as well. Will the developer step in when people's homes are flooding and insurance rates skyrocket? Will the developer step in when people lose their homes and are driven outside the city?

Please do not approve this permit. I call upon the Board to unify in an act of protest and refuse to sign the approval that has been mandated to be issued today! Stand together against corruption and greed, the whole province is watching you today.

Re: GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO'S UNHERALDED REGULATION LEGALLY REQUIRING TRCA TO GRANT PERMISSION FOR DEVELOPMENT AT 1802 BAYLY STREET BY MARCH 12, 2021

To whom it may concern:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input into the special hearing of TRCA's board of directors on March 12 on the development of 1802 Bayly Street in Pickering. I am writing in my capacity as a wildlife ecologist with several decades of experience and publication record on diverse conservation science-related issues in Ontario and Canada. I was a member of the Lake Simcoe Science Advisory Panel and am an expert in land use planning, impact assessment, the application of offsets and restoration. I am familiar with the kind of permit conditions at issue in this matter, and am knowledgeable about the environment and wildlife in the area in question.

As I understand it, the Ontario government has ordered TRCA to provide permission to the applicant to develop within a Provincially Significant Wetland (1802 Bayly Street, Pickering), which TRCA would not have issued on its own accord. Under "duress", the only authorized power that TRCA's Board of Directors now has at its discretion is the ability to add conditions to the permission to mitigate negative impacts from the removal of this wetland. Because the applicant is objecting to these conditions in some fashion, there will be a hearing before TRCA's Board of Directors on March 12 to which TRCA has welcomed public input.

Most wetlands in southern Ontario have been destroyed through agriculture and development and many of those that remain are in fragments. These ecosystems are characterized by high productivity and are home to a high diversity of organisms, including many species at risk. Wetlands are important for controlling flooding, filtering sediments and pollutants, and nutrient cycling, among other services. Wetlands are also notoriously difficult to restore relative to upland habitats, because of the need to recreate specific hydrological conditions (water quantity and quality) to restore functional attributes. The few wetlands that remain in southern Ontario are becoming increasingly important to safeguard.

The Ontario government has had a system in place for some time whereby Provincially Significant Wetlands (PSWs) are identified through scientific criteria as "being the most valuable". The Lower Duffins Creek Wetland Complex is one such PSW, more than half of which

stands to be filled in to enable the construction of a large warehouse. This will negatively affect the myriad services it provides right now, as habitat for biodiversity (including migratory birds), and as buffering capacity for neighbouring communities that are prone to flooding. The warehouse complex in question hardly constitutes an emergency or imperative use, and there is abundant available already converted (including industrial) land in the vicinity from which sites could be easily selected that would be far more appropriate to build this kind of structure. The PSW designation has been in place for some time (since 2005); the applicant would have known about the ecological sensitivity of the site, and that potential compensation measures would likely be very costly.

From my reading of the staff report and the special conditions, TRCA has clearly made a tremendous effort to come up with these conditions in a short period of time. As commendable as this is, I concur with two key aspects of TRCA's assessment:

- 1) These "conditions" will not be sufficient to make up for the environmental values that will be lost through the destruction of this wetland; and
- 2) The applicant's proposal to somehow compensate for this loss through the purchase and conveyance to TRCA of another property (2870 Concession Road 8) is wholly inadequate.

As for the special conditions themselves, I can see no reasonable grounds whatsoever for the applicant to object to any of them, given the scale of damage that will occur if this wetland is developed.

Moreover, I have the following suggestions for amendments to five of these conditions:

Special Condition #1: It is unclear how the dates of the permit would assure that work in 2021 would not conflict with the Migratory Bird Convention Act, as it assumes. I recommend that work dates be carefully specified in deference to migratory bird use of this site, which we know to be very important, given the limited availability of natural lands in the area.

Special Condition #2: I agree that it is vital for the permit holder to obtain written confirmation that MNRF does not object to the destruction of the PSW and approves of the compensation plan as a precondition to the execution of the agreement. However, this agreement really must also include assurance that MNRF has adequately satisfied its duty to consult and meaningfully accommodate affected First Nations. It is TRCA's responsibility to meaningfully protect the rights and interests of First Nations on the land where it has jurisdiction and actively work to ensure that Ontario meets its obligations.

Special Condition #5: While I support this condition, I have little confidence that there is suitable natural land available that could be used to offset the ecological damage from conversion of so much of the Lower Duffins Creek Wetland Complex. That means that this step

would have to be a precondition to the entry into an agreement. In other words, no work should proceed until TRCA has identified land that will adequately recreate the lost benefits from the removal of this PSW.

Special Condition #10: This condition requiring stormwater and sediment control plans to TRCA's satisfaction should be revised to require the actual approval of the site plan prior to the entry of the agreement. The construction would remove the natural capacity of this wetland to deal with increased flood risks to neighbouring communities.

Special Condition #17: Prior to the execution of the agreement, I recommend that an independent ecologist (approved by the TRCA) conduct thorough biodiversity surveys of the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibians and other species.

I am happy to answer any questions that arise from this submission.

Dear TRCA's Board of Directors,

I understand the Provincial government has issued *Ontario Regulation 159/21*, forcing TRCA to provide permission to interfere with and develop within a Provincially Significant Wetland known municipally as 1802 Bayly Street in the City of Pickering for the purposes of future development approved by the Province through a Minister's Zoning Order (MZO).

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021. Please understand that I do not at all feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, *under duress*, to provide permission to The Permit Holder, I have the following comments on the conditions of development. First, I support the conditions drafted by TRCA in principle, especially the Ecosystem Compensation Plan and Special Conditions. This highlights that no amount of money or restoration can replace the habitat and species lost by paving this wetland over.

In addition, The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.

It is also recommended the Permit Holder identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.

Furthermore, due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. We will never get it back, nor its vast ecological benefits.

In addition, the Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively. The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.

The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.

And very importantly, the Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

The developer shall also be responsible to use informed TRCA partnership to assess and provide compensation for loss of the natural ecosystem services, increased flood risk, discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution, impact to wildlife habitat, hold public consultation on any plans, and commit to science-based planning.

It seems clear to me that this government is ignorant of ecological systems and responsibilities and has turned away from the values of environmental stewardship that has informed governments, even Conservative governments in the past. Once this land and all the life it sustains is gone, it is gone forever. And for perceived economic gain of a few.

I am a resident of Toronto, and grew up in Pickering and we are all connected through water, land and air. The demise of this Wetland will affect people, animals, plants, water and ecosystems beyond the immediate area. I don't understand how people with power don't see the damage they are doing. All for a bit of money for their developer friends.

Please accept for inclusion in the TRCA's Board of Directors Hearing on Friday March 12, 2012 my comments on the "Staff Report" regarding conditions on the proposed development of the Duffins Creek Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) Complex.

Coastal wetlands like the Duffins Creek PSW Complex are among the most productive and diverse habitats on Earth. They provide incalculable benefits for communities, including flood mitigation, water filtration, carbon sequestration, wildlife habitat, wild foods and medicines, recreational opportunities and more. They are also of immense economic value. For example, wetlands can reduce the financial costs of floods by up to 38 percent; in the Great Lakes region the benefits provided by wetlands are worth 13 to 35 times more than the cost of protecting or restoring them; and in southern Ontario alone wetlands provide over **\$14 billion dollars in benefits every year**.

Here in I focus on the wetland component of the proposed development at 1802 Bayly Street, Pickering. Namely the areas of different wetland types outlined in table 1. The woodland, thicket and meadow components also possess great value, but I am focusing on the 18.03 ha of wetlands slated for destruction, as these are the area of my scientific expertise. I have over 15 years of experience in aquatic ecology and am a nationally recognized wetland ecologist.

Table 1. The wetland types and area involved in the permit application under O. Reg. 166/06 and Section 28.0.1 of the Conservation Authorities Act for development and interference with the Duffins Creek wetland complex.

Issuance of permit conditions for the required permit to fill-in a wetland of this size and importance in an urban area with limited greenspace is going to be precedent-setting and I have previously written to John MacKenzie requesting that it be subject to arm's length scientific review. I understand the time constraints imposed by the March 5th Regulation 159/21, but I must emphasize in this submission that scientific review is crucial to ensure that the permit conditions are fair and substantiated by evidence as **they will certainly be subject to intense scrutiny**.

Below I raise several key conditions must be incorporated and met by the developer prior to commencing the interference with the wetland to protect neighboring properties, natural heritage features, and species of conservation concern.

First and foremost, the wetland is likely to comprise direct or indirect fish habitat, and as such likely requires a permit under the federal Fisheries Act. My understanding is that no fish survey has been completed, though the 2019 Environmental Assessment (EA) indicated that **headwater feature A included fish habitat**. A condition of the TRCA permit for the development must be that Fisheries and Oceans Canada confirm in writing that no permits or authorizations are necessary.

Second, Ontario is required to consult with and meaningfully accommodate First Nations. In my earlier letter to John MacKenzie, I included the need for First Nations consultation alongside the need for arm's length scientific review as a key pre-requisite for any permit conditions on the proposed development. **TRCA must incorporate a condition that the developer obtain written confirmation from MNRF that it has adequately met its duty to consult with First Nations**, including the Williams Treaty First Nations, who have requested that the MZO be revoked. This extends special condition 2, which requires that the developer seek written confirmation from MNRF that they do not object to the destruction of the Duffins Creek PSW complex.

Third, as I discuss below in more detail, one of the key ecosystem functions of coastal marsh complexes like Duffins Creek PSW is in habitat provision for migratory and marsh birds. Such birds are particularly dependent on large wetland complexes like Duffins Creek, which are rare in the landscape of Durham Region. The spring migration is already underway, with eBird Canada already reporting large numbers of migratory waterfowl at the nearby Pickering Hydro Park Marsh and Ajax Rotary Park, including Trumpeter Swans, Ring-billed Gulls, Herring Gulls, Glaucous Gulls, Mallards, and Canada Geese, which are all protected under the Migratory Birds Convention Act (1994). Migratory birds are extremely sensitive to habitat destruction and disturbance during the migratory period, and for this reason, **the permit to fill the wetland must not allow activity in the wetland before the migratory bird season has ended**. This is in contradiction with special condition 1, which would make the permit effective immediately.

Fourth, the 2019 EA was incomplete, in particular in ignoring the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp portion of the property to the south. Before work is permitted to begin, this gap must be redressed and a qualified ecologist, approved by the TRCA, must complete a herpetile, avian, and bat survey as well as search for rare plants throughout this property and submit the results of these surveys to the MNRF and MECP for review. TRCA must include a condition that the developer provide written confirmation from MECP that the surveys were completed and that either no permit is required or that the necessary permit was issued following review of the report by the independent ecologist.

Fifth, closely related, any species residing in the wetland, particularly turtles and snakes or other species considered locally rare, that are encountered during development require safe handling and conveyance to a suitable location. The transportation plan for species disrupted by the work is required under special condition 13, but this plan must also be **approved** by TRCA prior to execution of the agreement.

Sixth, the conditions do not presently require **approval** of a site plan prior to execution of the agreement. Special condition 10 requires only that a plan be provided to TRCA. The site plan should include 1) a stormwater management and control plan; 2) a sediment control plan; and 3) a fill management plan. The current condition only requires stormwater and sediment be considered. This is

essential to protect neighboring properties and natural features, but a **fill management plan** is also essential to ensure that only clean fill is used at the site, free from invasive species or chemical contaminants. The conditions must include that these three site plan components be **approved** prior to execution of the agreement and must include clear compliance monitoring protocols and contingencies, in case plans be violated.

Seventh, regarding the qualified ecologist supervising the site during development, referenced in special condition 12, this individual should be approved by the TRCA to ensure that qualifications are checked and that the quality of their work can be assured.

Eighth, special condition 9 lays out the monetary compensation that the developer is required to pay. Even with the current Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation costs, at \$4,426,216.41 this is inadequate given the documented value of wetlands in southwestern Ontario, particularly in urban area. This cost works out to about \$245,900.91 per hectare of wetland slated to be filled. Yet this constitutes a permanent loss of wetland ecosystem function and so does not reflect the ongoing losses that accrue due to foregone annual values. Over 10 years ago, Tory and Bagstad (2009) published a report for MNRF that reviewed the literature on ecosystem valuation and calculated a per-hectare **annual** value for coastal wetlands in urban and suburban Ontario as being \$161,420/ha. That is in 2009 dollars, which converts to 2021 dollars as \$200,063.95/ha each year. That figure is likely an underestimate as it neglects the increased human population density and continuing land use change that has occurred since 2009. As clearly laid out in the seminal environmental economics work by Balmford et al. (2002), when calculating compensation costs, we must account for both marginal costs and marginal benefits to evaluate net marginal costs. This cost also neglects the non-use value (e.g., existence values, bequest value) of the wetland as well as any option value related to alternative future applications that could be of greater value than the proposed warehouse. However, extrapolating from this value, the loss of 18 ha of wetland in Pickering due to this development will cost **\$3,601,151.06 each year**, extending annually in perpetuity or until local compensation is achieved through wetland creation and restoration.

Well cited research by Moreno-Mateos et al. (2012) clearly established that wetland restoration takes 20-50 years before restored wetlands begin to resemble the ecosystem function levels found in natural wetlands like the Duffins Creek PSW. Consequently, even if restoration were complete at a perfect 1:1 area ratio within the local watershed prior to commencing disturbance and interference with the 18 ha of the Duffins Creek PSW, it would be a minimum of 20 years before that compensation wetland were functioning near the level of the Duffins Creek PSW whose loss it was restored to offset. As such, the real minimum cost of compensation should be $20 \times \$3,601,151.06 = \$72,023,021.28$. **The TRCA special conditions regarding compensation (special condition 9) should reflect this more realistic cost, one that is reviewed by a qualified environmental economist. I also echo the sentiment that payment must be received prior to execution of the agreement.**

Lastly, I echo concerns expressed in Appendix 4 regarding the adequacy of the compensation plan provided by the proponent. As I describe above, the proposed cash-in-lieu fee payment is vastly inadequate, given the time-lag in provision of ecosystem services between destruction of the Duffins Creek PSW and any possible maturation of a restoration wetland. More, the proposed relocation of wetland habitat to 2870 Concession Road 8, Pickering is a 15 km displacement northward away from Lake Ontario. Consequently, the values provided by the wetland would not be benefiting the properties that currently benefit from the Duffins Creek PSW. It is also too small to provide the 18 ha of wetland destroyed by the project, let alone its necessary catchment. Lastly, it would be a fundamentally different

type of wetland than Duffins Creek PSW, which is a coastal wetland. The functions provided by wetlands depend crucially on their hydrogeomorphic position (Smith et al. 1995). Eliminating a coastal wetland connected to the Duffin's Creek and Lake Ontario and surrounding by high impervious cover and urban development and replacing it with a constructed wetland north of the Greenwood Conservation Area surrounded by farmland and golf courses will not offset the loss. Not in a thousand years. Not ever.

Key Ecosystem Functions Lost Under the Proposed Compensation Plan

Twelve key wetland ecosystem functions provided by the Duffins Creek PSW that should require direct, explicit compensation under the conditions in the perm include 1) water storage and flood mitigation (38% of insurable losses due to flood events in urban areas like Pickering can be prevented through wetland conservation); 2) sediment trapping and erosion control; 3) phosphorus pollution mitigation; 4) nitrogen pollution mitigation; 5) organic contaminants degradation and detention; 6) critical habitat for amphibians, marsh birds, turtles and snakes, wetland plants, pollinators, spawning habitat and refugia for juvenile fish, and microclimate moderation and climate change mitigation.

To inform a fair compensation plan, these functions must be assessed in Duffins Creek PSW, and local means to continue with their provision must be determined and enacted prior to commencing disturbance and interference with the Duffins Creek PSW.

Thank you sincerely for reviewing my comments and incorporating them into the meeting record. Clearly, even with the proposed conditions, the filling in of the Duffins Creek PSW will result in unacceptable losses in ecosystem services and natural heritage values. If the TRCA or any other governing agency (DFO, MNRF, MECP) has questions regarding my comments, I am happy to meet and discuss and share scientific studies that can support the conditions I propose.

Thanks for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- An independent review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA using qualified ecologists, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment
- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria

Importance: High

Dear Ms. Mahrova,

I have been a resident of Pickering, Ontario for over 40 years and I want to thank the TRCA Board for their efforts, efforts that are being forced upon the TRCA Board, to apply strict conditions for the unwanted development of the Significantly Important Lower Duffins Creek Wetland Complex. These environmentally essential and sensitive Wetlands should remain untouched other than continued remediation to areas damaged by unwanted intrusions. I, therefore, would like to comment and add further restrictions and requirements to be placed upon the Permit Holder's conditions for development. After a review of the entire document there are two concerns of general note

- it makes clear that the TRCA is only issuing the requested permit “under duress” and it is not consistent with its policies; and
- it demonstrates that the requested permit and proposed conditions will still result in significant harms for which there will not be adequate compensation – even if all the proposed conditions are imposed and effective compliance is achieved; and

A few comments about these.

Permit issuance under duress

There are two statements in the introductory section (the “Whereas” statements) that are troubling.. First, the Staff Report states that under its policies, using a “science-based approach” it “would ordinarily decline permission of such a permit”.

Second, it characterizes permit issuance being done “under duress”. This would seem to reflect that the province may have used heavy-handed and perhaps inappropriate pressure tactics.

Environmental damage and the lack of adequate compensation

The Staff Report makes it clear that the environmental attributes at the site are important and the proposal raises public safety concerns. The Staff Report also is explicit in stating that there will not be adequate compensation for the attributes lost, as can be seen from the “Review of Permit Application by TRCA staff” section:

The application has been reviewed by TRCA's water resources, hydrogeology and ecology staff. The proposal will have an impact on the conservation of land (considered to be any impacts on the ecosystem) due to the removal of the wetland and upland habitat. Given the size and location of the habitat as a stopover point for migratory birds between the lakefront and the Oak Ridges Moraine, it cannot be replaced nearby in the Pickering urban area as there are no available target sites. There will be a net loss to the natural heritage system regardless of the ecosystem compensation plan, even if the compensation meets the requirements of the TRCA's Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation. The Guideline was never developed for this unprecedented scenario. The filling may have an impact on the control of flooding / health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property if the surface water is not addressed appropriately on an interim and permanent basis.

The applicant has made a proposal to purchase and convey to the TRCA, at no cost to TRCA, the property known municipally as 2870 Concession Road 8, Pickering and payment of \$3,517,000 cash-in-lieu to create a wetland or multiple wetlands totaling the same size elsewhere. The compensation proposal and staff's response are outlined in Attachment 4. TRCA staff do not agree that the applicant's compensation proposal will adequately compensate for the lost habitat as the amount of land is not sufficient to recreate the lost wetland habitat, nor is the land proposed for conveyance enough to recreate the lost PSW.

The applicant has provided a stormwater management scheme, grading plans and erosion and sediment control plans. This scheme is missing information, and the plans are not sufficient to address TRCA's stormwater management criteria and erosion and sediment control guideline.

The Summary Conclusion to the report restates the concerns about elimination of the Provincially Significant Wetland ("PSW") and states "... in staff's opinion the removal of a Provincially Significant Wetland and its associated ecosystem of this size and in this location has negative consequences for the natural environment and is not in the public interest."

Further problems are referenced in the discussion of the proposed conditions:

- Special condition 2 (p. 25) - notes that removal of the PSW violates their policies
- Special condition 5 (p. 26) - notes that developer proposal would only result in restoration of 3-5 HA of wetland, leaving 14 – 16 HA uncompensated

Special condition 11 (p. 28) - grading, sediment and erosion plans to do not meet TRCA policies

Even with the proposed conditions, the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes that it will be difficult if not

impossible to replace. In relation to specific conditions the following points should be considered

Special Condition 1: This condition makes the permit effective immediately, for a period of approximately one year. **We recommend that you ask TCRA to revise this condition so that the permit commences after the migratory bird season has ended for this year.**

Special Condition 2: This condition requires that that prior to the execution of the agreement, the permit holder obtain written confirmation that MNRF does not object to the destruction of the PSW and approves of the compensation plan. **We recommend that you explicitly note your support of this condition and further request that the TRCA require MNRF's assurance that MNRF has adequately satisfied its duty to consult and meaningfully accommodate affected First Nations with respect to these matters.**

Special Condition 5: This condition requires the transfer of the identified land and the identification of other lands to privately owned lands for conveyance to TRCA or funds to allow TRCA to do this and also note that there is no specific date required for this step. **We recommend that you support this condition but note your concern about the likely difficulty of finding suitable land. Because of this you should ask TRCA to make this step a precondition to the entry into an agreement. If the developer provides funding rather than specific land, no work should proceed until TRCA as identified land that will adequately recreate the lost benefits on a local scale.**

Special Condition 9: This condition increases the amount of compensation to be provided by the developer. While it is beyond our expertise, you may wish to consider whether this amount will be adequate and make a recommendation accordingly.

Special Condition 10: This condition requires the submission of stormwater and sediment control plans (which form part of the application of site approval) to TRCA's satisfaction. **We recommend that you call for this condition to be revised to require the actual approval of the site plan prior to the entry of the agreement.**

Special Condition 13: This condition requires the completion of a transportation plan for certain species that may be disrupted during work. **We recommend that you request that this condition explicitly require TRCA approval of the plan prior to the conduct of any work.**

Special Condition 17:

TRCA should require that, prior to the execution of the agreement an independent ecologist approved by the TRCA shall survey the site at appropriate seasons for breeding birds, bats, amphibian calls and other species in accordance with guidance prepared by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry or the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks to confirm presence or absence. The survey shall include the southern portions of the property and the Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp. The ecologist shall submit a report on the results of the surveys to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works. The applicant shall provide confirmation from the MECP that a permit has been obtained or that no such permit is necessary.

Rationale: The 2019 EA did not include completed bat surveys and did not survey the southern portions of the property for breeding birds and amphibians. Without this information – the information provided to MECP would be potentially incomplete or inaccurate.

Comments about needed additional conditions:

First Nations Consultation:

The document does not address consultation with the Williams Treaty First Nations who have requested that the MZO be revoked. We note that the meeting will begin with an “Acknowledgement of Indigenous Territory”. **We recommend that you call on TRCA to ensure that the proposed conditions and the subsequent agreement ensure that Ontario meets its obligations to consult with and meaningfully accommodate First Nations. Prior to the Execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain written confirmation from MNRF that its duty to consult and accommodate has been satisfied.** TRCA needs to go beyond the formality of merely acknowledging indigenous land and instead meaningfully protect the rights and interests of First Nations on the land where it has jurisdiction.

DFO permits

We recommend that you request that TRCA include a condition that prior to the execution of the agreement, a qualified fisheries ecologist approved by the TRCA must survey Headwater Feature A at an appropriate season to confirm the presence or absence of Fish Habitat. The ecologist shall submit a report to DFO certifying the presence or absence of direct or indirect fish habitat. The permit applicant should be required to provide any necessary permits under the federal *Fisheries Act* or confirmation from Fisheries and Oceans Canada that no permits or authorizations are required in the form of a letter of advice.

Rationale: the 2019 EA predicted the presence of Fish Habitat in headwater feature A but did not complete fish habitat surveys. Without these surveys, information to DFO in support of an application may be inaccurate. Provincial policy requires that the work be carried out in accordance with federal fish habitat requirements.

Contaminated Fill

TRCA should include a condition requiring that prior to any fill being placed on the site a Qualified Person within the meaning in the *Environmental Protection Act* must certify that it does not contain any contaminants within the definitions provided for in the *Environmental Protection Act*. To determine this, soil analyses must be undertaken by a laboratory with an internationally recognized accreditation body [e.g. Standards Council of Canada (SCC) or Canadian Association for Laboratory Accreditation (CALA)] and in accordance with the International Standard ISO/IEC 17025 General Requirements for the Competence of Testing and Calibration Laboratories.

Additional Generalized Conditions

- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration; additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made, and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that meet or exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.
- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.
- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions.

I am making this submission on the above matter which is the subject of a hearing before the TRCA Board to take place on March 12,2021.

While it is extremely distressing that the Board has been placed in such an untenable situation to be forced to issue a permit to allow the destruction of a PSW, the MZO and ancillary regulations being in place I will limit my comments to the proposed conditions to such permit. Generally I support the proposed conditions. However I would like to comment specifically on conditions 5,6&7 and attachment 4 with respect to lands to be conveyed as partial compensation. It is my understanding that these lands are not owned by the applicant and are largely or wholly located in the Greenbelt. Therefore these lands already have maximum environmental protection. In proposing the conveyance of these lands the applicant is giving up little and the net environmental gain is negligible. Being in the Greenbelt the fair market value of these lands does not even approach the value of the lands lost. A more appropriate conveyance would be lands in the Carruthers Headwaters that are presently owned by the same owner as the lands proposed to be conveyed. The TRCA has recently completed a watershed study of these lands and is well aware of the lands that are most sensitive and most need protection and restoration to reduce and prevent flooding and erosion. The conveyance of a significant portion of these “ white belt” lands would be real and meaningful compensation and could equal the environmental and market value of the lands lost in this unfortunate process. You undoubtedly are aware that the suggested transfer has been suggested and orchestrated by the Mayor of Pickering to solve two development proposals by two different developers with close connections to the City. This is especially inappropriate during a pandemic which finds many organizations struggling to meet their regular obligations, much less fend off a coup by our conservative leadership, and many citizens without the physical, mental, or monetary means to protest en masse.

Wetlands are not a resource that we can easily replenish, and especially in proximity to the highly urbanized Toronto and Region they provide critical prevention of flooding, opportunities for recreation, and corridors for wildlife. Mandating that TRCA provide permission and removing the appeals process so that construction can begin immediately is unacceptable both ethically and legally, violating provincial laws for the protection of provincially significant wetlands.

Subject: Duffins/Pickering wetland development comments for March 12 hearing

Thank you for collecting comments for the Hearing on Mar. 12, 2021 regarding the disastrous development of a wetland in Pickering for the short-sighted, callous, and greedy benefit of a few developers that clearly have D. Ford in their pockets. Serious investigation into donations from the developers and the coincidental changes of legislature to benefit them is called for, but out of your jurisdiction.

What is under your limited jurisdiction, and following your compulsion to allow this egregious development to proceed, is to ensure that appropriate compensation occur. I feel that is impossible as the wetlands are irreplaceable. However, you can minimize the impact. I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The Permit Holder, City of Pickering and Province of Ontario must consult the Williams Treaties First Nations on the Ecological Compensation Conditions prior to approval.
- The Permit Holder must identify and restore a total of **18 ha + 0.31 ha** (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The current compensation plan does not meet what is being destroyed. It only accounts for 3-5 ha of restoration. Additional site(s) within the Duffins Creek Watershed must be identified, a purchasing plan made, and a reservation plan developed to ensure the full area of the wetland that will be destroyed will be compensated.
- Due to the size of the wetland being destroyed, its significant ecological services and the speed at which the TRCA's conditions needed to be created, an independent, formal review of the Compensation Agreement should be commissioned by the TRCA, at the expense of The Permit Holder, to determine the cash payment for the ecological lands being destroyed. The review should be conducted by no less than 3 qualified academic experts. The amount determined in the current conditions, \$4,426,216.41, is not sufficient. There are models that can calculate the cost of flooding and how much wetlands mitigate this cost. In the single flood of 2013, the cost to Toronto was in the tens of millions, for that flood alone. \$4 million to account for all the loss of this wetland (flood, pollution, ecosystems, carbon offsets, trees (how much is each tree worth? 25K?) etc etc) is pitiable and insufficient.
- With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. \$4 million dollars to these developers is a pittance, and it is shameful to think that such destruction would be valued so low. That is the cost of a single house in Toronto. This is a wetland that protects our health, communities, and future.
- The Permit Holder (the developer) must create grading and erosion, and sediment control plans that exceed TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria and Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, respectively.

- The Permit Holder shall develop a stormwater management scheme that exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The Permit Holder shall submit drawings as part of the Site Plan application under the Planning Act for the development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application that meets TRCA's expectations and satisfaction.
- The Permit Holder shall transplant and relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities identified by a qualified, external ecologist on the property before ANY work is undertaken.

Please understand that I do not feel that this provincially significant wetland should be developed. As you have no choice but to grant it I plead with you to try to recover as much as possible to prevent a total loss of natural ecosystem (which is priceless), prevent increased flooding, prevent the discharge of sediments and nutrient pollution, and minimize impact to wildlife habitat and to our health and future.

Please hold public consultation on any plans. These wetlands affect us all. We need to have a say. And please commit to science-based planning. This is the only way that we will not only survive but thrive.

Dear Alisha Mahrova,

Thank you to you and the TRCA for standing up in the conservation of protected wetlands. I am a masters student studying urban wetlands at University of Waterloo and wanted to give some thoughts on the manner.

Although urban wetlands may not function on the same level as the most pristine wetlands in national parks, that does not mean they are not of value. A pristine national park wetland will not protect the local infrastructure from flooding and erosion, you need to have them in your own backyard to reap those benefits. Additionally this wetland is offering habitat to a fragmented urban landscape at a much higher level than any created or restored wetland. Restored and created wetlands do not function as a naturally occurring wetland even up to 20-50 years after it's been restored. A chapter in my thesis is centred around the heat mitigation properties of urban wetlands. A met analysis has suggested evidence of up to 2.5 K cooling from wetlands that aren't even as protected as this one is. The cooling benefits from this blue/green space are most likely super beneficial to rest of the surrounding town and by removing them you're only adding to the increase in temperature that climate change is already causing. Additionally, having a protected wetland in your backyard increases human exposure to nature. This doesn't only increase our mental well-being but also our perception of nature. If we lose that perception then future generations won't have the same outlook on nature as we do and won't care about conserving it.

We are writing regarding the current provincial government's plan to pave over the provincially significant wetland in Pickering, called Lower Duffins Creek wetland.

Our organization supports the protection of wetlands, a very large percentage of which have been lost over several decades, due to urban growth and development. The ecological function provided by the above coastal wetland, is invaluable as research proves and hence the reason for its designation as "provincially significant." The wetlands mitigate flooding, store carbon, filter water and provide habitat to wildlife.

The Lake Ontario shoreline site is critical habitat and a stopping point for migratory birds.

We were shocked to hear that the Ontario government issued a Minister's Zoning Order (MZO) to allow building of a warehouse illegally on the protected Lower Duffins Creek wetland, contrary to provincial law.

Doing so precluded any public comment and was in clear contradiction of protective legislation. However, the last straw was when we received news on March 4, 2021 that the Provincial government had slyly changed the law, in order to "change the rules to win" and compel the Toronto Region Conservation Authority to approve the permit to destroy the wetland.

If this new law proceeds, it would be precedent-setting, and its implications would be far reaching and environmentally ruinous. **It means that MZOs, except in the Greenbelt, will be exempt from any provincial laws at all.**

Worse yet, it would be retroactive, so all MZOs that were illegal when they were issued, like the Duffins Creek case, would suddenly be deemed legal.

Most egregious, is the fact that the Ontario government was able to sneak the law change

through, under cover of a pandemic, hidden in a Bill about broadband internet, Bill 257.

Our organization firmly believes that we can have economic prosperity while protecting the environment. Any retorts that claim that this project is needed for economic prosperity, affordable housing, seniors long-term care accommodation, or growth to provide housing for Ontario's growing population, would be blatantly untrue.

We demand that Minister Steve Clark remove Schedule 3 of Bill 257.

We expect that provincial protection laws developed over decades, should remain in place. Our expectation is that the Toronto Regional Conservation Authority, speak truth to power and prohibit undemocratic behavior and illegal destruction of the provincially significant wetland. Promises to "rebuild the wetland elsewhere" are ridiculous and impossible. Protect what we have!

We value the knowledge of the TRCA and support their decision to refuse the permit, on the basis of critical and longstanding provincial protections. No exceptions!

Hello Miss Mahrova.

My name is Curtis Okazaki, and I am a resident of Pickering. I have heard through various media channels that the TRCA is seeking public input regarding compensatory recommendations for development on the lower Duffin's Creek wetlands.

The following are things I have thought of:

Kevin Ashe has a conflict of interest as a sitting Pickering Regional Councillor who has previously accepted funding from the developer. He should not be permitted to be involved in any way with the TRCAs compensatory recommendations for the site in question.

Open the meeting with a land acknowledgement statement for the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation, for which this parcel of land, and much of Pickering, is a part of. Pickering Council and the Provincial Government failed to do this.

The developer will pay to the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation a sum equal to the current value of the 18ha property in question. This is Mississaugas of Scugog Island land and they should be compensated for it.

Work on the site in question shall not commence, or shall cease, until the TRCA has completed and reviewed an Environmental Impact Study commissioned by the TRCA and performed by an organization/company of the TRCAs choosing, paid in whole by the developer. Work on the site in question shall not commence or shall cease until the developer and TRCA are in full agreement to the recommendations of the TRCA EIS. I believe the EIS from Beacon was skewed in the developers favour.

"The applicant has made a proposal to purchase and convey to the TRCA, at no cost to TRCA, the property known municipally as 2870 Concession Road 8, Pickering and payment of \$3,517,000 cash-in-lieu to create a

wetland or multiple wetlands totaling the same size elsewhere. The compensation proposal and staff's response are outlined in Attachment 4. TRCA staff do not agree that the applicant's compensation proposal will adequately compensate for the lost habitat as the amount of land is not sufficient to recreate the lost wetland habitat, nor is the land proposed for conveyance enough to recreate the lost PSW."

Work on the site in question shall not commence, or shall cease, until suitable land equal in size to the 18ha site in question is purchased by the developer and recreated as wetland habitat to the satisfaction of the TRCA. Wetland of equal size and quality shall be made BEFORE wetland is removed by the developer. A maintenance program for the new wetland created site will be scheduled by the TRCA. Developer to pay all costs.

"The applicant has provided a stormwater management scheme, grading plans and erosion and sediment control plans. This scheme is missing information, and the plans are not sufficient to address TRCA's stormwater management criteria and erosion and sediment control guideline."

Work on the site in question shall not commence, or shall cease, until a stormwater management scheme, grading plans, and erosion and sediment control plans are submitted and approved by the TRCA.

Hello,

I am writing to submit written comments to provide public input on the draft conditions regarding the Ontario Provincial governments insistence on developing within a Provincially Significant Wetland in Pickering. As a wetland ecologist who has worked in Ontario for over 6 years, I want to make my support of the permissions specified by the TRCA clear. Wetlands, particularly in areas where we work and live, can save property and lives. As storm events continue to become more extreme, wetlands protect us from flooding and the consequences of fast-moving water such as increased erosion. Wetlands are also necessary for filtering water, keeping carbon out of the atmosphere, and providing habitat for the plants and animals that also call Ontario home. More about the importance of Ontario wetlands can be found here, in an op-ed I authored with Dr. Rooney (<https://www.greenup.on.ca/the-gifts-of-wetlands/>), though I know the TRCA does not need a reminder of the importance of wetlands.

Specifically, I want to express my support for all aspects of the permissions required of the developers by the TRCA to lessen the negative impacts of this wetland development. The development *will* have impacts on the control of flooding, erosions, dynamic beaches, and pollution or conservation of the land. The destruction or damage of this wetland will increase the magnitude and intensity of flooding to the surrounding community, that likely will damage property and leave taxpayers to foot the bill. Additionally, the loss of wetlands will increase erosion, run-off, pollution, and release additional carbon emissions. By developing in or near a Provincially Significant Wetland, the project will absolutely have negative consequences to conservation that the developers should be required to mitigate. Further, a 1:1 compensation approach is inadequate – restored or created wetlands do not approach the function of natural wetlands even after a century¹.

Additionally, I support the condition that the developers should be held responsible to mitigate any conditions or circumstances created that, in the event of a natural hazard, could jeopardize the health or safety of a person or the damage or destruction of property. Again, with the increased frequency of extreme weather events it is a near guarantee that the removal of any wetland from our

landscape will result in property damage or potential human injury in the future. The developers should be responsible for mitigating this as the removal of a wetland is irreversible – it should be their responsibility forevermore.

Finally, though I know it is not necessarily within the scope of this hearing, the developers and the provincial government are sending a message that they do not care about the rights of Indigenous people in Canada and they are dealing a blow to reconciliation. I believe there should be further permissions required for this development which involve the developers meeting with the Mississauga's of the Scugog Island First Nations to discuss how to mitigate the spiritual and material destruction of this land.

I am a University of Waterloo graduate student studying wetland ecology. I am very disappointed to learn that the Durham Live project continues to plan to destroy a portion of a provincially significant wetland and continues to rush the development of compensation actions. Wetlands provide critical services and functions that we cannot afford to keep losing; the Duffins Creek Wetland is a large, intact coastal wetland that helps prevent erosion and flooding on the shore of Lake Ontario. Paying millions of dollars to re-create a wetland that will only function at a fraction of a natural wetland's ability is expensive, labor intensive, and frankly, a poor decision when we have the option to protect our natural wetlands and benefit from their services for free. There are two main flaws with compensation: 1) one large, intact wetland is often replaced with small, fragmented wetlands that are not created near the original area of destruction, meaning the benefits of the artificial wetlands will not be felt locally; and 2) it likely takes a minimum of 20 to 50 years for an artificial wetland to achieve total functionality of a natural wetland, which is far too long for the benefits of compensation to be felt.

The Duffins Creek Wetland is an irreplaceable wetland.

Re: Hearing: Pickering Development (Squires) Inc.

It is indeed a sad day when the provincial government, contrary to its own provincial policy statement mandating the protection of provincially significant wetlands and the endangered and rare species of flora and fauna that inhabit it, forces the Authority to issue a permit to destroy it through a Minister's Zoning Order and recent legislative amendments to the Conservation Authorities Act.

This is in effect a tragedy. A blight on the provincial government which is now in the process of retroactively changing its own laws to make its illegal manoeuvring legal.

As detailed in the staff report before you this provincially significant wetland and its associated habitat serves important roles through its features and functions. These include protecting us from flooding, cleaning our stormwater, and providing habitat for rare and endangered species.

The Ontario Headwaters Institute, a charity working to protect the province's watersheds, their natural heritage, and our receiving waters, extends our appreciation and support for the staff report on this issue.

We offer the following observations:

- The introductory elements of the agenda package and what we term the conditions report itself describe several aspects of the Regulation with a cumulative degree of consternation and constraint that are admirable, accurate, and shared by the OHI and many organizations and individuals across Ontario.

We thank staff and urge the Board to continue to articulate the Authority's concerns about the appropriation of your mandated responsibilities to a black box of what appear to be arbitrary Provincial decision-making, absent the involvement of the One Window approach to planning and any clear protocols.

That the level of disregard for this particular wetland may become institutionalized across Ontario via Schedule 3 of Bill 257 will not be lost on you. We hope you, other members of Conservation Ontario, the members of the Conservation Authorities Working Group, and other organizations will articulate strong reasons against the adoption of Schedule 3 as it is written, perhaps including items in our third bullet below.
- We support the stipulations in the conditions report and re-iterate our appreciation to staff for their extensive efforts in an almost impossible task in an unreasonable timeframe.

We have some concerns about what may be a shortfall in the area of proposed new wetland vs the area that is being destroyed, and that the new wetland seems to transition prime farmland to other uses without a comprehensive plan that might embrace a local ALUS (Alternate Land Use Services) framework, but we ultimately find the report comprehensive, reasonable, and far-sighted.
- We urge the TRCA and your partners in Conservation Ontario to craft a submission to the Ontario Government outlining the serious short-comings in their approach in both O. Reg 159/21 and Schedule 3 of Bill 257. These might include:
 - ❖ The long-term damage to the land use planning regime caused by MZO's and the suspension of key parts of the Provincial Policy Statement;
 - ❖ The potential negative consequences from not allowing the normal historic process of Conservation Authority involvement in land use planning;
 - ❖ The disruption of normal conservation authority operations caused by initiatives such as O. Reg 159/21;
 - ❖ Both the direct costs of the item above as well as lost opportunity cost for the long-term development of sustainable land use plans, including the use of ALUS and similar tools; and,
 - ❖ The need for an assessment of existing regionally and provincially significant wetlands, any deterioration in their condition, and protocols and funding sources to maintain or restore their significant status.

Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands: Draining the Swamp

I thought that "draining the swamp", was just a figure of speech. Recently, the Ontario government by way of a Minister's Zoning Order (MZO), signalled its intent to approve a plan to literally drain the swamp.

The swamp in this instance is the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands near Pickering, Ontario and the group doing the draining is Triple Properties Inc. This is taking place in spite of the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's (TRCA) advice to the contrary. The TRCA is the group mandated by government to maintain the natural integrity of the Toronto Region, and to advise government when proposals such as the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands are presented for consideration.

The TRCA in its report warned that the eradication of the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands, in addition to environmental concerns, would result in the flooding of two nearby communities. As a result, the TRCA intended to refuse a permit to build on the site. Both the Ontario government and developer have chosen to circumvent the TRCA, by applying for an MZO.

Swamps have been drained before, e.g. the Don and Humber River projects, in the name of flood control and recreation. 60 years later, lessons have been learned and groups are trying to restore them. Regrettably, in most cases they cannot.

Is it not enough that we continue to develop our green spaces, and as a result threaten the aquifers that flow through, and beneath them? But now we are gentrifying those natural, important spaces that were either overlooked, or considered undesirable back in the day.

Jobs are important, especially considering the plight of those suffering from current events. However, so is the place we live, the water we drink, and the long term consequences of short term planning.

The swamp in this instance is the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands near Pickering, Ontario and the group doing the draining is Triple Properties Inc. This is taking place in spite of the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority’s (TRCA) advice to the contrary. The TRCA is the group mandated by government to maintain the natural integrity of the Toronto Region, and to advise government when proposals such as the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands are presented for consideration.

The TRCA in its report warned that the eradication of the Lower Duffins Creek Wetlands, in addition to environmental concerns, would result in the flooding of two nearby communities. As a result, the TRCA intended to refuse a permit to build on the site. Both the Ontario government and developer have chosen to circumvent the TRCA, by applying for an MZO.

Swamps have been drained before, e.g. the Don and Humber River projects, in the name of flood control and recreation. 60 years later, lessons have been learned and groups are trying to restore them. Regrettably, in most cases they cannot.

Is it not enough that we continue to develop our green spaces, and as a result threaten the aquifers that flow through, and beneath them? But now we are gentrifying those natural, important spaces that were either overlooked, or considered undesirable back in the day.

Jobs are important, especially considering the plight of those suffering from current events. However, so is the place we live, the water we drink, and the long term consequences of short term planning.

In response to the provinces regulation requiring TRCA to grant permission for development at 1802 Bayly Street by March 12, 2021 I would like to add my voice in regards to conditions to lessen the negative impacts of that permission.

In my opinion, the warehouse should be built in a less sensitive location. An established wetland is not easily replaced by “new” wetlands. Our groundwater is being affected by this development. 1:1 replacement, considering how long it will take to make a difference, is insufficient. At least 2:1 should be recommended and the protective border expanded around the site from 30m to 100m

Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation should have been consulted and should be compensated as should the local environmental groups. This should take into consideration the value of the commercial value of the property rather than the value as a “protected wetland”.

Compensation the the City of Pickering to pay for infrastructure and waterfront improvements and for the establishment and maintenance of new parkland.

The dollar values are not clear to me since the impact on the environment of this development is immeasurable. We have seen the impact of the historical development on wetlands. Let’s not perpetuate the damage.

To the TRCA Board and Applicant
Here are my suggestions for conditions to grant a permit for development of the lower Duffins Creek wetland.

Condition 1. Consult with and obtain consent to develop the site from The Mississaugas of Scugog Island. They presently oppose it (see attached press release Mar.5)

Condition 2. No destruction of wetland during migration and nesting periods.

Condition 3. Site to have permeable surfaces such as gravel, paving stones for drainage, not concrete or asphalt.

Condition 4. Warehouse to be built with no basement, above ground on pillars.

Condition 5. Pay TRCA the true value of the site.

In a 2009 study commissioned by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNR), the societal benefits provided by urban wetlands were conservatively valued at \$161,420 per hectare (2008 CAD \$/year). Applying this figure to the Lower Duffins Creek Wetland Complex would suggest that the benefits it provides are worth over \$3,000,000 per year.

First Nation Says Ford Government Strong-Arming The Democratic Process

Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation decries the government's attempt to circumvent the TRCA

SCUGOG – The Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation (MSIFN) denounces the Ontario government's decision to expedite the destruction of the Provincially Significant Duffins Creek Wetland. MSIFN's Chief and Council strongly object to the province's decision to circumvent its own provincial processes through the Conservation Authority so as to facilitate the development of an unnecessary warehouse development.

On March 4, Ontario's Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, John Yakabuski, issued a regulation to force the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) to approve a development permit without community consultation or environmental studies. The decision removes the Conservation Authority's ability to make evidence-based decisions about environmentally devastating projects.

"The Ford government needs to put the interests of the people and community above that of developers," said Chief Kelly LaRocca. "Durham residents have made their opposition abundantly clear – we do not condone this deliberate habitat destruction."

The provincial government's efforts to contravene environmental protections come after weeks of increasing opposition to the warehouse development. Local organizations have led repeated demonstrations against the province and the City of Pickering's support for wetland destruction.

"We are alarmed by the Ford government's attacks on wetlands and environmentally sensitive areas across Ontario," said LaRocca. "The province's efforts to change the rules to help a developer demonstrate an absolute disregard for our Indigenous and Treaty Rights, and the democratic process. COVID-19 has provided the Ford government with a shield to hide behind while they implement this legislation to override the provincial conservation processes – and our community won't let it happen."

My name is Tegan. I am a constituent of Ajax, but a resident of Pickering Village. The MZO will undoubtedly affect me, and I am very worried that the wishes of residents have not been adequately addressed.

I have grown up in the area, and as a child, Duffin's Creek was something of a monster. In spring, when snow thawed, the creek would swell. People have drowned in the waters. Every year, the local elementary schools would make announcements warning us away from the creek. More recently, a trail across from Durham Live had to be closed due to erosion. My basement leaks already, and I'm sure others do in the area.

We need the wetland in place in the village for protection, especially with waters on the rise in the GTA. I'm not sure what is legally possible, but should the developers insist on moving forward, I would like to see:

- 1) A commitment to replace the wetland at MORE than a 1:1 rate, to be determined by the TRCA and scientific officials (as I have read in several publications that 1:1 is inadequate);
- 2) This replacement must be located so as to benefit and protect the homes and businesses of Pickering Village;
- 3) The wetland must provide aesthetic value equal to that of the extant wetland;
- 4) The artificial wetland must use native foliage to be selected and approved by conservation authorities;
- 5) The wetland must prove its viability before construction can continue;
- 6) If the developer moves ahead without a wetland in place to protect the Village, I request that there be a fund established by the Developer & Province solely for use by constituents in Ajax/Pickering in the event of flood damage induced or increased by the paving of the warehouse. The historic buildings of Pickering Village should have priority access to such funds in the event of flooding;
- 7) A commitment to minimizing light and noise pollution from both the proposed LCD displays, industrial traffic, machinery, etc.

The Developers should take every action to avoid disaster, and they should be made responsible for possible flooding or loss to human life if they chose to ignore scientific advice.

Dear TRCA Board,

My name is Shakira Buren, and I have lived in Uxbridge since I was in kindergarten. I am now finishing my fourth year in Concurrent Education and majoring in Biology at Queen's University. I greatly value conservation and living sustainably. I began a petition in the fall on behalf of the Society for Conservation Biology Kingston Chapter to try and revert the MZO issued for the development on the lower Duffins Creek Wetlands, and I am extremely disappointed to hear that development has started and that we are now faced with this as our last resort. I have also included an up to date list of almost 12,000 signatures and accompanying comments from my petition to demonstrate the immense support on this issue.

Thanks for taking public comments on the conditions for the development of the Duffins Creek Wetland at 1802 Bayly St. This provincially significant wetland should not be developed, however since the TRCA is compelled, under duress, to provide permission to Pickering Development (Squires) Inc., I have the following comments on the conditions of development:

- The TRCA and Province must meaningfully consult with the Williams Treaty First Nations on the conditions of this permit.
- The Developer must identify and restore the entirety of the wetland that will be destroyed by this development - a total of 18 ha + 0.31 ha (from the "notch" wetland at 1702 Squires Beach Rd.) of wetland. The proposed compensation of 3-5 ha is not sufficient and remainder must be identified before construction begins.
- The Developer should use a qualified ecologist to transplant and carefully relocate all regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species and communities on the property before any construction starts.
- The developer must create plans that satisfy the TRCA's Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline, and Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria, respectively; and prior to any fill being placed on the site a qualified professional must certify that it does not contain any contaminants that would harm the environment.
- The developer must create a stormwater management scheme that meets or exceeds TRCA's stormwater management criteria.
- The developer must also incorporate carbon capture technology into the build designs that will meet or exceed the current carbon capture of the wetlands that will be developed on.

Wetlands are critical for maintaining populations of endangered species, keeping our air clean, and filtering water runoff. Several issues like eutrophication and lake salinization are impacting lakes and streams, and these wetlands may be reducing some of these issues from impacting Lake Ontario and other bodies of water. I also believe that it is incredibly short-sighted of our government to create a new development to improve our economy when damaging these wetlands can cause so much expense in the future. Wetlands not only capture carbon and filter water, but they also reduce our chances of experiencing regional flooding which is increasingly more possible due to climate change because in this temperate region, we are experiencing higher precipitation. I wish that the government would choose to refurbish other sites before developing new ones as well. Nature is incredibly important for human health, mental and physical, as well, which has become increasingly more important in pandemic. Finally, as someone who is hoping to have a career in conservation and educating youth and the public on these issues, we need to have ecosystems such as these for experiential learning.

With that said, no amount of money nor restored wetland after the fact will replace the habitat and species lost from the development of this site. The TRCA has explicitly stated that the permit issuance will still result in an unacceptable loss of important environmental attributes. It will be difficult if not impossible to replace this wetland. I hope that due time and consideration are given to these conditions, and the public and expert comments made.

We recognize the ecological and economical significance of wetlands, and we are opposed to the MZO that has been issued for development on a Provincially Significant Wetland in Pickering.

Wetlands are important for sustaining good regional water quality because they filter out several pollutants in runoff water from streets and agriculture. If the wetland is paved over, the region will require more robust water quality treatment plants which comes at a great cost. Wetlands are also natural carbon sinks, which means they capture carbon in the atmosphere. The development proposed would increase carbon emissions, and destroying the wetland would leave a higher amount of current carbon emissions in our air. Wetlands can also prevent flooding. Paving over this wetland could cause flooding in the future which may cost billions of dollars in clean up and repair of damaged infrastructure. Finally, wetlands are home to several native flora and fauna and are crucial to protecting and restoring at-risk species.

Paving over this significant wetland is a mistake. The economic gain expected would not be worth risking our clean drinking water, our natural carbon sink, and a potential flood. Nor would this be worth risking our ecosystems, at-risk species, and a site for recreational use.

Letter: Greetings,

We recognize the ecological and economical significance of wetlands, and we are opposed to the MZO that has been issued for development on a Provincially Significant Wetland in Pickering.

Wetlands are important for sustaining good regional water quality because they filter out several pollutants in runoff water from streets and agriculture. If the wetland is paved over, the region will require more robust water quality treatment plants which comes at a great cost. Wetlands are also natural carbon sinks, which means they capture carbon in the atmosphere. The development proposed would increase carbon emissions, and destroying the wetland would leave a higher amount of current carbon emissions in our air. Wetlands can also prevent flooding. Paving over this wetland could cause flooding in the future which may cost billions of dollars in clean up and repair of damaged infrastructure. Finally, wetlands are home to several native flora and fauna and are crucial to protecting and restoring at-risk species.

Paving over this significant wetland is a mistake. The economic gain expected would not be worth risking our clean drinking water, our natural carbon sink, and a potential flood. Nor would this be worth risking our ecosystems, at-risk species, and a site for recreational use.

PICKERING DEVELOPMENTS (SQUIRES) INC.

KEY ISSUE

Application #1209/20/PICK for issuance of permission pursuant to Section 28.0.1 of the *Conservation Authorities Act* to Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. to site grade, temporarily or permanently place, dump or remove any material, originating on the site or elsewhere, and interfere with a wetland to remove a Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW) located at 1802 Bayly Street, in the City of Pickering.

RECOMMENDATION

WHEREAS Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) is legally required to grant permission for development on March 12, 2021, in accordance with Ontario Regulation 159/21;

AND WHEREAS TRCA’s Board of Directors and staff, using a science-based approach to decision making and TRCA’s Living City Policies, would ordinarily decline permission of such a permit;

AND WHEREAS TRCA’s Board of Directors must, under duress, adhere to the Province’s legally ordered directive, which conflicts with TRCA’s mandate to further the conservation, development, and management of natural resources in watersheds within our jurisdiction;

AND WHEREAS the only authorized power that TRCA’s Board of Directors has at their discretion is the ability to add conditions to the permission;

AND WHEREAS the applicant has raised concerns with potential conditions that may be placed on their application and requested a hearing before TRCA’s Board of Directors, which is taking place on March 12, 2021, to meet the legally mandated Provincial deadline;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT TRCA’s Board of Directors approve conditions to the permission as outlined in this report, which are to be included in an agreement signed by all parties, in accordance with the conditions;

AND FURTHER THAT TRCA’s Chief Executive Officer be authorized to execute the agreement, as required by the *Conservation Authorities Act*.

BACKGROUND

Board Members Sitting as Hearing Tribunal

In considering the application, the Hearing Board is acting as a decision-making tribunal. The tribunal is to act fairly. Under general principles of administrative law relating to the duty of fairness, the tribunal is obliged not only to avoid any bias but also to avoid the appearance or apprehension of bias.

In holding this Hearing, the Hearing Board is to determine what conditions, if any, to impose as conditions to the permission. In doing so, the Hearing Board may only consider the permit application submitted by the applicant, the staff report, the applicant's report, the submissions to be made on behalf of the applicant and on behalf of TRCA staff, and such evidence as may be given.

Permit Application and Property Description

Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. has applied for permission under O. Reg. 166/06 and Section 28.0.1 of the *Conservation Authorities Act* for development and interference with a wetland to bring in an unknown quantity of fill and grade to ultimately remove the Provincially Significant Wetland and other upland habitat located at 1802 Bayly Street. The property is located west of Squires Beach Road, north of Bayly Street, east of the rail spur and south of Highway 401 in the City of Pickering (Attachment 1). The property is part of the Durham Live landholdings, part of which has been developed for a casino and hotel entertainment complex east of Squires Beach Road.

The property includes key natural heritage features and key hydrological features including a PSW and Significant Wildlife Habitat. Other potential features which may be present but have yet to be confirmed include Significant Woodland and Endangered Species habitat. The wetland is part of the Lower Duffin's Creek PSW Complex; which includes continuous hydrological connection to a portion of the PSW on the adjacent property and upstream hydrological connections to a PSW wetland complex off-site. A provincial staking exercise was conducted on the property to delineate the boundary by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) on July 15, 2014, with TRCA staff and external consultants in attendance.

The subject property is composed of diverse intermixed habitats including woodland swamp (0.72 ha), marsh (11.2 ha), swamp thicket (6.07 ha), open wetland habitat (0.04 ha), woodland (0.95 ha), thicket (0.57 ha) and meadow (3.63 ha). The PSW on the subject property is approximately 18.0 ha. There is a Winterberry Organic Thicket Swamp in the south western portion of the property which is of regional significance within the Greater Toronto Area and considered Significant Wildlife Habitat. Documented on the property include species considered Rare and Uncommon to Durham Region and those of regional concern to TRCA. Other faunal ecological functions documented on-site include breeding birds, usage by amphibians, and small to large rural and urban mammals. The subject property is in close proximity to other natural systems for migration connectivity by fauna to occur.

Minister's Zoning Order (MZO)

A MZO was issued on October 30, 2020, as Ontario Regulation 607/20, for lands including the lands subject to the permit application. The MZO permits a variety of commercial uses and includes no protections for natural areas, including the PSW, located on the lands subject to the permit application.

Prior to the issuance of the MZO, the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry requested that TRCA enter into a Memorandum of Agreement with the applicant to proceed with further

discussions regarding the potential for off-site ecosystem compensation.

On October 23, 2020, TRCA's Board of Directors adopted amended RES.#A164/20, with respect to the request by the City of Pickering for an MZO on the property. The amended motion reads in part as follows:

THAT in recognition of our role as a watershed management and regulatory agency, and stewards of lands within our jurisdiction, the Board of Directors indicate that they do not support development within wetlands, particularly, Provincially Significant Wetlands;

THAT the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) acknowledge the subject lands west of Squires Beach Road contain natural and hydrological features, including a currently designated Provincially Significant Wetland and Significant Wildlife Habitat and that those lands warrant protection;

THAT prior to entering into any agreement for lands west of Squires Beach Road, the Board request that the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry consider the ecological value of the site, including the potential presence of endangered and threatened species, hydrological connections and ecosystem functions;

THAT authorization be given to TRCA's CEO to execute a Memorandum of Agreement to review a proposal for ecosystem compensation to facilitate the development of the Durham Live lands containing a Provincially Significant Wetland located west of Squires Beach Road in the City of Pickering, in the event the wetland is reclassified by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry;

THAT the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry be requested to provide clarity with respect to its position on the applicability of ecosystem compensation to a Provincially Significant Wetland;

On October 29, 2020, TRCA entered into a Memorandum of Agreement to review a proposal for ecosystem compensation which outlined the principals of that compensation, including both replication of the ecosystem structure and land-based compensation on lands that are not included within the municipal natural heritage system or equivalent.

Mandatory Permits for MZO Development Projects

Section 28.0.1 of the amended Conservation Authorities Act is now in-force and applies to a development project that has been authorized by an MZO under the Planning Act, within an area regulated under Section 28(1) of the CA Act, outside of the Greenbelt Area. In TRCA's case, the regulated area is prescribed in Ontario Regulation 166/06.

The provisions of this new section of the Act are summarized as follows:

- CAs shall issue a permit.
- CAs may only impose conditions to the permit, including conditions to mitigate:
 - any effects the development project is likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land;
 - any conditions or circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property; or
 - any other matters that may be prescribed by regulation.
- An applicant has the right to a Hearing before the authority (Board) if there is an

- objection to the permit conditions being imposed by the CA.
- If the applicant still objects to conditions following a decision of the Hearing, the applicant has the option to either request a Minister's review (MNR) or appeal to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT).
- All MZO-related CA permits must have an agreement with the permittee (can include other parties, e.g., municipalities, on consent of applicant).
- The agreement shall set out actions that the holder of the permission must complete or satisfy to compensate for ecological impacts, (where applicable), and any other impacts that may result from the development project.
- The agreement must be executed before work commences on the site; some enforcement provisions through court proceedings are in effect for MZO permits.

In summary, TRCA must issue a permit for development projects on lands subject to an MZO, outside of the Greenbelt, but can make that permission subject to conditions and must enter into an agreement with the landowner/applicant.

Prior to Bill 229, TRCA had greater control, subject to appeal to the Mining and Lands Tribunal, over whether to issue a permit or not regardless of whether there was an MZO issued under the *Planning Act*. The *Planning Act* and Provincial Policy Statement do not permit development and site alteration in a PSW unless it was infrastructure approved under the *Environmental Assessment Act*. Aligned with provincial policy, the Board-approved TRCA Living City Policies do not permit development in PSWs and their associated minimum buffer setbacks, with the exception of public or essential infrastructure.

Borehole Investigation Permit Granted February 26, 2021

On February 26, 2021, the TRCA Executive Committee, granted a permit with conditions for borehole testing on the property, adopted RES.#B112/20 and reiterated the position of the Board of Directors, as adopted at the October 23, 2020 Board of Directors meeting (amended Res.#A164/20, above). The motion reads (in part) as follows:

WHEREAS the Executive Committee reiterates the position of the Board of Directors, as adopted at the October 23, 2020 Board of Directors meeting (amended Res.#A164/20), that in recognition of Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's (TRCA) role as a watershed management and regulatory agency, and stewards of lands within TRCA's jurisdiction, the Board of Directors does not support development within wetlands, particularly, Provincially Significant Wetlands, and on this basis does not support development of this site as per the Minister's Zoning Order approved by the Province;

WHEREAS TRCA staff using a science-based approach to decision making and TRCA's Living City Policies, would customarily recommend declining the issuance of a permit in support of development within a Provincially Significant Wetland and, specifically, in the instance of this MZO;

TRCA Ordered to Grant Permission by March 12, 2021

On March 4, 2021, the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry informed TRCA that pursuant to Subsection 28.0.1(35)(b)(i) of the Conservation Authorities Act the Minister made Ontario Regulation 159/21 requiring TRCA to issue a permit in response to the applicant's February 16, 2021 "Application for Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses" on or before March 12, 2021.

RATIONALE FOR THE CONDITIONS TO THE PERMISSION

The purpose of the conditions is an attempt to mitigate any negative effects the works are likely to have on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land; and any conditions or circumstances created by the filling of the site that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property. To develop these conditions, it is important to understand the importance of the ecosystem services and contribution to the control of flooding and erosion that the existing wetland habitat provides, review the application in the context of its impacts on same, and identify measures to attempt to mitigate these impacts.

The Importance of Wetlands

Wetlands are unique and specialized habitats that form the interface between the aquatic and terrestrial system creating habitats important to a diversity of species. Across Ontario they can be identified as swamps, marshes, fens, bogs, mires, sloughs, and peatlands, occurring in lands that are seasonally or permanently covered by shallow water or where the water table is at or close to the surface. The survival and prevalence of wetlands on the landscape helps to protect the quality and well-being of ecosystems where people and organisms coexist.

Identified to be among the most productive and biologically diverse habitats on the planet, wetlands lead critical roles in providing benefits that communities value like ecosystem services. Wetland ecosystem services can include flood mitigation, groundwater recharge and discharge, erosion reduction, climate change mitigation, terrestrial and aquatic biodiversity habitat, food and medicinal sources, nutrient cycling, carbon sequestration, recreation/tourism, and cultural and spiritual significance. In Southern Ontario, economic benefits are annually valued over \$14 billion as green infrastructure. Studies have documented that wetlands maintained intact on the landscape can reduce the financial burden of major flood events in urban and rural areas up to 38%. By comparison, the costs for water filtration, flood mitigation and soil retention are much lower when wetlands are conserved in-situ rather than man-made infrastructure like stormwater management. In 2020 alone, the rise of conservation areas usage and ecotourism was a key aspect of Ontarians well-being both mentally and physically during the ongoing pandemic.

Currently experiencing heavy loss from pressures to land conversion, climate change, invasive species and pollution, a strategic road map was created for wetland conservation in Ontario (2017-2030) to halt net loss of wetland area and function where greatest by 2025. Historically, 65-87% of wetlands have been lost and removed off the landscape within the City of Pickering (State of Ontario Biodiversity Report, 2015). Systems like the Ontario Wetland Evaluation System by the MNRF identify the value and importance of wetlands at a Provincial scale to aid in the protection and sustainable management of these features. The scoring system recognizes the contributions of wetlands socially, biologically, hydrologically and for their special features. Wetland protection is embedded in legislation and policies at all levels of governments throughout Ontario and requires the collaborative commitment, efforts, and actions of all involved to ensure that resilient and sustainable ecosystems are maintained.

The Importance of Preventing Flooding and Erosion

Erosion is a natural process of gradual washing away of soil by water movement or seepage (at the ground surface), commonly occurring in one of the following manners:

- a) rainfall or snowmelt and surface runoff (sheet, rill, or gully erosion);
- b) internal seepage and piping;
- c) water flow (banks or base of river, creek, channel); and
- d) wave action (shorelines of ponds, lakes, bays).

The erosion process affects the soil at the particle level by dislodging and removing (transporting) the soil particles from the parent mass (with water movement as the agent). Erosion is exacerbated by urbanization and the replacement of natural features with impervious surfaces. This erosion can affect waterbodies, fish habitat and damage municipal infrastructure.

According to Environment Canada's "How Much Habitat Is Enough?" (2013), the recommended amount of natural cover needed for reasonably healthy and resilient ecosystems is 30 per cent forest cover and 10 per cent wetland. Natural cover in TRCA's jurisdiction has been measured at approximately 15 per cent in forests and 1 per cent in wetlands and, as such, it is critical to preserve and enhance what is left. A reduction in forests, wetlands, meadows and their species is also accompanied by increases in flooding and erosion. Changes in land use are often approved site-by-site without understanding how, cumulatively, they affect the region's Natural System and environmental health.

As such, it is important to consider that development and redevelopment should contribute to the prevention, elimination, and reduction in risk from flooding and erosion, and that water management on both an interim (under construction) and final phases of development be sufficient to achieve this objective as identified in TRCA's Living City Policies. It is also important in the absence of municipal stormwater approvals (in this case), that the interim and final stormwater management scheme for the proposed development confirms that the site will not result in flooding on adjacent properties and encourages maintaining the existing conditions water balance and downstream sediment loadings.

Review of Permit Application by TRCA staff

The application has been reviewed by TRCA's water resources, hydrogeology and ecology staff. The proposal will have an impact on the conservation of land (considered to be any impacts on the ecosystem) due to the removal of the wetland and upland habitat. Given the size and location of the habitat as a stopover point for migratory birds between the lakefront and the Oak Ridges Moraine, it cannot be replaced nearby in the Pickering urban area as there are no available target sites. There will be a net loss to the natural heritage system regardless of the ecosystem compensation plan, even if the compensation meets the requirements of the TRCA's [Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation](#). The Guideline was never developed for this unprecedented scenario. The filling may have an impact on the control of flooding / health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property if the surface water is not addressed appropriately on an interim and permanent basis.

The applicant has made a proposal to purchase and convey to the TRCA, at no cost to TRCA, the property known municipally as 2870 Concession Road 8, Pickering and payment of \$3,517,000 cash-in-lieu to create a wetland or multiple wetlands totaling the same size elsewhere. The compensation proposal and staff's response are outlined in Attachment 4. TRCA staff do not agree that the applicant's compensation proposal will adequately compensate for the lost habitat as the amount of land is not sufficient to recreate the lost wetland habitat, nor is the land proposed for conveyance enough to recreate the lost PSW.

The applicant has provided a stormwater management scheme, grading plans and erosion and sediment control plans. This scheme is missing information, and the plans are not sufficient to address TRCA's stormwater management criteria and erosion and sediment control guideline.

RECOMMENDED CONDITIONS TO THE PERMISSION

1) Standard Conditions:

See Attachment 2

2) Special Conditions:

Expiration of the Permission

- 1. The permission shall expire on March 25, 2022 and all works shall take place prior to March 25, 2022.**

This condition is to ensure there is no conflict with the Migratory Birds Convention Act assuming works start in late summer 2021.

Ecosystem Compensation Conditions

- 2. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain written confirmation from MNRF confirming that the Ministry has no objection to the removal of 18 ha of Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW), and that the Ministry supports the ecosystem compensation plan as appropriate and adequate mitigation of the ecological impacts of the granting of the permission.**

TRCA may only impose conditions to the permit, including conditions to mitigate: "any effects the development project is likely to have on the .. conservation of land." TRCA's application of the "conservation of land" as described in "The Living City Policies for Planning and Development in the Watersheds of the TRCA", 2014, is premised on the need to recognize the relationship between landforms, features and functions in order to protect, manage and restore natural resources within the watershed. Both the Mining and Lands Commissioner and the courts have accepted a broad meaning of conservation of land to include, "all aspects of the physical environment, be it terrestrial, aquatic, biological, botanic or air and the relationship between them (611428 Ontario Limited vs. MTRCA, CA 007-92, February 11, 1994 p.38)". The Appeal Court solidified the "case law" that has been established in relation to the "conservation of land" test pursuant to Section 28 of the CA Act and that decision is a seminal decision.

Assessing the impacts to the conservation of land for both form and function of natural features, at both the local and regional scales of the watershed is also important. Within TRCA's watersheds, as stated in TRCA's Living City Policies, development impacts on the five tests are considered both incrementally and cumulatively in order to manage the risk to life and property, and to maintain, restore and enhance the ecological and hydrological functions of the systems contributing to the conservation of land.

TRCA's Living City Policies Section 8, Policy 8.7.2 states that "development and interference will not be permitted within provincially significant wetlands...or other wetlands greater than 0.5 ha in size." Policy 8.7.6 goes further to state that no new development is permitted within ...30 metres of a provincially significant wetland...and any contiguous natural features and areas that contribute to the conservation of land; or...10 metres of other wetlands...". MNRF in a letter dated October 14, 2020 stated that "MNRF is available to assist and support the TRCA to provide scientific peer review of the proposal or any other technical support or facilitation that TRCA requires to move forward. We at MNRF have done a preliminary review of the studies submitted by Beacon Environmental and believe there is merit in reviewing reclassification of the wetland areas west of Squires Beach Road."

As the proposal results in a significant negative precedent and does not meet TRCA's Living City Policies, staff recommend this condition to ensure that the relevant Provincial Ministry

provide unequivocal support for the wetland removal / reclassification and associated ecosystem compensation prior to the removal of the wetland.

3. **Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a letter of credit to TRCA, to TRCA's satisfaction, for the cost of fill removal, drainage improvements, site grading and wetland restoration on 1802 Bayly Street, which TRCA shall be entitled to draw on to restore the site in the event the site servicing and commercial development is not substantially under construction within two years of the granting of this permission.**

This condition ensures that the wetland can be replaced in its original beneficial location if the commercial development project does not proceed. If the site is not developed for the uses approved in the MZO, it is staff's opinion that the site should be restored back to a wetland, and the site grading and wetland restoration secured prior to any works taking place to ensure the ecological impacts are reversed.

4. **Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall convey to TRCA an easement over 1802 Bayly Street for the purpose of permitting TRCA to implement restoration site works including wetland restoration in the event the site servicing and commercial development is not substantially under construction within two years of the granting of this permission.**

This condition ensures that TRCA has access to the lands to restore the wetland if the commercial development project does not proceed.

5. **The Permit Holder shall convey to TRCA lands in the Duffins and Carruthers Creek watershed legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING, and any other lands suitable for wetland restoration that are not part of the municipal natural heritage system, key natural heritage features or natural areas or equivalent as identified in an approved municipal plan or provincial plan required to accommodate ecosystem structure compensation.**

This condition will ensure the conveyance of 2870 Concession Road 8 accommodate the necessary upland restoration and a portion of the wetland restoration. The conveyance will be subject to standard TRCA property transfer requirements including removal of a dwelling and other structures on the site, environmental site assessments, free and clear of encumbrances, including the removal of any buildings or structures that TRCA does not require.

However, this property only provides enough land to restore 3-5 ha of wetland. As such, the remaining approximately 14 to 16 ha of wetland restoration must take place on other lands. TRCA Restoration and Infrastructure staff have examined the public lands located within the City of Pickering that are not located in the municipal or provincial natural heritage system, including Transport Canada Lands and the Rouge Park and very few are suitable for wetland construction either due to lack of drainage area or issues related to tenants and aircraft bird strike avoidance. As such, the permit holder must identify additional privately-owned lands to convey to TRCA or fund the purchase of same and the significant staff administration costs to do so, in order to effect the appropriate wetland compensation. Please see Attachment 4 for more details of this major concern.

The land conveyed will be designated undevelopable in the applicable local or regional Official Plan per the existing Memorandum of Agreement.

6. **Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a letter of credit to TRCA, to TRCA's satisfaction, to secure the conveyance of the lands legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING for land-based ecosystem compensation, and to secure the conveyance of additional lands suitable for wetland restoration to TRCA, in accordance with the Ecosystem Compensation Plan approved by TRCA.**

This condition is required to secure the conveyance of lands identified in the Ecosystem Compensation Plan in Attachment 4.

7. **Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment to TRCA to secure the annual costs of property taxes and maintenance of the lands to be conveyed to TRCA, being the lands legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING for land-based ecosystem compensation, and as well as the annual costs for the additional lands required to be conveyed to TRCA for wetland restoration, at a rate of not less than \$465/ha plus property taxes plus inflation in perpetuity.**

This condition is required to ensure that all costs arising from the conveyance of lands to TRCA are paid by the applicant. On Friday February 26, 2021, the Board of Directors endorsed the Greenspace Acquisition Project 2021-2030. The accompanying update discussed the need for a TRCA Land Management Strategy. All properties, regardless of the management category and intensity of public use, require regular and proper inspection, land planning, management and monitoring to ensure that TRCA lands support TRCA programs and services. Lands also incur insurance and property tax costs. TRCA Property and Risk Management staff recommend that the agreement require the landowner or the municipality to provide a reserve fund payment satisfactory to cover future land management, maintenance, taxes and insurance.

8. **Prior to the conveyance of any lands to TRCA, the Permit Holder shall provide to TRCA: a satisfactory Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Report, and if required, such further reports and assurances with respect to the environmental condition of the lands; a recent reference plan; and confirmation that all lands to be conveyed are free and clear of all encumbrances, including any buildings or structures that are not required by TRCA.**

This condition is required to ensure that all costs arising from the conveyance of lands to TRCA are free of contamination and encumbrances.

9. **Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment for ecosystem structure compensation to TRCA in the amount of \$4,426,216.41, for purposes in accordance with the Ecosystem Compensation Plan approved by TRCA.** The landowner is offering a total cash payment of \$3,350,000 plus a 5% administration fee, for a total of \$3,517,000 as a condition of permit issuance, based on 2017 ecosystem restoration costs. Per the Guideline for Ecosystem Compensation, current costs to restore (at the time of receipt of the funds) should be used in calculating the compensation funds. TRCA Ecology staff have examined the ecological land classification of the habitats to be removed and applied current costs to restore. Staff conclude that the cash payment should equal \$4,215,444.20 plus a 5% administration fee, for a total of \$4,426,216.41.

The landowner has offered to provide payment as a condition of permit issuance and for the payment to take place later when the exact amount is determined. TRCA staff has

determined the exact amount based on the habitat loss identified in the landowner's Environmental Impact Study and, as such, staff are of the opinion that the conditions should require payment be provided before the work takes place.

Environmental and Natural Hazard Conditions

- 10. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall submit drawings that shall form part of its Site Plan application under the *Planning Act* for the proposed commercial development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application to TRCA's satisfaction.**

The application includes a temporary erosion and sediment control plan. This plan includes a temporary stormwater management strategy that requires pumping to manage the quantity and quality of stormwater during larger storm events. This plan is designed to be temporary until the site is fully developed and proper permanent stormwater management infrastructure can be installed and some of that infrastructure may require approvals from offsite landowners including Durham Region, Metrolinx or MTO. Staff understand that a major storm sewer pipe and outfall may need to be installed along the Bayly Street right-of-way owned by Durham Region to Duffins Creek in the Town of Ajax to address flows in post-development conditions.

The large format distribution warehouse proposal permitted under the MZO does not have Site Plan approval under the *Planning Act*. Without this approval, TRCA staff are concerned that the site may sit fallow and exposed with temporary stormwater controls for an indefinite period. This presents a risk to sedimentation of surrounding natural features, pollution and possibly off-site urban flooding. There is also no municipal enforcement control over the works as the City's Fill and Topsoil Disturbance By-Law exempts works within a regulated area as defined by regulations made under the *Conservation Authorities Act*. TRCA's enforcement powers are also limited under the *Conservation Authorities Act*.

- 11. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide revised stormwater management report, grading plans and erosion and sediment control plans, and an erosion and sediment control report and monitoring plans to TRCA's satisfaction to address TRCA technical comments including that any external areas currently draining into the site are addressed.**

This condition ensures that the limited drainage areas associated with surrounding properties is adequately addressed. TRCA technical staff are not satisfied with the grading and erosion and sediment control plans as they do not meet TRCA's Stormwater Management (SWM) Criteria or Erosion Settlement Control (ESC) Guideline. Also the limited drainage areas associated with surrounding properties must be considered. A revised SWM and ESC scheme is necessary prior to the Permit Holder's works commencing.

- 12. The Permit Holder shall ensure that the wetland removal is supervised on site by a qualified ecologist for the purpose of ensuring all relevant environmental legislation, approved plans and TRCA conditions are adhered to and that weekly monitoring reports, including ESC monitoring reports, are submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff.**

This condition is to ensure that if any species subject to environmental legislation are identified during construction, the work is modified to ensure the appropriate environmental legislation and / or TRCA conditions are complied with.

- 13. The Permit Holder shall undertake a transplantation and relocation plan for regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species/communities identified by the ecologist on the property as timing of works allows, and that a final report prepared by an ecologist be submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff certifying that this condition has been fulfilled.**

This condition implements a mitigation measure pertaining to Section 4.10 and 5.3 of the Environmental Impact Study and requires the identification, relocating and transplanting of viable species within the existing Winterberry Organic Swamp and other portions of the PSW.

- 14. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide written support from Durham Region and the City of Pickering that the two municipalities are satisfied with and have secured future stormwater management infrastructure required for Site Plan approval of the proposed commercial development including, but not necessarily limited to, permanent ponds, low impact development technologies, storm sewer(s) and outfall(s), both on and off site.**

This condition is to ensure that permanent stormwater management infrastructure is financially secured prior to any works taking place to ensure long term water management concerns are addressed. The amount of security must be determined with the landowner, Durham Region and the City of Pickering. Staff are concerned that the site could lay fallow for several years with only temporary stormwater controls.

Additional Permits Required

- 15. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain permit, on behalf of the City of Pickering, to construct the required culvert under Squires Beach Road needed to accommodate a temporary storm pump hose to service the Permit Holder's work.**

The landowner's engineering consultant identifies that a temporary sediment pond is required prior to the start of site grading. This pond is to be pumped to a sewer outlet approximately 700 m east of Squires Beach Road. The pump hose is to run through a proposed temporary culvert under Squires Beach Road, then extend east to the Durham Live lands just west of Church Street. This portion of Squires Beach Road is within the TRCA regulated area and is owned by the City of Pickering. As such, the City is required to obtain a permit from TRCA for this culvert.

- 16. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain a permit for altering a wetland at 1702 Squires Beach to address negative impacts to the PSW on that property due to the Permit Holder's work.**

The provincially significant wetland extends north onto lands at 1702 Squires Beach Road (referred to as the 0.31 ha "notch" wetland in the Environmental Impact Study). The study identifies the notch wetland as being entirely contiguous with the wetland immediately to the south. The study identifies the notch wetland as having high sensitivity to impacts and states

that negative effects are therefore anticipated on the ecological integrity of this feature even if hydrological mitigation measures are implemented. TRCA Ecology staff agree with this assessment and the landowner has included the notch wetland in its ecosystem compensation proposal.

TRCA policy states that development and interference will not be permitted within provincially significant wetlands. The notch wetland is located on lands not owned by Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. Further, 1702 Squires Beach Road is not subject to a MZO, meaning that TRCA has permitting authority over the notch wetland and the majority of its area of interference. Given these constraints, TRCA staff cannot recommend approval of interference with a provincially significant wetland located off site unless a separate permit application is made by that landowner, and permission is granted by TRCA's Executive Committee. To not address such off-site impacts could open TRCA up to liability.

As the proposal would result in negative impacts to the conservation of land on an off-site provincially significant wetland, TRCA staff recommend that the conditions ensure that the impacted landowner concurs with the impacts and that the appropriate Provincial and TRCA policies be applied to the notch wetland through the appropriate permitting process.

- 17. Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a copy of any permit required under the *Endangered Species Act* from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) for the works, or shall provide confirmation from the MECP that no such permit is necessary.**

This condition is required to satisfy TRCA that all required MECP permits are obtained.

Agreement Conditions

- 18. Parties to the Agreement: The Permit Holder agrees to add the Province of Ontario, Regional Municipality of Durham and City of Pickering as parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the *Conservation Authorities Act*.**

This condition is required to allow for the two subsequent conditions, which are a direct result of the Province's issuance of the MZO, at the request of the City of Pickering with the support of the Regional Municipality of Durham, endorsed via council resolutions.

- 19. Indemnity: All parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the *Conservation Authorities Act* agree to indemnify and save harmless TRCA from any claims related to the permission, in perpetuity.**

This condition will ensure TRCA is not subject to future liability or costs due to the permission being granted. This condition is required in recognition that TRCA would ordinarily decline permission of such a permit, but that TRCA's Board of Directors was forced, under duress, to adhere to the Province's legally mandated directive to provide permission, which conflicts with TRCA's mandate to further the conservation, development and management of natural resources in watersheds within TRCA's jurisdiction.

20. Irrevocability: All parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the Conservation Authorities Act agree that if future legislation or regulations are enacted impacting the permitted area, there will be no ability to reduce the agreed upon conditions.

This condition is required as protection from further future Provincial interference. For instance, if the Province were to enact legislation that would remove the Provincially Significant Wetland classification from the property, which existed at the date of this Agreement, no party to the Agreement could reopen the matter, to argue that conditions were based on erroneous information.

SUMMARY CONCLUSION

Approval of permission for development and interference with a Provincially Significant Wetland does not meet the requirements of TRCA's Living City Policies. However, the Act requires the Authority to issue such a permit on these lands as they are subject to a MZO. Staff has therefore reviewed the application and do not support the works proposed as the removal of 18.0 ha of Provincially Significant Wetland does not meet TRCA policy.

Professional Planners involved in preparing this report are bound by a code of conduct. The code requires Professional Planners to acknowledge the inter-related nature of planning decisions and their consequences for individuals, the natural and built environment, and the broader public interest. While staff recognize the economic benefits that may result from the development, in staff's opinion the removal of a Provincially Significant Wetland and its associated ecosystem of this size and in this location has negative consequences for the natural environment and is not in the public interest.

Given the requirements of Section 28.0.1 of the Act that TRCA is required to grant the permission, coupled with the mandatory order issued to TRCA on March 4, 2021 (O. Reg. 159/21) that TRCA grant the permission on or before March 12, 2021, staff recommend the above referenced conditions be applied to the permission in an effort to mitigate negative impacts on the control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or the conservation of land, or any circumstances created by the development project that, in the event of a natural hazard, might jeopardize the health or safety of persons or result in the damage or destruction of property.

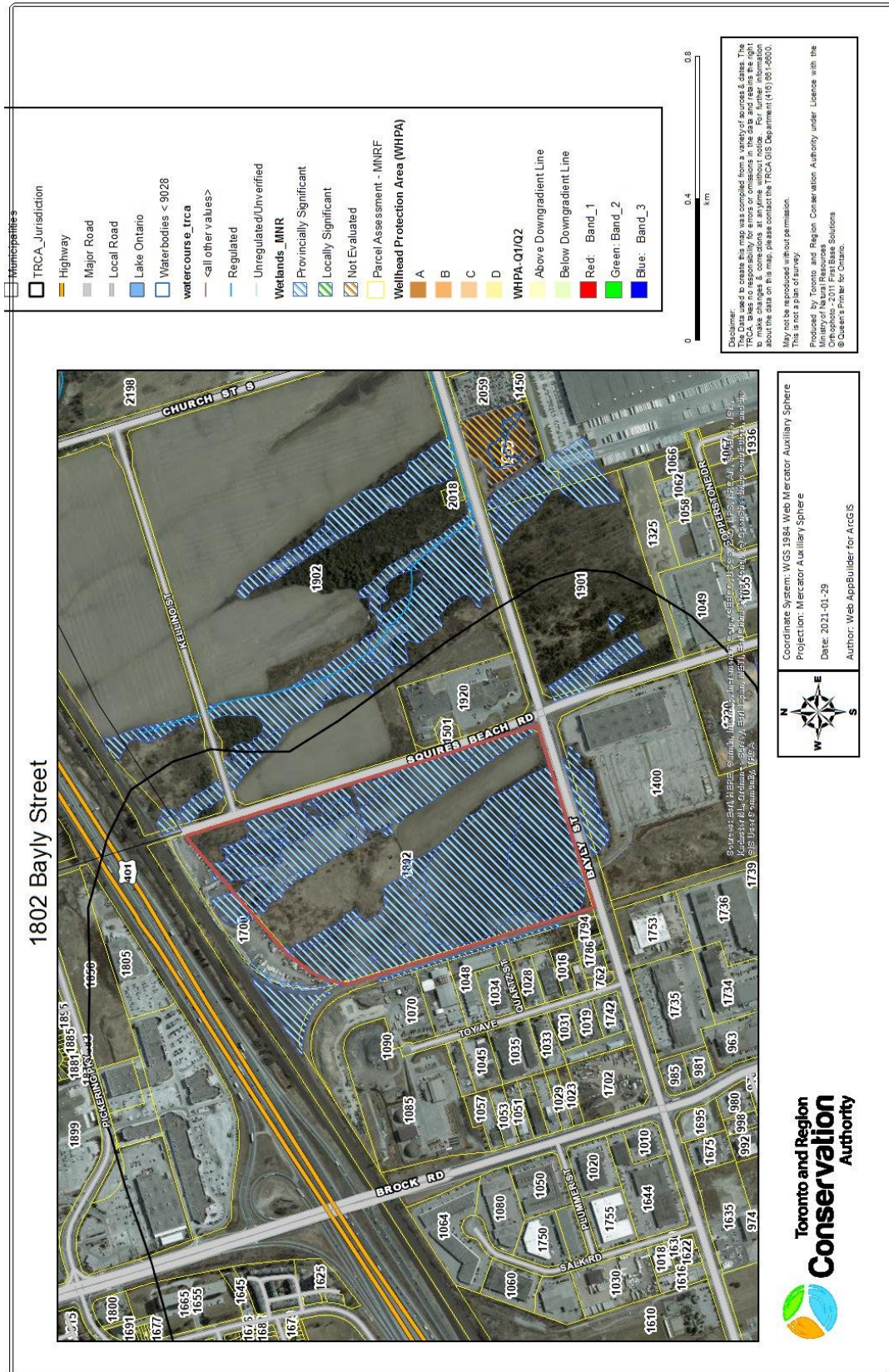

Attachment 2: TRCA Standard Permit Conditions

1. The Owner shall strictly adhere to the approved TRCA permit, plans, documents and conditions, including TRCA redline revisions, herein referred to as the “works”, to the satisfaction of TRCA. The Owner further acknowledges that all proposed revisions to the design of this project that impact TRCA interests must be submitted for review and approval by TRCA prior to implementation of the redesigned works.
2. The Owner shall notify TRCA Enforcement staff 48 hours prior to the commencement of any of the works referred to in this permit and within 48 hours upon completion of the works referred to herein.
3. The Owner shall grant permission for TRCA staff, agents, representatives, or other persons as may be reasonably required by TRCA, in its opinion, to enter the premises without notice at reasonable times, for the purpose of inspecting compliance with the approved works, and the Terms and Conditions of this permit, and to conduct all required discussions with the Owner, their agents, consultants or representatives with respect to the works.
4. The Owner acknowledges that this permit is non-transferrable and is issued only to the current owner of the property. The Owner further acknowledges that upon transfer of the property into different ownership, this permit shall be terminated and a new permit must be obtained from TRCA by the new owner. In the case of municipal or utility projects, where works may extend beyond lands owned or easements held by the municipality or utility provider, landowner authorization is required to the satisfaction of TRCA.
5. This permit is valid for a period of two years from the date of issue unless otherwise specified on the permit. The Owner acknowledges that it is the responsibility of the owner to ensure a valid permit is in effect at the time works are occurring; and, if it is anticipated that works will not be completed within the allotted time, the Owner shall notify TRCA at least 60 days prior to the expiration date on the permit if an extension will be requested.
6. The Owner shall ensure all excess fill (soil or otherwise) generated from the works will not be stockpiled and/or disposed of within any area regulated by TRCA (on or off-site) pursuant to Ontario Regulation 166/06, as amended, without a permit from TRCA.
7. The Owner shall install effective erosion and sediment control measures prior to the commencement of the approved works and maintain such measures in good working order throughout all phases of the works to the satisfaction of TRCA.
8. The Owner acknowledges that the erosion and sediment control strategies outlined on the approved plans are not static and that the Owner shall upgrade and amend the erosion and sediment control strategies as site conditions change to prevent sediment releases to the natural environment to the satisfaction of TRCA.
9. The Owner shall repair any breaches of the erosion and sediment control measures within 48 hours of the breach to the satisfaction of TRCA.
10. The Owner shall make every reasonable effort to minimize the amount of land

disturbed during the works and shall temporarily stabilize disturbed areas within 30 days of the date the areas become inactive to the satisfaction of TRCA.

11. The Owner shall permanently stabilize all disturbed areas immediately following the completion of the works and remove/dispose of sediment controls from the site to the satisfaction of TRCA.
12. The Owner shall arrange a final site inspection of the works with TRCA Enforcement staff prior to the expiration date on the permit to ensure compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit to the satisfaction of TRCA.
13. The Owner shall pay any additional fees required by TRCA in accordance with the TRCA Administrative Fee Schedule for Permitting Services, as may be amended, within 15 days of being advised of such in writing by TRCA for staff time allocated to the project regarding issues of non-compliance and/or additional technical review, consultation and site visits beyond TRCA's standard compliance inspections.

Attachment 3: Special Permit Conditions

Expiration of the Permission:

1. The permission shall expire on March 25, 2022 and all works shall take place prior to March 25, 2022.

Ecosystem Compensation Conditions

2. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain written confirmation from MNRF confirming that the Ministry has no objection to the removal of 18 ha of Provincially Significant Wetland (PSW), and that the Ministry supports the ecosystem compensation plan as appropriate and adequate mitigation of the ecological impacts of the granting of the permission.
3. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a letter of credit to TRCA, to TRCA's satisfaction, for the cost of fill removal, site grading and wetland restoration on 1802 Bayly Street, which TRCA shall be entitled to draw on to restore the site in the event the site servicing and commercial development is not substantially under construction within two years of the granting of this permission.
4. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall convey to TRCA an easement over 1802 Bayly Street for the purpose of permitting TRCA to implement restoration site works including wetland restoration in the event the site servicing and commercial development is not substantially under construction within two years of the granting of this permission.
5. The Permit Holder shall convey to TRCA lands in the Duffins and Carruthers Creek watershed legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING, and any other lands suitable for wetland restoration that are not part of the municipal natural heritage system, key natural heritage features or natural areas or equivalent as identified in an approved municipal plan or provincial plan required to accommodate ecosystem structure compensation.
6. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a letter of credit to TRCA, to TRCA's satisfaction, to secure the conveyance of the lands legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING for land-based ecosystem compensation, and to secure the conveyance of additional lands suitable for wetland restoration to TRCA, in accordance with the Ecosystem Compensation Plan approved by TRCA.
7. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment to TRCA, to secure the annual costs of property taxes and maintenance of the lands to be conveyed to TRCA, being the lands legally identified as PT LT 7 CON 8 PICKERING, PT 1, PL 40R18008 S/E PT 1, PL 40R19990 CITY OF PICKERING for land-based ecosystem compensation, and as well as the annual costs of property tax and maintenance of the additional lands required to be conveyed to TRCA for wetland restoration, at a rate of not less than \$465/ha plus property taxes in perpetuity.
8. Prior to the conveyance of any lands to TRCA, the Permit Holder shall provide to TRCA: a satisfactory Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Report, and if required, such further

reports and assurances with respect to the environmental condition of the lands; a recent reference plan; and confirmation that all lands to be conveyed are free and clear of all encumbrances, including any buildings or structures that are not required by TRCA.

9. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a cash payment for ecosystem structure compensation to TRCA in the amount of \$4,426,216.41, for purposes in accordance with the Ecosystem Compensation Plan approved by TRCA.

Environmental and Natural Hazard Conditions

10. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall submit drawings that shall form part of its Site Plan application under the *Planning Act* for the proposed commercial development, showing the stormwater and erosion and sediment controls for the Site Plan application to TRCA's satisfaction.
11. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide revised stormwater management report, grading plans and erosion and sediment control plans, and an erosion and sediment control report and monitoring plans to TRCA satisfaction to address TRCA technical comments including that any external areas currently draining into the site are addressed.
12. The Permit Holder shall ensure that the wetland removal is supervised on site by a qualified ecologist for the purpose of ensuring all relevant environmental legislation, approved plans and TRCA conditions are adhered to and that weekly monitoring reports, including ESC monitoring reports, are submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff.
13. The Permit Holder shall undertake a transplantation and relocation plan for regionally, locally and TRCA rare and uncommon species/communities identified by the ecologist on the property as timing of works allows, and that a final report prepared by an ecologist be submitted to TRCA Enforcement staff certifying that this condition has been fulfilled.
14. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide written support from Durham Region and the City of Pickering that the two municipalities are satisfied with and have secured future stormwater management infrastructure required for Site Plan Approval of the proposed commercial development including, but not necessarily limited to, permanent ponds, low impact development technologies, storm sewer(s) and outfall(s), both on and off site.

Additional Permits Required

15. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain permit, on behalf of the City of Pickering, to construct the required culvert under Squires Beach Road needed to accommodate a temporary storm pump hose to service the Permit Holder's work.
16. Prior to execution of the Agreement, the Permit Holder shall obtain a permit for altering a wetland at 1702 Squires Beach to address negative impacts to the PSW on that property due to the Permit Holder's work.
17. Prior to the execution of the agreement, the Permit Holder shall provide a copy of any permit required under the Endangered Species Act from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation

and Parks (MECP) for the works, or shall provide confirmation from the MECP that no such permit is necessary.

Agreement Conditions

18. Parties to the Agreement: The Permit Holder agrees to add the Province of Ontario, Regional Municipality of Durham and City of Pickering as parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the *Conservation Authorities Act*.
19. Indemnity: All parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the *Conservation Authorities Act* agree to indemnify and save harmless TRCA from any claims related to the permission, in perpetuity.
20. Irrevocability: All parties to the Agreement required under Section 28.0.1(24) of the *Conservation Authorities Act* agree that if future legislation or regulations are enacted impacting the permitted area, there will be no ability to reduce the agreed upon conditions.

Attachment 4: Ecosystem Compensation Plan

There are two components to ecosystem compensation identified in TRCA's [Guideline for Determining Ecosystem Compensation](#), 2018 (Guideline):

- 1) Replacing the Ecosystem Structure (the actual habitat being removed); and
- 2) Replacing the Land Base (the land that is being developed instead of remaining in a natural state).

1) Replacing the Ecosystem Structure

The landowner proposed a total cash payment of \$3,350,000 plus a 5% administration fee, for a total of \$3,517,000, based on a rough estimate identified in the Memorandum of Agreement. This rough estimate was based on 2017 costs to restore and an estimate of habitat size.

Per the Guideline, current costs to restore (at the time of receipt of the funds) should be used in calculating the compensation funds. TRCA Ecology staff have examined the ecological land classification of the habitats to be removed in the Environmental Impact Study and applied current (2021) costs to restore. Staff conclude that the cash payment should equal \$4,215,444.20 plus a 5% administration fee, for a total of \$4,426,216.41.

The total amount TRCA staff recommend is calculated as follows:

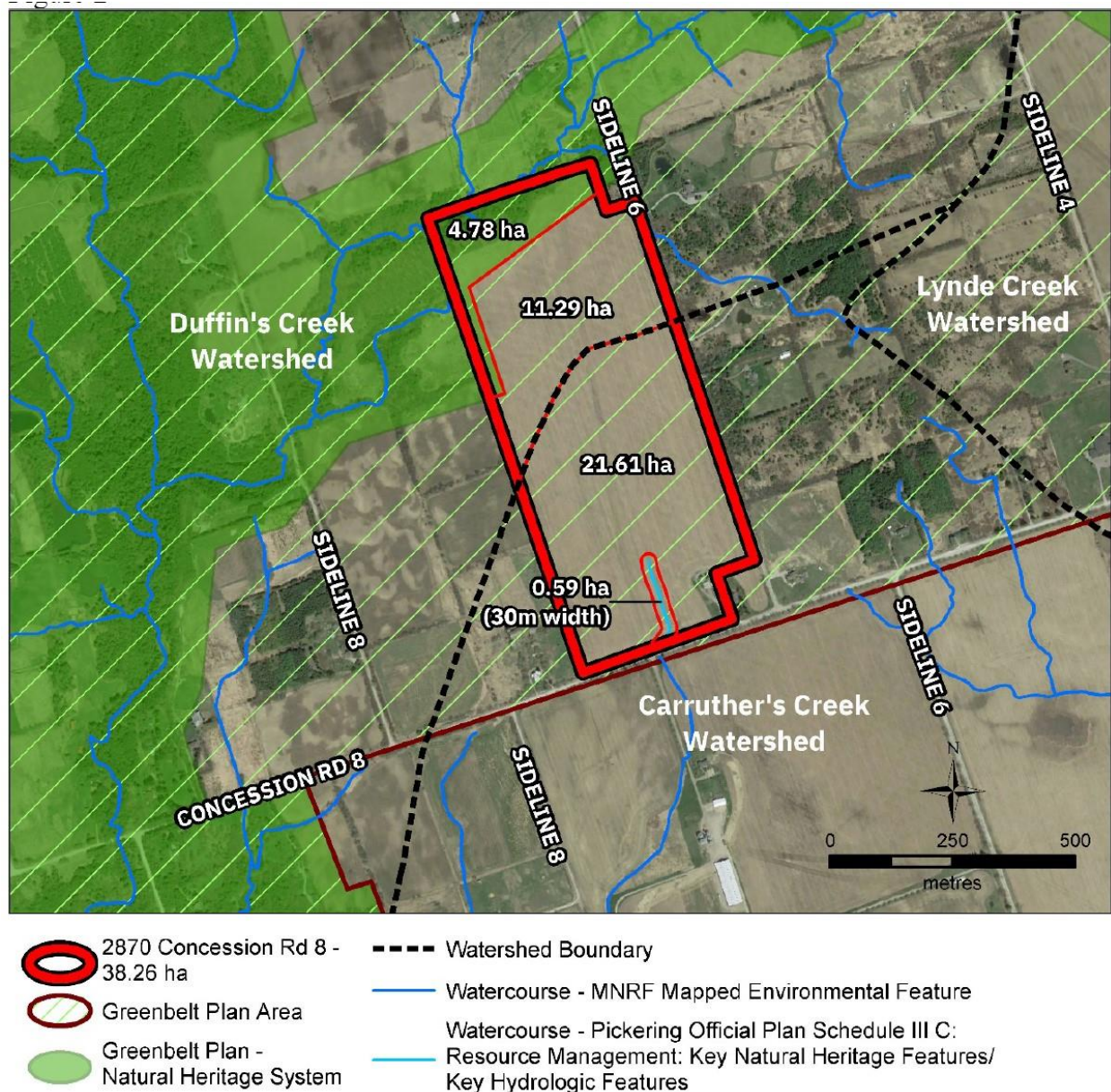

2) Replacing the Land Base

The applicant has made a proposal to purchase and convey to the TRCA, at no cost to TRCA, the property known municipally as 2870 Concession Road 8, Pickering (see Figure 1).

Figure 1. 2870 Concession Road 8



2870 Concession Road 8 is 38 ha (93 acres) in size and is primarily an agricultural field in the Greenbelt, with 16.27 ha in the Duffins Creek Watershed and the remaining 22.2 ha in the Carruthers Creek Watershed. 32.89 hectares of the property is designated Prime Agricultural Areas and are not part of an existing Natural Heritage System, Key Natural Heritage Features or Natural Areas or equivalent. It is located approximately 12 km north of the existing Provincially Significant Wetland. Staff and the applicant's ecology consultant anticipate that the property

could be enhanced to restore approximately 3-5 ha of wetland and all the upland habitat.

This property physically exceeds the size of the habitat to be removed at 1802 Bayly Street. However, it only provides enough land to restore 3-5 ha of PSW. As such, the remaining 13 to 15 ha of wetland restoration will have to take place on other lands.

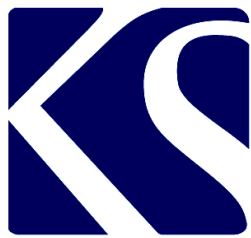
TRCA Restoration and Infrastructure staff have examined the public lands located within the City of Pickering that are not located in the municipal or provincial natural heritage system, including Transport Canada Lands and the Rouge Park and very few are suitable for wetland construction either due to lack of drainage area or issues related to tenants and aircraft bird strike avoidance. As such, additional privately-owned lands must be identified for conveyance to TRCA or the value of such lands must be identified to fund the purchase of same and the staff administration costs to do so, to implement wetland compensation consistent with the Memorandum of Agreement.

The value of 2870 Concession Road 8 is not known to TRCA staff at this time; however, the value of the lands could be established through an appraisal. The value of other lands necessary to implement the remaining wetland construction is also unknown. The Guideline states that cash-in-lieu shall be calculated as follows:

- Applying the per hectare market value of the development site to the area of land being removed from the natural system; or.
- Calculating the difference between the pre-existing market value of the development site and the market value of the development site after the ecosystem has been removed.

Given the value of industrial development lands in Durham is approximately \$1.5 million / ha (rough estimate). If approximately 15 ha is required cash-in-lieu, then approximately \$22.5 million would need to be secured. However, taking cash in lieu would be at great risk to TRCA. Staff do not have a good understanding of whether this funding would be enough to secure lands elsewhere that are suitable for constructing between 13 to 15 ha of wetland. The staff time to identify suitable lands, determine if they are for sale, procure appraisals and environmental site assessments, remove any structures or address any environmental site issued, and then close on the lands would be considerable.

Further investigation and analysis are required to identify the further financial contribution from the applicant if cash-in-lieu is to be considered, prior to execution of the Agreement.

We are solicitors to Pickering Developments (Squires) Inc. ("Pickering Developments"), the owner of the Property and the Applicant of the within permit application. The writer will be representing Pickering Developments at the hearing scheduled for 10am on Friday March 12, 2021. Kindly accept this letter as our client's written submission. We reserve the right to augment these written submissions with additional oral submissions at the oral hearing.

First and foremost, on behalf of our client, its consulting team and myself personally, I want to thank TRCA staff for the significant amount of work they have done not only on the within permit, but on the Durham Live project in general. Although Pickering Developments and TRCA staff do not always agree on things, we respect the important core work which TRCA does. We also appreciate the significant amount of time which TRCA staff have devoted to the within permit specifically and the Durham Live project in general. Durham Live is a critically important project for the City, Region and Province and represents a key element of the economic re-start. Our client is very proud to be at the forefront of assisting that economic recovery through Durham Live. Project Lonestar, the proposed development for the Property, has a huge role to play in all of this. TRCA staff are well aware of the timing crunch faced by Project Lonestar and our client appreciates the efforts made by everyone to get that project approved and under construction without any further delay.

We have reviewed the staff report and note that it sets out the history of the proposed development including the MZO (Issued October 30, 2020), the recent amendments to the Conservation Authorities Act and the recent timing regulation made thereunder. We will not repeat this history. We note, though, that pursuant to O. Reg. 159/21, the TRCA is required, in this hearing, to render a decision on the permit application by Friday March 12, 2021. We also note that pursuant to subsection 28.0.1(3) of the Conservation Authorities Act, the permit shall

be granted if the conditions in subsection 28.0.1(4) are met. TRCA staff do not debate that all such conditions have been met in this case. Accordingly, the law requires that TRCA issue the permit on Friday March 12, 2021. This hearing is, therefore, about determining any conditions which TRCA might wish to impose. This hearing is not about whether or not the permit will issue on March 12, 2021; it is only about the conditions to impose.

As you know, the Property is the subject of a Minister's Zoning Order (MZO 607-20). The area covered by the subject permit application is zoned Warehousing and Logistics Zone. Prior to the Minister of Municipal Affairs issuing the MZO, the Applicant and TRCA entered into a Memorandum of Agreement for Ecosystem Compensation (the "MOA"). The MOA contemplated the proposed site alteration of the Property as part of the eventual development of the Property. The MOA required ecological compensation and the proposed conditions should be consistent with the MOA.

Attached to this letter is a chart which identifies the proposed conditions and our client's response to each of them. We believe that presenting it in chart format assists the hearing process. Where the Applicant agrees with a condition that agreement is identified in green font. Where the Applicant agrees with the condition subject to clarification or modification, it is identified in amber font. Where the Applicant disagrees with the condition and wants it deleted, that is identified in red font.

TRCA staff have proposed thirteen (13) STANDARD CONDITIONS. We are pleased to advise that our client agrees with and consents to all of the STANDARD CONDITIONS.

TRCA staff have proposed twenty (20) SPECIAL CONDITIONS. As detailed on the attached chart, our client takes no major issue with half of the SPECIAL CONDITIONS but does take issue with the other half of them. The objections to these conditions are detailed in the attached chart and fall into the following broad categories:

1. Third Party Conditions
 - a. Some of the proposed conditions are not within the control of the Applicant and can only be fulfilled by third parties. Such a condition is clearly unreasonable.
2. Conditions which are not properly related to the within permit application.
 - a. Some of the conditions are overreaching since they do not deal with the within permit (topsoil stripping and pre-grading) but deal with a future site plan application.
3. Conditions which require the Applicant's consent
 - a. This relates to SPECIAL CONDITION #18. Section 28.0.1(24) of the Conservation Authorities Act requires that Applicant's consent for third parties to be added to the Agreement. The Applicant does not consent to the addition of the proposed additional parties.

4. Conditions which are unreasonable or *ultra vires* as detailed in the attached chart.

Our client looks forward to dealing with all of this at the upcoming oral hearing. I intend to make the presentation on behalf of the Applicant but I will have some of the Applicant's consultants available to answer questions if required. Thank you.
